

Stephen Goldin is hanging out on <u>Wave Without a Shore</u> now. He has a bunch of ebook sales methods he's using to solve the current author problem.

Apparently publishers are not keeping authors' work available to readers, so they are exploring new avenues to get their work out to people who want to read.

Apple, Google, and Amazon are doing various schemes to position themselves in the ebook market. I'm sure they have our best interests at heart. My own bet is that authors who realize the benefit of direct connection to fans will carry the day. A savvy business type might be able to do print on demand services for authors and their customers and make a reasonable living at it.

I'm not a merchant, so check it out with one before you try this scheme.

If you like dystopia, <u>Internet Archive</u> has a documentary titled <u>Orwell Rolls in</u>. <u>His Grave</u>, highly informative about what passes for news these days.

Just type *Orwell* into the search bar there. You'll also find the BBC version of <u>1984</u> starring Peter Cushing and Donald Pleasance to watch as a warmup.

Decision Games says <u>Struggle for the Galactic Empire</u> is selling well, which is good for SF gamers, since they may push the remake of *Battlefleet Mars* up in the <u>queue</u> for re-issue.

Notes from May BCSFA Meeting

In attendance were Ray Seredin (host), R. Graeme Cameron (president), Kathleen Moore (treasurer), Barb Dryer (secretary), Felicity Walker (editor), Michael "Fruvous" Bertrand, Joe Devoy, and Julian Castle.

We continued discussing the idea of donating money to help VCON 34. The vote on whether to donate \$500 was extended to members who had not voted at the last meeting, two of whom voted no, while two abstained. Felicity felt that donating over a third of our savings was risky, and suggested donating a less significant percentage of our balance, while making up the difference with fundraising. As an example, a party or series of parties that received a \$20 donation from each guest would raise \$200 with only ten guests. Kathleen said that a donation of \$10 from twenty guests would raise the same money and result in a better party. Kathleen also suggested holding Turkey Readings (pending Fran Skene's approval) or even Turkey Video Nights, with B-movies cued up to the worst scenes and money bid to stop the film or keep it playing.

Barb said that Rod Serling was recently inducted into the Science Fiction Hall of Fame, decades after his death. Graeme added that critics liked *The Twilight Zone* in and of itself, but were disappointed in Serling, who until then had created more upmarket fare.

Graeme liked Taral Wayne's Susan Wood article and Ray's convention report in *BCSFAzine* #444. Kathleen and Fruvous liked the Calendar.

Fruvous said that large parts of Prince Edward Island are uncharted woods where no human has gone since the railway track was laid there. Graeme asked if those woods have any legendary paranormal creatures living in them. Fruvous said yes.

"Screech" is a traditional maritime liquor made from sugar, rum, and grain alcohol.

Julian asked if VCON had ever rented a table to promote itself at the local Comicon. The answer was no.

Graeme worked in customs at the time of the 1986 World Exposition (AKA Expo 86). Hugo-winning American-Canadian writer/dancer/choreographer/teacher Jeanne Robinson passed away Sunday 30 May 2010. Her husband of 35 years and Stardance trilogy co-author, Spider Robinson, sent out the following announcement, forwarded to *BCSFAzine* by <u>Garth Spencer</u>:

"Buchi Eihei in Pacem

"Jeanne Robinson left this life at about 4:45 Sunday afternoon, a gentle smile on her face. Her departure was quite peaceful and she was in no pain at all. (*Buchi Eihei* means 'dancing wisdom, eternal peace.' It's the name Jeanne's Soto Zen instructor bestowed on her.)

"Because her Palliative Care doctor, Paul Sugar, was able to forecast her passing almost to the hour, her daughter Terri, son-in-law Heron and granddaughter Marisa flew back from NYC just in time, and were with me at her side when Jeanne died; and her mother Dorothy and sister Laurie arrived from Massachusetts only a couple of hours later, after Terri had had time to expertly make Jeanne look better than she had for days. Zen priests Michael and Kate Newton were also present per Jeanne's wishes, as were our oldest friends in this part of the world, Greg McKinnon, Anya Coveney-Hughes and Stevie McDowell. Over the next few hours more sangha buddies arrived, and chanting of the Prajna Paramita Heart Sutra was done. Her body was then bathed and dressed in her hand-sewn rakasu as per Zen tradition.

"In accordance with her wishes she will be cremated. Half her ashes will be scattered off this coast, and half will be taken back to her childhood home, Cape Cod, so that her East Coast family will have a place to go and visit her."

Camp Sights



Preamble: I've been along a part of the Skyline Drive in Shenandoah National Park, so I have a nodding acquaintance with the land. Victoria Vayne, Bob Wilson, and I were driving back from some con or were just traveling for its own sake...We entered Swift Run Gap, Highway 33, and left by Thornton Gap, Highway 211. Of the several campgrounds available, I believe we put our tent up in Beg Meadows, near a lodge with a spectacular view of the Valley. I remember a number of details. Having a doe nearly walk into the tent in search of scraps. Bear-proof garbage cans. And untrustworthy looking trails. I never ventured along any of them. There seemed too many trails, crossing every hundred yards or so, and all blazed with the same colour plastic ties as if, somehow, the reassurance that this was an "official" trail was enough by itself. Well, according to the map I bought there was nothing to see with-in a mile of the camp but swamp. And we weren't staying but the night, and leaving next morning. So our stay in Shenandoah National Park was pretty much the usual tourist thing. However...

Not all my traveling has been tame. One time Bob Wilson and I drove north, along the shore of Lake Superior, looking for a number of interesting landmarks along the way. It was the same trip on which we climbed to the top of Agawa Rock, and on which I found a quarter on a beach miles from the highway, and untracked by human footprints. But these were events along the east shore.

Another hundred miles north and west, the Nippigon shore juts out into the lake a couple of miles and was given the name Coldwell Peninsula sometime in the 19th century. The tiny hamlet of Coldwell lies a bit east, not actually on the peninsula for some reason. If it weren't so dirty and rundown, the wharfs and fishing gear would make another Peggy's Cove of it, but tourists didn't expect picturesque fishing villages on Lake Superior, so the inhabitants let nature take its course.

The Coldwell was the inspiration of many of the paintings by various Group of Seven artists. It is a long extinct volcanic extrusion with a complicated metamorphic history that delighted the eyes of Canada's paramount painters. It was a tight grouping of dumpling hills clinging together like survivors on a raft, surrounded by the moody waters of Gitcheegoomee. In Autumn, the colours must run riot, as the cliché has it, but Bob and I were too early in the season for that. The hills and the plain that was the neck of the peninsula were green. A sandy beach ran along the west side of the neck, from the mouth of the Little Pick River, where there were campsites.



Two other peculiarities marked the Coldwell. One was the unexpected development of sand dunes in the middle of the peninsular neck. Vegetation only held the soil loosely, and drifting had denuded the sand in spots. The other peculiarity was that the Colwell peninsula was used during WWII as the site of a prison camp for German officers. Besides hiking the trail around the peninsula, Bob had especially hoped to find this old camp when he drew up the travel plans.

As it happened, hiking the trail proved to be a bust. Bob, after a week of driving and other excursions, didn't feel up to it. We got about two miles through the woods and along the lobate granite beaches when he said he was too tired to go on. I have to admit, it had been arduous and we hadn't made enough progress so far that circumnavigating the entire peninsula was remotely feasible in one day. It hadn't been a total loss, since we were well out of sight of any human despoliation. Moreover, we'd gotten as far as two of the minor landmarks mentioned in the park guide—a pebble beach high up on the shore, left behind by the ancient lake, and a pair of abandoned boats that had been bleaching in the sun for about fifty years, reduced to wreckage.

Finding the officers' camp, however, turned out to be fairly easy. According to the map, it was almost due east of the beach, and the woods weren't thick. There was little underbrush, and the trees tended to be pine. If there were any abandoned buildings, or remnant enclosures, they should be easy to find, we reasoned. But there didn't seem to be anything at all. We were puzzled, until one of us tripped yet again over one of the many tangled vines among the brush. Upon examination, it was obvious why the vines had been such a hazard to footing. It was barbed wire, overgrown. After that we kept our eyes to the ground, and quickly found a mound of moldering shingles and boards that could have been anything-a guard tower perhaps, but more likely a tool shed, or even an outhouse. The remains were disappointing. We were resigned to nothing more when we came to an open space with a builtup embankment of dirt, grown over with grass, and mounted on it several pieces of ruined machinery. We had found the saw mill, or its foundation at least. Rough, squared off timbers, holding back the embankment, had turned black with age. A bit of concrete floor was visible under the sand. Bolted to the broken platform were the skeletal remains of the mill, stripped of all its moving parts after the camp closed. The empty frames and jigs looked more like rock than metal, crusted with layers of rust that had grown over thirty-five years of exposure to the damp and cold so near the arctic watershed.

We trekked further east without finding much more. A new road, in the process of being bulldozed, crossed our path, coming up from the paved park entry road a few hundred yards south. We crossed it, and found a series of shallow, sand filled trenches that looked more like sand bunkers on a golf course than anything else we could think of. The sandy depressions were strung in a line, like sausages, leading north toward the mainland in a discontinuous by-way.

The brush on either side was littered by the rusty shells of old cans, broken glass, and what looked like shreds of an old boot. Possibly the pits marked the sites of old barracks, although I couldn't see how old wooden shells would collapse into a depression. And it was odd they stretched in a single line half a mile long. This would be implausible for reasons of security. In fact, there was no compelling evidence that the sandy pits were connected with the prison camp at all. In the end, we reached no conclusions.

The "sand traps" stopped nowhere in particular, and we found no more sign of human occupation, not even barbed wire. We hiked west again, along the line of the railroad tracks, until we came to the Little Pic. Our side of the river was relatively low, and lumpy, with the mainland rising in sheer granite walls to five or six hundred feet. The rails jumped the water on breathtaking wooden trestles, and ran away into the northern wilderness, clinging to the skirts of mountains worn down by a billion years. We could go no farther that way, and turned south toward camp. We were soon reminded that we had never been far from human influence. Long before we sighted our tent we came across a number of used condoms in the bushes.

Afterword: Strangely, when Mike Shoemaker published this as a "letter" in his fanzine, he edited out the final detail. Condoms were too distasteful for mention in his well bred fanzine, I believe he said later.

One thing I like about the Doubletree Hotel Seattle Airport is the all you can eat breakfast for \$16.95 (plus a \$3.00 tip) so I fill myself up with tons of OJ, pancakes, sausages, bacon, and hash-browns so I can skip lunch. I stay at a table that has a great view of the rain prowling down on fans racing from their cars to the main doors of the hotel at about 10:30 when I head to my panel, but first I make a quick call to the shop in the lobby to pick up something for my allergies.

The first panel is the world premiere of *Star Trek: Phoenix*, a Seattle-based fan production of a series set in the original *Trek* uni-



verse 45 years after the events in *ST: Nemesis*. I thought coming a full half hour before the panel would put me someplace near the head of the line-up, but when I get there the line-up is already down the halls, past the door to the main the art room. Still it's worth the wait and I do find a seat in the packed ballroom to the see the episode. I can best descript *ST: Phoenix* as "classic *Trek* meets *Babylon 5*," a bit of *ST:TNG*, some cool new Starfleet uniforms, and for once a planet on *Trek* that doesn't look like southern California, but the good old Pacific Northwest, filled with a brand new type of creature to the universe (and yes, they do kill a "red shirt"). I enjoy it and if you want to see it yourself just log onto <u>http://www.stphoenix.com/</u> and go from there. The first of two Q and A's with the cast and production crew follow the showing that I also enjoyed.

The panel ends at 1:00 PM and I then make my way to the dealers' rooms to raid the place for more goodies (and yes I did pay for them). After about an hour and an half of deciding what cool nerd stuff would be heading off to my place without getting Canada customs on my back, I make a dash back to my room (which you recall is way over in the 5B wing of the hotel complex) to drop the stuff off and by accident come across Darth Vader and crew at the 501st's charity event, so I got few pictures of that.

The next panel I go to is on sci-fi and fantasy TV shows. It fills me in on the happenings on the other SF&F series on the tube these days, and a with a little sneak peek at what could be coming up for the 2010–2011 TV season. The good news: *Fringe, Bones,* and *Stargate Universe* are coming back. The not-so-good news: *Chuck, Flash Forward,* and *V* are on the bubble. The bad news: *Dollhouse, Heroes,* and *Lost* are going or gone.

OK, I don't know why I did what I'm about to tell you I did, but I enjoy volunteering around hospitality too much to know better.

At four I go to the volunteers who sent me down to one of the two set-up rooms for the hospitality operation, washing my hands before reporting to the person in charge. My mission (which I accept) is to trawl out a dozen bags of CostCo meatballs before 6 PM (Fandom Daylight Time), so they can to served as part of dinner in hospitality. The process is to get 2/5 of a bag of meatballs into a large microwavesafe bowl, place it in the microwave for four minutes, take out the bowl, turn around the meatballs, place it back into the microwave for another four minutes, take out the bowl again, turn around meatballs, place once into the microwave for another four minutes, take out the bowl, and place the now-trawled meatballs into a large stainless steel warming pan, then start all over again. However, as a fellow volunteer dressed as a Victorian princess opens the container with the steamed vegetables, the steam sets off the smoke alarm.

OK, since we all know what caused it to go off, we continue to serve the members in the line-up, but soon con and hotel security ask us to leave, and we end up in the rear parking lot 'til the fire department shows up. I guess we're lucky since it has stopped raining for a while and it doesn't start again until the very second the fire department gives us the green light to return inside, but not to the hospitality room or its adjoining wing. So for the next half hour I'm walking around the hotel looking for a place to sit until we're given the all-clear to return and I end up beside one of the artists in their alley taking pictures of a woman with a really cool bustle. Just after this we're given permission to return to the room and I will never forget the look on the Sea-Tac fire chief's face as he lectured the woman dressed as a Victorian princess about how not to set off the smoke alarm.

After that the idea of taking any pictures of the masquerade are pushed aside because just as I enter hospitality they ask to reheat the meatballs, so I return to the operation room and start to do so, while watching the events on a TV set. However, this is all for naught, since about an hour later hotel security says they need to move the tables from under the smoke alarm so we will not set them off ever again and dinner is cancelled. Luckily I have a bite just before we put the food away so we can serve it as lunch on Sunday after the tables are moved. On top of this I have to wait for the person in charge to sign my volunteer sheet before heading out and she gives me the oddest look when she catches me talking to the feral black cat that's sitting on the balcony. So the job I thought would take about two hours ends up taking four and an half hours and the funny thing is that I'm planning to do the same at Norwescon 34, but this time with more input on how to run it through my restaurant training.

Since it's now 8:30 PM (Fandom Daylight Time) most of the masquerade is over and I don't expect to get any pictures of people in interesting costumes. Still I end up with tons of them as I walk the halls of the hotel, party-hopping. Most of the night I spend at a party being held by the Seattle area *Doctor Who* fan group, but there are a few others that I pay a call on and even run into the woman dressed as a Victorian princess again. She told me that her sister made both their costumes and the only reason she was working in hospitality was that a family member was running the joint.

Just after midnight there's word that the slave auction is under way in the party room down the hall, the same one that had the topless card dealer the night before, and next thing I know about half the party was making a bee-line for it, with me almost ripping the beautiful dress of the Victorian princess when I accidently step on its bustled train. After a quick apology to her for the incident, I notice that the room has a line-up that I can only compare to the one outside the Horseshoe Bay ferry terminal at the start of summer long weekend. Besides I have my camera on me and that's "no-no" at that party. So I say goodbye to the her and head to the Saturday dance to get some video of it, only to get myself a lecture from the drunk husband of that corsetiere I pissed off at Norwescon 32 (an ongoing Cosmic Ray feud to be continued at Norwescon 34), who in turn has con security on my back again (I know, I know, I will ask before taking video).

After that I walk slowly back to the party wing getting a few more pictures of the willing in their costumes on the way, before dropping off my camera. I then go to the party where I saw my new lady friend, but she's gone off to bed. So after taking my nightly pills with a little bit of 7 Up, and talking to her sister and a few others, I go back to my room to hit the hay.

Sunday, April 4th, 2010

Sundays are always a bit of a downer for me and quite a few others at cons. The fantasy world is coming to a close and tomorrow you'll be back to reality. However, there are still a ton of things to do at a last day of a Norwescon and this year is no exception.

I get up a little on the late side, about 9:30, but after another nice breakfast in the restaurant, I head to the first-ever Fannish Flea Market, where I pick up a few of the hard-to-find items of cool fandom stuff that are still there (Note for Norwescon 34: get up a little earlier). I then head over to the main dealer room, yet the book I want is gone. Still I pick up few more cool things to bring back home.

As with any con the schedule in the pocket program is not the schedule the real events end up running on, as the "Fandance Film Festival" starts at noon, while the "Revenge of the Movie Previews" (or the films that sound so bad that they could be showed on a future *MST3K*), which is supposed to start at noon, starts at 2 PM, when "FFF" is supposed to start. Luckily I've seen this change in the con's daily newsletter so I'm there. I guess the highlights of it are the "Let's Make a Movie" of 2010 entitled *Blood in the Halls* (or *What Not to Do While at a Sci-Fi Convention*) and a

very funny Seattle-made fan-film on what would happen if Clark Kent lost his job and had to move in with Lex Luthor (the Fortress of Solitude is now Lex's bathroom and the fastest way to get rid of Mr. Mxyzptlk is to invite him over to play Scrabble). After that I stay for a few of the movie previews. Still, I'm getting a little hungry, so I head to the volunteers' lounge to get a bite.

Once again luck is on my side as the doors to the volunteers' lounge soon close behind me and the party of the volunteers commences. I have only six and half hours of volunteer time this year, nowhere near the hours that some others had, so by the time my name comes up for a prize, all the really cool stuff is spoken for. Yet, I do get a nice drawing of Scully and Mulder of the *X-Files*, drawn by New Westminster's own late great Warren Oddsson. With my hands full of cool fandom stuff I'm just about to head to my room, when the party fall silent and a man bends onto his knees and proposes to his long-time girlfriend. Though a good number of the Norwescon 33 concom knew this would happen, it still takes most of us volunteers by surprise. Heck, this may be the first time I've seen an event like this at a con, and this kind of thing will only bring me back for more.

I quickly return to my room to drop of all the cool fandom stuff I picked up that day and see that my roommate is already packing her bags, even though she's going to return home to Portland the next day. I ask her why and she says that she likes to get a head start when she is leaving a convention.

I return to the main part of the hotel for the last two events, the "Onions and Roses" panel, and the "Closing Ceremonies." There are a lot more roses than onions this year, and that made the concom a little red-faced with pride. Then most of the Guests of Honour (one had to leave to get a flight home) sit on stage where the conchair asks all of them the rather provoking question "Did you meet a beautiful woman, that (OK, you know the rest)?" and they all provide us with rather provoking answers. Then all the concom take the same seats (minus the GOHs) and get a well-deserved round of applause from the membership of Norwescon 33, then a large poster for Norwescon 34 is unveiled.

Surprisingly, most of the Guests of Honour on NWC 34 poster are women and as it turns out a minimum of 50% of the guests will be female members of both the sci-fi creative and fandom community. Oh, by the way, I already have my membership for it.

The fair known as Norwescon is over for another year...well not really; after eating a quite nice steak with sweet potato for dinner in the hotel's pub...I mean bar, I head to the dead dog (or dead Sasquatch) party in the presidential suite. However, there is tons of stuff to move out of all the rooms that Norwescon 33 used into trucks in order to return it to the storage units for safe keeping until next time. So for the next hour or so I'm helping the concom and a few others load up the trucks, before it's just down to one large ballroom of stuff to run a convention, then we all head back to the presidential suite to party. There I talk to a good members core of US nonwestern fandom, have a few bites to eat, and even watch a bit of *Jurassic Park II: The Lost World* airing on the Peachtree superstation. I guess I leave just before midnight when the conversation turns to blasting things to Kingdome Come with a Glock C22 pistol (in hindsight I should have stayed, since the two guys who were having the conversation turned out to be a police officer and a member of the Washington State Nation Guard, so even here in good old Canada them using such a firearms would be legal). So I head to my room and sleepy time.

Monday, April 5th, 2010

The activities of my roommate wake me up just after eight. She asks me what time my train is leaving. I say 5:46 that evening, however, her train to Portland is leaving at 11:40 AM, so we say our goodbyes and she heads out. After a quick shower and me breaking a record for packing my bags, it's time for me to do the same.

I check my bags with the hotel's concierge who places them in storage until 4:30 PM when a cab shows up, and I head for breakfast, once again in the hotel's restaurant. After that I return to the ballroom which still has all the stuff they used to run Norwescon 33 and I help the concom load it onto the trucks for about a half hour. By then most of the stuff is in a truck on its way to the storage unit, so I say my goodbyes to the very thankful concom and head out.

OK, as many of you know, one of my second loves (after sci-fi media and few other things that could be revealed in *BCFSAzines* of the future) is rail-based mass transit and the Seattle area has just opened a new light-rail line from downtown Seattle to the Sea-Tac airport, right next to the hotel that hosts NorWesCon. So after a quick ride on the hotel's airport shuttle and me placing \$2.50 in the ticket machine, I was off on a ride downtown. This system is not like Vancouver's SkyTrain because it has an operator much like a bus and a good deal of the ride is at street level (much as the old streetcars did here before they were removed in 1955). After I get downtown I notice a another light-rail vehicle, this time the "South Lake Union Streetcar" and with another \$2.50 in its farebox I take a quite nice round trip through the downtown core of Seattle.

Then I return to the starting point of the streetcar line, I go to lunch, and I end up having a sushi with what I can only call the strongest wasabi paste known to man. I then get a little lost in the many Pacific Centre-like malls that fill downtown Seattle. However, I do find my way back to the light-rail line and after stopping to look around at the two other transit stations in the city's core, start to head back to Sea-Tac, minus another \$2.50. One thing I do like about Seattle's light-rail system is since they do have an operator on each train, it can wait a little for a large number of riders to show up at certain stations at certain times, like the one I was riding on that waited two minutes at a station near a major high school for a carload of students to show up. Nevertheless, this can't be done in Vancouver since the SkyTrain lines are fully automated.

I return to the hotel and say my goodbyes to the staff that put up with us for yet another year. However, the hotel's good heart doesn't end there, since there's a major accident on I5, so my taxi does not show up, so they get a nice guy from the service staff to drive me to the train station in his own car. For that I give him \$20 and a big thanks.

As with any train in North America it's running late, but I soon run into a couple that was on the train down with me and a good number of both freight and passenger trains go past, including one that has a formal D&D games master who's working on the southbound Amtrak train as its conductor and she waves at me as it passes (she is also an engineer and I'm surprised not to see her up in the cab of its lo-

comotive). So my train shows up and we leave Seattle on time. They have the George Clooney movie *Up in the Air* on it and I enjoy it quite a bit. The train's conductor says that we should be in Vancouver on time, but a wayward BNSF switching operation at Everett and a rather long CN container train just north of Crescent Beach get us into the station 25 minutes late.

Now it's crunch time for all the cool things I purchased at Norwescon 33 as I have to go through Canada customs. I come \$3.17 short of having to pay duty.

After that I catch a SkyTrain to Edmonds Station where I have to break out the bowler hat I bought at the con since it's starting to rain. It's a few minutes after midnight, the time all the weird people ride transit, and that's confirmed because I'm soon joined by three young punk rockers, one wearing a small banner that reads "I Love Dirty Pussy" (and no I don't think this fellow likes cats with hygiene problems, he like something we can't bring up in a nice fanzine like this one).

After about twenty minutes the 106 bus shows up and about 12 minutes after that I'm unlocking the door to my apartment. So ends my Norwescon odyssey for yet another year.

Sound of Noise: Insane Swedish film about a music-hating cop after a criminal gang who provide their own live musical accompaniment to their assorted crimes. Example: a getaway van with a metronome on the dashboard and a cat wailing away on a complete drum-set in the back. Cool.

In reaction to mildly misogynist mid-twentieth-century naughty cartoons, Ken has drawn fourteen extremely misandrist cartoons in which 1950s housewives kill their husbands, their children, and their pets. Recurring themes include poison and grinding up men and dogs into food. Times have changed far too much for this to be helpful; instead, it just comes across as hateful and depressing, like Lady Gaga's "Telephone."

For what it's worth, the art is good, but the misandry is a deal-breaker. I liked everything of Ken's I'd read up to this point—*How God Built Earth, The Village Primer, War Story, How to Tell If Your Hot New Boyfriend Is Secretly an Escort, How to Cure a Broken Heart in 12 Easy Steps, and On the Rocks* (see <u>BCSFAzine</u><u>#443</u> for my review of *On the Rocks*)—and now I feel betrayed. I'm also left pessimistic about the future of humanity. Maybe we're headed toward a gender-segregated society like the Zentraedi. I'm not sure where that leaves me.

"Are You Ready?": Reviews *Money Road* by Garth Turner, a former politician turned financial entrepreneur, author, and blogger (<u>The Greater Fool</u>). The book covers indicators, technical analysis, fundamental analysis, savings bonds, preferred shares, equity stocks, gold, real estate, index funds, exchange-traded funds, diversification, bonds, and derivatives, apparently quite belligerently.

The Panic of 2008 forced central banks all over the world, including the Bank of Canada, to lower their interest rates. In the short term this meant more people

could afford mortgage payments. This has caused a new housing bubble. In the long term, rates will go back up, the bubble will burst, and Canada will have to go through the same crisis as the United States did.

Canada's largest generation, the Baby Boomers, is starting to reach retirement age. About half of Canadians have no pension and no savings, and will spend their golden years on a fixed income (Canada Pension Plan or Old Age Supplement) that pays below the poverty line. Those with houses will all be trying to liquidate them. The next generation won't be big enough to buy all those houses—plus the young people currently fueling the boom will be facing higher rates and also trying to unload their property at the same time. Canadian mortgages are recourse loans, so even if the bank forecloses and sells a property at half what the ex-homeowners borrowed to pay for it, the bank still gets to hound the ex-homeowners for the remainder of the loan—seizing savings and any belongings, and garnishing wages.

The prices of oil and grain are still rising. The provincial and federal governments are running deficits. There won't be enough money in the system for health care. Elderly people on fixed incomes don't spend as much, so the consumer economy will be hit hard by the retirement of the Boomers. Savings aren't safe: bank deposits earn interest slower than currency loses value to inflation. Only wise investing and physical gold are safe.

When I listen to old tapes of *The Phil Hendrie Show* I recorded from the radio in March 2008, I hear ads from a company selling gold, which had just hit US\$1000 per ounce, with the argument that gold was only going to get more expensive and it would be wise to buy it now before the dollar becomes weaker. Concerned, I ordered their free DVD (which, buy the way, was *not* hosted by Pat Boone, as they claimed), and was subsequently telemarketed twice over the following year (I didn't mind; they were quite low-pressure). Today, I notice companies like Dollars for Gold and Money Mart want to *buy* gold in any form, with the argument that the seller would be much happier with extra cash to spend on a shopping spree. These offers are vaguely unsettling.

"Letters to the Editor": Readers reply to previous issues' content about Westerns, gold, alternative history, Peak Oil, and postal service. Lloyd Penney's LOC and Dale's reply reveal that the Reserve Bank of India convinced the IMF to give them 200 tonnes of gold in exchange for several billion dollars' worth of fiat currency, and that there is not enough gold in the world for every adult North American to buy one one-ounce coin. Joseph Nicholas says global warming will turn most of the Earth into uninhabitable desert and force agriculture up into the poor soils of the far north; society will fall off a cliff, there will be a massive die-off, and within a thousand years humans will be extinct. Maybe some other species will evolve, but there will be no more fossil fuels for them to have a high-tech civilization. Dale is more optimistic. He says that the agriculture will change, not collapse, adapting to the shifting climate with ranching on dry grass and Canadians growing corn; that the population will not drop lower than one billion; and that we will colonize space and the Moon.

Just to be safe, I should probably have a quick, relatively painless means of suicide ready to go at a moment's notice. Also: "World Wide Party #17" (reminder); "Zine Listings" (contact information and short description); "Seen in the Literature" (passages from scientific journals noticed by Dale).

'To Walk the Moon' (September 2009–April 2010). Published by Taral Wayne, 245 Dunn Ave. #2111, Toronto, Ontario, M6K 1S6. "The Revised and Expanded 2009 Worldcon Report by the Anticipation Fan Guest of Honour, Taral Wayne." <u>http://efanzines.com/Taral/ToWalkThe Moon.pdf</u>.

A long, detailed report with a lot of interesting stories. Taral says that this is the longest thing he's ever written. Two of his other long works—"The Miscarriage of Heaven and Hell" and "The Roach Motel"—sound entertaining, judging by their premises.

Taral is the fourth Canadian to be a Worldcon Fan GOH. The first was in 1975 and the next in 1993. If these trends continue, the next Canadian Fan GOH at Worldcon will be in 2026.

The recognition, exposure, and chance to contribute that Taral got from this Worldcon were the opposite of his negative experience with the previous Canadian Worldcon in Toronto.

In order to have an exhibit of Taral's interests at the con without having to transport the contents of his apartment to Montreal, a "virtual apartment" was created by photographing his actual apartment and then putting up life-size enlargements as the walls of a three-dimensional re-creation. Taral says that the same cat managed to get into two different photographs. Aw. :-)

This sentence, and its use of italics, reminded me of Garth: "While I was instructed on more-or-less what to do, no-one realized I had to be told basic things like *sit in the front row*, or *leave the stage* after you've said your piece by *exiting the wings*."

Taral doesn't tip because society says he has to. All right, he tips when somebody really deserves a tip. If they put forth an effort, he'll give them something extra. But this tipping automatically, that's for the birds. As far as he's concerned they're just doing their job.

Getting older is not fun, but one of the benefits of later life is the ability to reacquire all the things you collected in childhood and then foolishly threw away when you grew up. Taral was reunited with (or else just bought) some pins, a *Smurfs* book, and collectible cards (in what sense was *Mars Attacks* "revived by '80s yuppies"?).

In Taral's experience, SF pros are not fans. That is, they usually don't mingle with fandom, hanging out and being fans of things. For example, you might find yourself talking with a pro at a party—however, "He'd happy to talk to you about his book. I doubt he would be quite as happy to listen to you talk about your fanzine." Tangentially-related point: every pro to whom I've ever handed a copy of *BC-SFAzine* has accepted it graciously and taken it home as far as I knew; it's only been other fans that have pretended to want a copy and then tossed it aside without even having the decency to wait until I wasn't looking.

After reading Taral's explanation of why there is no apostrophe in "Tim Hortons," I realize that I am *still* offended by Bill 101.

Taral explains the title of the zine: like an astronaut who has walked on the Moon, he wonders if being a Worldcon GOH was such a great experience that everything else will seem anticlimactic.

"Science News" by Ken Tapping: Stephen Hawking says looking for aliens is dangerous. Ken makes a cool point: we began looking for radio signals from space in an era in which we beamed high-power, unencrypted radio signals out in all directions, and we assumed aliens would do the same; today we use coded broadband signals, fibre, and cable, and don't send clear radio signals out into space anymore—so if each civilization only sends out clear radio for a few decades, and then switches to other methods, that could be why we never hear anything.

"Space News" by Ken Tapping: The sun has a surprisingly large and immediate effect on life on Earth, beyond our usual expectations of heat and light. Bad space weather toasts satellites and astronauts, sends deadly radiation through the Earth's magnetic field and into high latitudes, knocks out radio communications, GPS (the most widely-used navigation method today), and power systems, and even corrodes pipelines with electricity. With global warming opening up higher latitudes for human use, this is going to be even more of a concern than before. At the same time you've got maximum and minimum sunspot activity affecting our temperature.
