

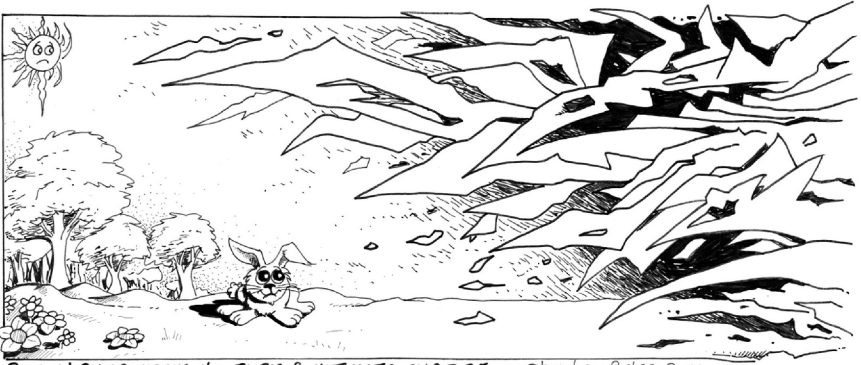

Dear Felicity:

Thank you for *BCSFazine* 451, both .pdf and paperzine. Always welcome and appreciated. The Christmas shopping is done, the tree is up, and the presents are wrapped, and there is a bit of time here to write a quick loc for the next issue.

So far, folks, you've had a real Toronto winter...cold, with some snow here and there. We had a spare, we thought we'd give it to you, no need to return it...

[In Metro Vancouver it hasn't been that bad so far. We had a few days of snow and then things went back to normal. One month down, two to go...]

The first year I lived in Victoria was 1977, and as if to welcome us and make us feel at home, there was close to a foot of snow on the streets of Victoria, and the city had nothing with which to clear it away, because it had sold all its snow-clearing equipment to Vancouver the year before. Murphy works in mysterious ways. Victoria was impassable for about a week. Sounds just like Heathrow airport...I hope Steve Green's been warm and safe. I know we can joke about it, but Heathrow isn't used to getting the weather we get regularly.

We watch BBC World News on our local cable on a regular basis, and I find that like the CBC, it is relatively objective and neutral because it doesn't need to worry about ratings, and both broadcasters are, IMHO, agenda-free, which, of course, bothers some politicians. This is why I cannot trust most American-based broadcasters, for they all seem to follow some left- or right- agenda, or cater to the left or right on the American political spectrum.

Nothing like a paper zine. To me, this is truly published, and while it's what I prefer, I understand the need to publish, and the financial need to do it cheaply. I collect the paper zines I get, and the .pdfed zines or Word-document zines, too. That's why I appreciate getting both the .pdf and the paper zine, but it the finances continue to tighten, don't send me the paper version. I see a dollar's worth of postage on the envelope, plus the zine itself...that could be upwards of \$2 total, and I'm not a member. Whoever finances my copy, I very much appreciate it, but don't let it hurt your own pocket.

Saw the *Narnia* movie...wonderful tale, and I got more out of it because I'd read all the *Narnia* books, and knew what to expect. And, I saw it in 2D, too. We might go to see it in 3D, but there is always the extra charge for 3D glasses, which we must purchase, even if we kept them from previous movies. We also want to see *TRON*, but reviews are mixed. I suspect the movie and the original will be in a boxed set very soon.

[I'm a big fan of the original Tron. It doesn't look like Legacy kept the aesthetics of the original, so I'm not likely to pay to see it, but I'm a little curious about the fate of the returning characters.]

Michael Bertrand's letter...steampunk is still fairly big, even though it's been partially co-opted by popular culture. For club meetings, I'd invite the folks with VSteam to come and discuss steampunk, and what it is. I think it's come about be-

cause we are living in the future, and don't seem to have enough imagination to see what the SF of our own future will be like. So, we've set the clock back to Victorian times, a time of wonder and adventure and discovery and invention, with a future full of amazement for us. We seem to need that these days, the sensawunda older fans would say we all needed (they're right), so steampunk goes back to that time, a time and setting yet fictional, to enjoy that wonder and have some expectation of an amazing future.

The review of *Opuntia 70*...I first floated the idea of a national newszine in the tradition of *Canadian Fandom*, *New Canadian Fandom* and *Maple Leaf Rag* more than a decade ago, and got the response I wrote about. Now, I don't think there is enough community between Canada's fannish cities for people in Ottawa to care about what's going on in Regina, for instance. I'd like to hope I'm wrong. Also, any news-gathering service would be better served by a regularly updated website, instead of a fanzine that I might get around to publishing...this is what's happened with *File 770*, Mike Glycer's Hugo-winning fanzine which is now largely supplemented by a website updated most days.



Tomorrow is Festivus for the rest of us? Well, a Merry Christmas to all BC-SFAns, plus a happy Kwanzaa and a Happy New Year, hope your had a pleasant Solstice and Chanukkah.

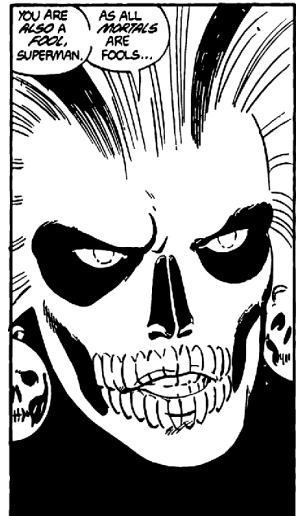


Who indeed?

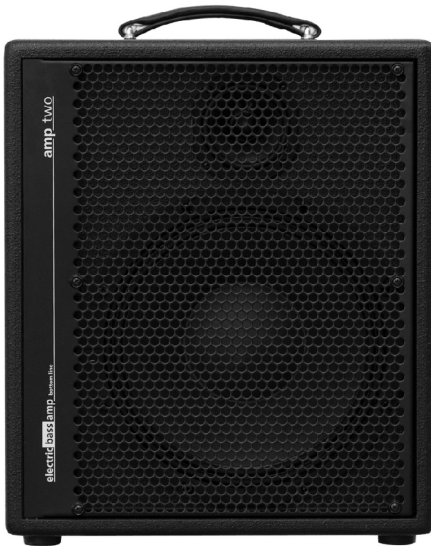

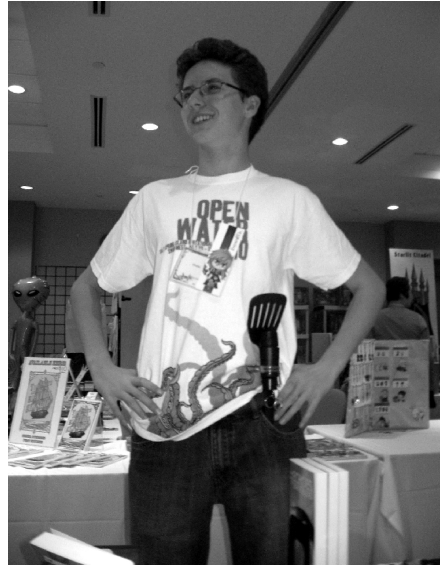
I actually parted with most of my posters during the weekend, but hey...it gives me an excuse to restock. I later even sold my two fancy display banners. Go figure.
