Nowhere else in his list of "rude, ignorant people" does he mention ethnicity or race. Odd, isn't it?

Was the "mean looking drunk" black? Or "the machine operator" Jewish? Perhaps the "animal rights activist" had ancestors that came from Spain? Doesn't matter, you say? Exactly. So identifying two violent drunks as "native Indians" is totally unnecessary, unless one is attempting to say something about Indians as a group, and I can't believe that Graeme meant to do that.

### Lisa's "a bit too young!"

Dear John

Despite the implied bombardment embodied in the cover for the September BCSFAzine, I think the responses to Lisa's article inside are quite moderate in tone and well reasoned.

I think the Graeme's reference to the Speer poll of fannish intellect shouldn't be taken to mean that this is how it was only in the old days. My experience with fandom, mostly at long distance range of course, is that fanzine fans remain somewhat more potent in their thinking ability than the average person in the mundane population. But I doubt that such superiority for fans is present to an appreciable extent in some of the subfandoms that have sprung up around science fiction fandom, or among the many fans whose activity consists solely of attending conventions, not running conventions or participating in the programming. Obviously, there are exceptions to the general rule that fanzine fans are a bit brighter than most other groups but I'm not going to be thrown out of fandom at my advanced age as a result of naming names in this respect.

And there is also the consideration that I've met only a minority of the people in today's fanzine fandom. Maybe some

of those I admire for their writing or thinking abilities would disappoint me with their behaviour if I spent a few days with them.

In the article in this issue, Lisa impresses me as being a bit too young to take refuge in fiction written long ago when she feels in the mood to read fantasy or science fiction. I'm 76 and might be excused if I get excited over acquiring almost 30 SFBC volumes in perfect condition for a pittance at Goodwill Industries recently because they are all from the 1970's when some golden age authors were still turning out new books. But even in my condition of resistance to what's new, I can appreciate the merits of some active writers of science fiction: Bujold, Niven, Card, and tentatively Robinson because all the good things I've read about the Mars books make me certain I'll enjoy them as soon as I can find copies that are compatible with a retirement budget.

Maybe the most horrifying thing that the Blair Witch Project has produced is what it has done to the good people of Burkittsville. This is the very small town about 20 miles from Hagerstown where the creators of the Blair Witch pretend there was everything that they made up for their cheapskate movie. All the people of Burkittsville want to do is continue to live the placid lives they enjoy in this town far from the interstates and shopping centres and giant subdivision developments. Instead they've been pestered for months by people who come from far and near to see for themselves the area where the movie producers situated their fictitious witch and vanished journalists and supernatural manifestations and all the rest. Some of these visitors apparently still don't believe that TV Guide was misled into thinking the film was based on real events when it published its first items about the telecast of the movie.

I hope the Toronto Star article cited by Lloyd Penney was correct in its intimation that science fiction on inferior television airings might be headed for a black hole. It happens to westerns on television and it could eventually happen to space operas, perhaps opening up time slots for an occasional first-rate movie or series with science fiction themes.

Sometimes real life can throw you a curve ball and you just give up, while I just bat them out of the park.

## Doctor Who: More Good News, Bad News.

### Bad News "WhoFans".

HBO has passed on the new Dr. Who series for next fall. It was close though. *The Doctor* was tied for the last of six one hour time slots in HBO's Family Time with the reality series Families and had the support three of the six supporting corporations. However the corporations went with the cheaper reality series. (Note: The other eight hours are to be filled with three Classic Family Movies and the two hour long weekly crime prevention series America's Teens Fighting Back.) Basically Family Time is, for now, only a concept. If the view-

ers do not tune in to these programs and subscriptions to **HBO** drop, they will bring back the blood and gore. So, it makes sense to go for productions budgeted between \$167,000 and \$334,000(US) until the concept takes flight. (Note: "Family Time's" three dramatic series are cofunded by a three way partnership deal, putting them into the \$1,000,000 (US) perepisode range.) The Dr. Who budget was set at \$500,000 (US) per-episode, (Note: The other \$500,000 (US) would have come from the BBC and other partners in a five way

deal, which would have put **Dr. Who** into the \$1,000,000 (US) per-episode range.) but

it was just too much too soon.

### The Good News

*The Doctor* will return in one form or another.

Form 1: If HBO's Family Time takes off, the pay channel could consider picking up Dr. Who for a January 2002 debut, with 19 or 20, 50 minute episodes per-season for three years with options for two more. Actor (and Novelist) Stephen Fry (Backer III and Wilde) is rumoured to be playing *The Doctor* with three companions, one a freshly regenerated *Romana* while the

others are a man and woman whose backgrounds are

unknown at this time. Another well know ally to return is *U.N.I.T.* (Now standing for United Nations International Task-force) that the **TARDIS**' crew helps out when they are on near-future Earth. The **TARDIS** itself will have a very Victorian interior while still having the very familiar 1939 London Police Call

Box exterior.

However there could be a few strings attached with this plan. One of the "supporting" corporations (Hilton Hotels) said it wants to have some kind of content control over all series with the **HBO**'s **Family Time** label. Rumours say that both the BBC and the series producers are displeased with this idea.

Form 2: A \$50,000,000 (US) **Dr. Who** feature film for summer 2002 release. On October 4th, a production and casting report from the BBC listed that the film's development is in the early script stages with the earliest possible production starting date at the end of 2000, in the UK, with Impact Films' producer Jeremy Bolt and BBC Films' executive producer David Thompson at the controls. Rumours say The Doctor could be played by actor Patrick Stewart (Star Trek: the Next Generation.) (Word is that Stewart is delighted at the chance of playing a role that he tried out for back in 1974 that in the end went to Tom Baker). Sorry no word on who the companion(s) will be or anything else on the movie concept at this time. So, to use a pun, "Who Knows?"




One thing that is known is that the BBC will be making some sort of announcement on **Dr. Who**'s future on November 13th. Many BBC insiders are saying they are going with the feature film version, knowing that it could lead to a new TV series without any strings.

As for the series filmed in part in Vancouver (or Toronto), that is still a rumour, but while on this topic, I think it would be great. As Harry Warner, JR. pointed out in BCSFAzine 317, the magic of the Tom Baker era was the story telling and not the sets. Myself can't recall seeing any sets that can't be the Burrard generating plant, Triumph, a BC Ferry's engine room, Pacific Spirit Park, UBC, SFU, the Petro Canada refinery or any gravel pit in the Lower Mainland or the Fraser Valley (or southern Ontario.). It would even be nice if the episodes were set in North America and have Vancouver as its backdrop. Just imagine, *The Doctor* or the companions driving across the Alex Fraser Bridge, walking in Stanley Park or travelling back in time to the 19th century having Border Town, or Gastown, or parts of downtown New Westminster or Victoria as a set. The inactive C.F.B. in Chilliwack could even be used as U.N.I.T.'s North American headquarters. The good news here, with a series like Mysterious Island on some of the proposed producers' resumes, chances are we'll be seeing a lots of location shooting mixed with great storytelling wherever **Dr. Who** is filmed. Still, in my heart of hearts it would be nice to see the **TARDIS** back in its native Great Britain.

That is all for this time, so be seeing you.

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## LETTER FROM HELSINKI

n my previous two columns, I've been discussing the near-term future of mobile communications, and focusing a bit on the inte gration of mobile phones with the Internet.

At the moment, work is also being done on many other aspects of mobile and wireless communications. As a matter of fact, it's fairly hard to keep up with all the developments and do one's own work also.

One development is the so-called wireless LANs (local area networks), which allow one to use one's laptop computer anywhere in a building, such as an office or an airport, that's been wired with such a LAN. The data traffic runs over infrared or radio. Apple (www.apple.com) now has a product called the AirPort, which is a wireless LAN for the home.

Mobile telephony and associated services (such as WAP, which I talked about in the previous column) is the layer of mobility with the widest footprint. Next in line are going to be wireless LANs. A new technology called Bluetooth provides the smallest mobile footprint: mobility in a small, personal space. Bluetooth-enabled devices

in close proximity to one another will be able to transfer data among themselves using weak radio signals. This will make it possible, for instance, to synchronise the data between your mobile phone, or personal digital assistant (PDA), and your PC; or to transfer pictures from a digital camera onto a TV screen all without wires. Or, when you come home, your mobile phone might automatically notice that it's

within communication range of the fixed-line phone, and then convert itself to a handset slaved to the fixed phone, so the calls you make on the mobile will now be cheaper. HomeRF is another technology with a similar idea.

Third-generation mobile phones will be able to provide location-based services: if you have your mobile on, you'll be able to know exactly where you are. Combined with WAP and/or other technologies, you could be able to find out quickly, for instance, where the nearest petrol station is, or the closest Thai restaurants, and then make a call to reserve a table.

Of course, all this development is driven by hope of profits in a marketplace to be worth billions of smackeroos, and the competition is tough. No one company can hope to do everything themselves, and the very nature of the business — communications — forces them to cooperate to an extent, in drafting standards, testing for interoperability, etc. Thus, we have industry consortiums such as Bluetooth (www.bluetooth.com), WAP (www.wapforum.org), OSGI (www.osgi.org), HomeRF (www.homerf.org), etc.

All these different standards will no doubt cause confusion: how will they work together? Are some of them going to disappear from the marketplace, making devices incorporating them worthless? Perhaps in ten years or so it'll be clearer who the winners and losers are going to be.

In these days, of course, there is one huge gorilla of a company trying to dominate in anything to do with bits: Microsoft. Its traditional area of dominance has been the PC, but it's trying to get into mobile computing as well. Here its going has been tougher, because it faces companies that have a lot more experience than it does in telecommunications, and alliances such as the WAP Forum which do not intend to let Microsoft (www.spawn-of-hell.com) dominate other markets in the way it dominates the PC operating system market. Microsoft has been trying to push its Windows operating system into small devices such as mobiles and PDAs, but the poor quality of the

so-called WindowsCE OS has meant that it hasn't had too much success. Let us hope than consumers will not be hoodwinked a second time into getting locked into an inferior, closed standard.

Another industry grouping called Symbian (www.symbian.com) has been formed to promote an operating system called EPOC, developed by a British company called Psion, for PDAs. As Symbian's shareholders include, in addition to Psion, the four largest mobile phone manufacturers — Nokia, Motorola, Ericsson and Matsushita — EPOC's future seems fairly assured.

Another technology that could prove to be important in and around wireless communications is Jini. It's supposed to become a sort of a universal secret handshake among electronic devices. It enables devices that come to contact with one another (perhaps by being plugged in, or perhaps just by being in proximity of one another, for instance through Bluetooth radio technology) to exchange information, offer their services to one another (you can print my files, and I can connect to the Internet for you), and do their thing — all without

any configuration needed from the user. Jini one of

the neatest technological ideas I've heard about in a while. It's yet another brainchild of Bill Joy, the technological genius of Sun Microsystems (www.sun.com). More on Jini: www.sun.com/jini. An interview with Bill Joy about Jini and other stuff: www.wired.com/news/news/technology/story/ 13744.html.

There's something called the Oxygen system, a research project at MIT's Media Lab, which is aimed at making connected, wireless technology easier to use. I haven't had time to look into it more closely, but there's a series of articles on it in Scientific American, at www.sciam.com/1999/0899issue/0899dertousos.html.

Twenty or thirty years ago, satellite technology seemed like the big thing in wireless communications. Certainly it's important, and we now have phone conversations and TV programs across continents partly thanks to satellite technology, but in recent times, sats have not been at the forefront of wireless and mobile developments. Witness the fortunes of Iridium (www.iridium.com), a globe-spanning satellite phone system, which could not get nearly enough customers to pay its steep debts, run up by putting dozens of satellites in orbit. In the ten years that Iridium has been in development, groundbased mobile communications technology has driven past it. Nowadays, few people want to pay exorbitant amounts to talk to a brick which can't even operate indoors. Besides, Inmarsat already has a similar service, using a much smaller number of geosynchronous satellites.

There are two other similar ventures, ICO (www.ico.com) and Constellation (www.cciglobal.com). ICO isn't doing too great either. Constellation hasn't launched its services yet, but it's slated to offer data communications in addition to telephone traffic.

In addition to three receipt books, a large wad of blank checks and a bag full of receipts, I was given \$105 Canadian in cash. Out of that, I appropriated \$53 in order to return Robert Kalthoff's artwork via Federal Express. There were also two deposit-only bank cards inside the bag. These, I turned in to the Canada Trust Branch on W10th and ordered the remaining one I was unable to locate to be cancelled.

'm sure you've been asking yourself, "what's Terry Gilliam doing these days?" I've sure been asking it anyway. The expython who gave us such brilliant films as Brazil, The Adventures Of Baron Munchhausen and Time Bandits has for the last few years being working as a directorfor-hire for studio projects (such as The Fisher King, 12 Monkeys and Fear And Loathing In Las Vagas). Now, Gillaim is finally putting a new independent productions together. The Man Who Killed Don Quixote will be a time travel story starring Johnny Depp as the time-traveller and French actor Jean Rochefort is the main candidate for the role of the famous windmill-charging madman. Apparently Quixote recruits Depp's character to be Sancho Panza! Cool. This production is ready to go, once Gilliam raises all the necessary cash. Some investors recently pulled out of this production; so the set release date of Autumn 2000 may have to be re-worked. Depp has certainly become a popular actor among directors of fantasy/ SF films.

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Not much new to report with the **Battlestar Galactica** film projects. However there is some new stuff on the net. One of the special effects artists from Richard Hatch's BG Promo Trailer has put some images of his work there on his personal web page. Check out the URL www.members.aol.com/raymar3d/page/index.htm for those pics and some other info relating to Rayar3d's involvement on the project. Meanwhile Hatch's own web page www.battlestargalactica.com now has some stills from the trailer and some behind-the-scene shots as well.

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It seems that The Buffy Man Josh Whedon's work on the X-Men film is not being used, except for a couple of minor contributions. This comes as bad news to me; Whedon seemed to be the only person brought onto the production with an honest interest in comic books. You can read Whedon sounding off at www.buffy.com.

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Highlander: World Without End is in

Development from Dimension Films. Should we care? Probably not considering that Highlander II was one of the worst movies ever made and Highlander III was even worse. Still, the first movie was good, as was the TV series for a while. Highlander: World Without End stars both Adrian Paul (from the series) as Duncan MacLeod and Christopher Lambert (from the movies) as Connor MacLeod. Gregory Widen who brought us the first three movies and the series has written the screenplay but has handed the directing chores over to Doug Arnowkowski. The crew are shooting in Romania and then will move on to Paris, Scotland and New York to finish off. The actors are said to be in intense training for the most dramatic sword-fighting scenes of any Highlander production. Note: the name of this production is expected to change along the way. There may be no plans for a North American theatrical release but this series is huge in Europe. All the immortal poop you need can be found at www.highlander-official.com.

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In a previous movie-mania I reported that **Darren Aronofsky**, the man behind the bizarre and acclaimed fantasy **PI** was to direct **Proteus**, the SF-action story about a U.S. submarine that battles the Germans as well as a mysterious sea monster, during WWII. The Proteus project is now in limbo and Aranofsky has been considering doing a live-action version of *Aeon Flux*, MTV's late-night SF animation series. Certainly not a done-deal yet but looking promising; I'd love to see this project fly. Aronofsky's next film, **Req**-

uiem for a Dream, is not an SF or fantasy film, but rather concerns New York heroin addicts.

**Wormtongue**. Also, an unknown actor named **Andy Serkis** as the voice of **Gollum**. Filming began October 11.

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October 29 brings the North American release of Hayao Miyazaki's Princess Mononoke, the most expensive animated feature of all time. Originally released in Japan in 1997 (as Mononoke Hibe) by **Studio Ghibli** this film has become the second highest grossing film in Japanese history (behind Titanic). The popular and critical acclaim that has surrounded this picture has lead Dimension/Miramax (who are part of the Disney empire) to arrange for an English language edition with dialogue written by Neil Gaiman. The English edition will feature voices performed by Billy Crudup, Claire Danes, Minnie Driver, Billy Bob Thornton, Gillian Anderson, Jada Pinkett-Smith, John DiMaggio, John DeMita and Keith David. Anderson (who voices the Wold God) and Crudup (the Prince) have been getting big-time rave reviews for their work on this picture.

Interest in this film should be much broader than with most Anime. **Princess Mononoke** uses full animation, not the hack-and-slash animation used by the vast majority of Japanese animated films. The level of detail has been compared to the best work of Disney, the art direction and shot composition is said to be no less than stunning. **Hayao Miyazaki** is generally considered to be more than just an animator, but one of Japan's finest film-makers. **Princess Mononoke** offers us eye-candy that meets or surpasses anything



Disney has given us in recent years, with an adult storyline and no bad songs!

The story is a fantasy, set in the Muromachi Era of Medieval Japan. Prince Ashitaka, the hero is infested by demons, passed on to him from the Boar God who has also been afflicted. Fated to die, the Prince sets out on a journey through Japan, seeking the source of what afflicted him, and and to find a cure. Along his journey he meets an evil monk, an ambitious noblewoman, the spirits of the forest, and a beautiful girl raised by wolves. Around him the tensions between nature and the growing cities and farms of civilization cause an imbalance and a restlessness among the animal gods of nature. Ashitaka finds himself amidst a fierce battle where he struggles to find a path of coexistence between the animal inhabitants of the forest and an iron mining town that is exploiting and killing the forest.

**Princess Mononoke** is intended for mature audiences and has scenes of violence.

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Also due out very shortly is **Dogma**, a religious fantasy from **Kevin Smith**, the maker of **Clerks** and **Chasing Amy.** The current release date is November 12. The plot? Two renegade angels (**Matt Damon** and **Ben Afflick**) who have been barred from heaven (and sent to live in Wisconsin instead) find a way to get back in without God's permission. However, by doing so they

will cause the end of the world. **Linda Fiorentino** plays the woman who's out to stop them, with the help of two holy men (**Jason Mewes** and Kevin Smith). Also starring **Chris Rock**, **Alan Rickman**, **Selma Hayek** (playing a dancing girl, again), **Jason Lee**, **Janeane Garafalo**, **George Carlin** and many others in cameo roles.

Kevin Smith wrote this script before he made his first film (Clerks) and I'm not surprised that he had trouble selling it; Hollywood isn't usually big on 'religious comedy'. Word from people who've seen the final cut is that this film is sure to offend. Dogma features a black thirteenth apostle, rocker Alanis Morissette as God, the missing chapters from the Bible chronicling Jesus' adolescence and his problems at home, a monster made of shit and Angels on a killing spree! Mirimax Pictures was originally going to distribute this film but was forced by Disney, who own Mirimax, to drop it. The film has apparently added a thinly-disguised "attack" on Disney within the story. As an aside, much of the film takes place in Sherman, Illinois, the town where director John Hughes set his 80's teen comedies like Sixteen Candles and the Breakfast Club. Apparently Hughes was a big influence on Smith.

I wasn't going to cover this film originally, but it is a fantasy and there is quite a buzz around it. Beyond Garafalo and Rickman there aren't many people that I like associated with this picture, but I'm curious. Preview audiences have had mixed responses, mostly calling the movie uneven, sloppy and naming some actors for bad performances; but very few complained about the religious content. At the Cannes Film Festival however, the film was handed very harsh criticism from almost everyone. Many Catholic and Baptist groups are planning on protesting the film. Original screenings of this film were close to three hours, but it's slated to clock at two hours and ten minutes. Smith has been editing and re-editing this film since January.

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I confess that I have a weakness for any movie that involves animals killing and eating people. It doesn't matter how bad the movie is; I'll find it watchable. I missed the theatrical run of Lake Placid, this past summer but managed to catch Deep Blue Sea. Next up is Bats from Dimension Films due out December 22, maybe sooner. Bats stars Lou Diamond Philips (wow, has his stock ever fallen), Dana Meyer (the other chick in Starship Troopers) and an actor named Leon whole only screen credit I can locate is the TV prison series Oz. The director is Louis Morneau and the screenplay is by John Logan. The story is bats killing people. Lots of bats. Check out Bat's very cool web page at www.batsthemovie.com.
