Notes from February 2015 BCSFA Meeting



In attendance were Graeme Cameron (chairman/archivist), Barb Dryer (secretary), Kathleen Moore (treasurer), Ray Seredin (host), Felicity Walker (editor), Michael "Fruvous" Bertrand, Julian Castle, Joe Devoy, William Graham, Stewart Smyth, and Sidney Trim.

Topic: Has local bowling alley Lois Lanes gone out of business? On the drive to the meeting I took a wrong turn and ended up in Queensborough. I noticed Lois Lanes was still there, but closed. Ray didn't know if it was still in operation either. Also, Ray got a haircut.

Topic: Curry. I like it as a flavour but it needs to come with lots of meat. I ordered Indian food delivery once and the curry had very little meat in it. Ray said that he had a curry pizza once when he was working at Little Caesar's. Relatedly, I lived next door to the Ukrainian Community Society of Ivan Franko for a few years and on some weekends they had free dinners,

where they served perogies and cabbage rolls (special thanks to Mrs. Vilve Yachke for the cabbage rolls and coffee).

Graeme has just started watching *The Adventures of Superman* (1952–1958) on MeTV and has noticed how weird it is. In one episode a banker says "He's a famous gangster! He does all his banking here!" Maybe that's not so unrealistic, what with the HSBC scandal.

In some versions of Superman, Lois Lane is mean to Clark Kent. Thus, despite being the leading lady of the mythos, she's disliked by some fans and pros, including John Byrne, who wrote and drew *Man of Steel* (1986), the rebooted Superman comic. Fru said: "Tryptich: she loves Superman, who is the ultimate man, so Clark has to

be the opposite."11 I've also been watching *The Adventures of Superman*, and George Reeves may be my favourite live-action Clark Kent. He's perfect.

Graeme asked where to get RiffTrax. You can buy them at http://www.rifftrax.com/. To get around copyright restrictions, the tracks for feature-length movies are audio only, and you have to provide the movie and synchronise the RiffTrax commentary yourself (which in my experience is very difficult). There are also public-domain shorts that come with the original video and RiffTrax commentary pre-combined. Free samples of RiffTrax are available on RiffTrax's YouTube channel: https://www.youtube.com/user/RiffTrax/videos. Fru added that RiffTrax is "everything you liked about *Mystery Science Theatre 3000*12 with none of the filler!"

Sid asked if anyone had seen *Iron Sky* (2012). Graeme mentioned that the sequel is in production, and described a scene where a bad guy pretending to be the President takes an elevator to the centre of the Earth, the doors open, there's a meadow with a city in the distance and Hitler



with a city in the distance, and Hitler comes riding up on a Tyrannosaurus rex to get the bad guy's report. "Full marks for guts," said Graeme of the wild premise.

Graeme also saw a bad movie on *Svengoolie*¹³: *Captive Wild Woman* (1943), which re-used footage from *The Big Cage* (1933) with Clyde Beatty as a jungle explorer cracking a whip at tigers in cages. A guy turns a female gorilla into a beautiful woman played by "the Venezuelan Volcano" Acquanetta. She gets jealous when the hero is with his fiancée, and she turns halfway back into a gorilla…later she turns fully into a gorilla to save him from other animals (she had power over the animals).



Graeme asked, "Whatever happened to the *Callahan's* computer game?" Fru said that it's hard to imagine it as an action game. I wondered if it was a text adventure (or text adventure with graphics). Graeme said it had to be better than the *Rendezvous with Rama* game where you had to understand the alien math system to play—something nobody understood but Ar-

thur C. Clarke. This reminded Fru of the MERP (Middle-Earth Role-Playing) character generation system where your character sheet was 11 pages long (double-sided).
