

EDITORIAL

However, I am greatly saddened to read the following news item provided to *Mike Glyer* of FILE 770 by **Diane** Lacey:

"Montreal fan Ann Methe succumbed to cancer October 5.

Leading Canadian sf writer *Robert J. Sawyer* saluted her on Twitter as "one of Canada's great science-fiction convention runners." Methe was past chair of Con*Cept, formerly run by the MonSFFA. She won an Aurora Award in 1999 for her work on Con*Cept and was nominated two other times. She also worked on the 2009 Montreal Worldcon, Anticipation, as a hotel liaison.

She is survived by her husband, artist Jean-Pierre Normand."

I met Ann in the Hospitality suite at VCON 36 when Jean-Pierre was Artist Guest of Honour. She was delightful to speak with. She will live on in the memory of all who knew her I am certain. R.I.P.

CANVENTION 34 AURORA AWARD CEREMONY AT VCON 39

The winners of the <u>2014 Prix Aurora Awards</u> were announced at Canvention 34/VCON 39 on October 4 in Vancouver. A total of 172 ballots were cast and the voting and nomination statistics are available <u>here</u>.

Clifford Samuels, President of CSFFA (Canadian Science Fiction and Fantasy Association – the Aurora Award Admin people) presided as primary host, introducing the individual presenters in turn as they came to the podium to read the list of nominees for a given category and then tore open the envelope to reveal the winner.

Normally the Auroras are listed in publications beginning with "Best English Novel" first, but here the list of awards is printed in the actual order of their presentation:

Best Fan Related Work (72 ballots) Robert Runté, "Why I Read Canadian Speculative Fiction: The Social Dimension of Reading", Scholar Keynote Address at ACCSFF '13, Toronto

Best Fan Music (104 ballots) Chris Hadfield for his performance of *Space Oddity*

Best Artist (119 ballots) Erik Mohr, cover art for ChiZine Publications

Best English Related Work (130 ballots) *On Spec* published by the Copper Pig Writers' Society

Best English Graphic Novel (75 ballots) *Rock, Paper, Cynic* by Peter Chiykowski, webcomic

Best English Poem/Song (82 ballots) "Night Journey: West Coast" by Eileen Kernaghan, *Tesseracts Seventeen: Speculating Canada from Coast to Coast to Coast, EDGE*

Best English Short Fiction (123 ballots) "Ghost in the Machine" by Ryan McFadden, *The Puzzle Box*, EDGE

Best English YA Novel (118 ballots) *The Rising* by Kelley Armstrong, Doubleday Canada

Best English Novel (155 ballots) *A Turn of Light* by Julie E. Czerneda, DAW Books A special recognition Aurora Award also was given to Frank Johnson for producing the Aurora awards for the past 23 years. Frank created the design in 1991. A new design will be unveiled in 2015.




CANVENTION 34 CSFFA HALL OF FAME INDUCTEES

<u>NEW YA GENRE IMPRINT TO BE LAUNCHED</u> (Source: Burnaby Writers Newsletter Sept/Oct 2014)

Toronto-based indie publisher **CHIZINE PUBLICATIONS**, <u>chizinepub.com/</u> which publishes a variety of dark science fiction, fantasy and horror, is launching a YA imprint, **ChiTeen**. ChiZine co-owner and co-publisher *Sandra Kasturi* told PW that initially the plan is to publish four YA titles each year and gradually build on that, in the same the way that *ChiZine's l*ist has grown overall since it was established in 2008. In recent years, though, its growth rate has been faster than she and co-publisher (and husband) *Brett Savory* anticipated, she said. ChiZine has doubled its output since 2011 and now publishes about 25 titles each year.

ChiTeen books will be geared for a variety of ages. **The Door in the Mountain** by *Caitlin Sweet*, which will be published in May 2015 in Canada, is for older teens and "may veer into the new adult arena," according to Kasturi. The other spring title **The Floating Boy and the Girl Who Couldn't Fly** by *P.T. Jones*, will likely appeal to younger teens 13 to 15, or even tweens, she added. Both of those titles will publish in October 2015 in the U.S. A third, **Dead Girls Don't** by *Mags Storey*, will be released in October 2015 in Canada but as a spring book for the U.S.

But Kasturi and Savory also have plans for ChiZine to grow in other directions. They have just launched an ebook only line, **CZPeBook**. **ChiGraphic**, a graphic novel imprint with three to four titles per year is also slated to launch in spring 2015, And in 2017, there are plans to launch **ChiDunnit** for mysteries and noir titles.

The Copper Cylinder Award is an annual member's choice award selected by members of the Sunburst Award Society for books published during the previous year.



The winner of the 2014 Copper Cylinder Young Adult Award is Homeland by Cory Doctorow (Tom Doherty Associates – IS



Toronto, Ontario (October 1st, 2014) The Sunburst Award Committee is pleased to announce that the winner of its 2014 adult award is A Tale for the Time Being by Ruth Ozeki (Penguin Group Canada - ISBN -9780670067046) and the winner of its 2014 young adult award is The Cats of Tanglewood Forest by Charles de Lint (Little Brown Books - ISBN - 9780316053570).



About A Tale for the Time Being, the Sunburst jury said: Cast ashore on Vancouver Island by the Pacific Gyre, a Hello Kitty lunchbox opens upon an ocean of story, connecting Ruth and Nao across space and time. Some books flirt with the fantastic, Ozeki's dances with it, such that it weaves through the narrative with sinuous grace, embracing evanescence. As Nao declares to the reader at the outset, "You're my kind of time being, and together we'll make magic." All matters therein are given equal weight, yet the novel has a deft touch, often humorous. It is a seriously playful work. A Tale for the **Time Being** is sui generis, free ranging over fact and fancy, physics and metaphysics, the intimate and the universal; in a true sense it is a Zen koan extended to 422 pages, which is

yet another paradox. Like the bumblebee, it shouldn't fly but it does. Beautifully.



About The Cats of Tanglewood Forest, the Sunburst Jury said: A deceptively simple wish-fulfillment fantasy, The Cats of Tanglewood Forest draws upon the deep tradition of animal fables and fairy tales, upon the folklore of New World and Old, and upon the classic children's literature of the past two centuries, but distilled into pure de Lint, faithful to its sources yet shaped by his own sensibilities. An enhancement rather than expansion of A Circle of Cats, the collaboration of writer and artist produces a fusion of word and image into a seamless whole, delighting the eye anew with the turning of each page. There are darker tones, to be sure, as snake-bite carries young Lillian past the jaws of death to the tribe of cat, and the magic of the deep wood that restores her humanity will come at a cost, and a debt owed. But that's what a good fable is, timeless yet always

cognisant of time's passage.

The winners receive a cash prize of \$1,000 as well as a medallion which incorporates the Sunburst logo. The Sunburst Award takes its name from the debut novel of the late **Phyllis Gotlieb**, one of the first published authors of contemporary Canadian speculative fiction.

JUDGES APPOINTED FOR THE 2015 FRIENDS OF THE MERRIL COLLECTION SHORT STORY CONTEST

The three Final Panel Judges for the 2014/2015 *Friends of the Merril Short Story Contest* are Leah Bobet, Julie Czerneda, and Caitlin Sweet.



Leah Bobet's first novel, Above, was nominated for the 2012 Andre Norton Award and the 2013 Aurora Award, and her short fiction has appeared in several Year's Best anthologies and as part of online serial Shadow Unit. She is the publisher and editor of speculative quarterly Ideomancer Speculative Fiction and works as a bookseller at Bakka-Phoenix Books, Canada's oldest science fiction bookstore. Her second novel will appear from Clarion Books/Houghton Mifflin Harcourt in 2015.



Since 1997, Canadian author/editor Julie E. Czerneda has poured her love of biology into SF novels published by DAW Books NY. A Finalist for the John W. Campbell Award (Best New Writer), as well as for the Philip K. Dick Award (Distinguished Science Fiction), and nominated for several Nebulas, she has won the Prix Aurora Award (Canada's Hugo) in three categories: Best Long-form (In the Company of Others), Best Short-form ("Left Foot on a Blind Man"), and Best Work (Other) for her anthologies (Space Inc. and, with Jana Paniccia, Under Cover of Darkness.) Her work on the use of science fiction to develop scientific literacy lead to the publication of the **Tales from the Wonder Zone** anthology series, winner of the 2002 Special Award for Science & Technology Education from the Golden Duck Committee, with the most recent, **Polaris: In Celebration of the International Polar Year** becoming the first work of science fiction to win the 2007 Canadian Science Writers Association's Award (Best Science in Society for Youth). Julie has fifteen novels and fifteen anthologies in print, as well as numerous short stories.

Her latest release is the epic fantasy **A Turn of Light**, set in the valley of Marrowdell, itself based in large part on early pioneer settlements. There are house toads as well as dragons, and not all is what it seems. Julie continues to be active in the SF/F community, conducting workshops and appearing at conventions. She served as Toastmaster for the 2009 Worldcon in Montreal and will be GOH at Chattacon 2015, in Tennessee.

Coming fall 2014: **Species Imperative**, the 10th anniversary omnibus edition of her acclaimed SF trilogy, and **A Play of Shadow**, sequel to **Turn** and next in what is now the five book "**Night's Edge**" series. Julie's back to science fiction again, hard at work on **This Gulf of Time and Stars**, first volume of the concluding trilogy to her **Clan Chronicles** series (Reunification), <u>www.czerneda.com</u> for more.



<u>Caitlin Sweet</u> has been a writer since she was seven and her grade two teacher informed her that her stories were "too long." Since then, she has been a trombone teacher, a bookstore clerk, an ESL instructor in Mexico and Canada, an administrative assistant at the University of Toronto, a stay-at-home mother and a labour doula. Now she works full time for the Ontario government and part time for the University of Toronto's School of Continuing Studies.

Caitlin is the author of **A Telling of Stars** (2003) and its prequel, **The Silences of Home** (2005), both published by Penguin Canada and both nominated for a variety of awards. "**To Play the Game of Men**," her one and only short story, appeared in 2009 in the Ages of Wonder anthology. Her third novel, **The Pattern Scars**, was published by ChiZine Publications in November 2011. It too was nominated for some awards, including the 2012 CBC Bookie for Speculative Fiction, which it won. Her re-telling of Beauty and the Beast via Minoan Crete, **The Door in the Mountain**, was released in June 2014, and she's now scrambling to finish its sequel for release in fall 2015.

GHOST STORY AWARDS LAUNCHED (Source: Burnaby Writers Newsletter Sept/Oct 2014)

Announcing new annual awards devoted to the classic ghost story tradition. Three stalwarts of the classic ghost story have combined to launch new awards for the best ghost story and the best ghost story collection each year. The journals **Ghosts & Scholars** and **Supernatural Tales** and the literary society **A Ghostly Company** will jointly sponsor the awards. The winners will be chosen by votes of their readers and embers. The term 'ghost story' is intended to be understood broadly, to mean any supernatural motif. The classic exponents of the field did not always write about ghosts, but also about a wide range of other uncanny entities, and sometimes left room for doubt too. The awards will cover new stories in a similar range. The awards are for short stories and short story collections or anthologies. The first awards will be made in 2015 for stories and books first published in English in print and paper form in 2014.

MAN BOOKER PRIZE COULD SOME DAY BE YOURS by Spider Robinson.

The shortlist nominees for the prestigious Man Booker Prize have just been announced. Since this is the first year American authors have been eligible, there was some concern that America would swamp the nominations. This turned out to be unjustified: only two Americans made the six-book final ballot.

But one of them is a colleague of ours, **Karen Joy Fowler**—described in wikipedia as "a writer of science fiction, fantasy, and literary fiction." Her first novel, **Sarah Canary**, was deliberately written to "to read like a science fiction novel to a science fiction reader" and "like a mainstream novel to a mainstream reader." Her best-selling novel **The Jane Austen Book Club** was made into a movie of the same name.

She has been nominated for the Man Booker for her most recent novel, **We Are All Beside Ourselves**, which won the Pen/Faulkner Award for 2014, and has been nominated for a Nebula Award. It is about a young woman raised with a chimpanzee as her sister.

You realize what this means. From now on, we SF writers are all eligible for a Man Booker. Which comes with 50,000 quid! The only previous fantasy novel to win—if you consider it fantasy—is **Yan Martell**'s 2002 novel **The Life of Pi**.

According to Wikipedia, "The selection process for the winner of the prize commences with the formation of an advisory committee which includes a writer, two publishers, a literary agent, a bookseller, a librarian, and a chairperson appointed by the Booker Prize Foundation. The advisory committee then selects the judging panel, the membership of which changes each year, although on rare occasions a judge may be selected a second time. Judges are selected from amongst leading literary critics, writers, academics and leading public figures."

The winner is usually announced at a ceremony in London's Guildhall, usually in early October."

In 1970, Bernice Rubens became the first woman—and the second person—to win the Booker.

Good luck to Karen!

CWILA's Critic-in-residence 2015

The Residency

CWILA supports a female/transgender/genderqueer writer (poet, novelist, storyteller, scholar) based in Canada as its resident critic for a calendar year. The aim of the residency is to foster criticism that promotes public awareness of women's literary and critical presence in Canadian and Québécois letters. Specifically, the Critic in Residence works on critical essays and/or book reviews and submits them to one or more Canadian review venues (print and web). This work is also archived by CWILA and becomes available through its website following publication elsewhere, copyright permitting. The Critic in Residence is encouraged to support a climate of critical responsiveness in Canadian letters through a collaborative or community-based project of their choice. In addition, the Critic in Residence will comment on the results of the annual Count in a public forum. The residency is virtual, so the writer is free to work from home. The Critic in Residence will finish the term by submitting a dossier summarizing the work done while in residence. The deadline for submission of the essay or reviews to CWILA is December 31st of the year of the residency. At this time, the writer also provides documentation that the pieces have been submitted to other publications.

Application Criteria:

Applications should include a short letter of intent (max. 2 pages) describing the project or projects the applicant wishes to undertake, and the venue or venues to which they plan to submit, a two-page CV, and a short sample of critical work (25 pages max.). CWILA (Canadian Women in the Literary Arts) is an inclusive national literary organization for people who share feminist values and see the importance of strong and active female perspectives and presences within the Canadian literary landscape.

CWILA was founded in 2012 by poet and essayist Gillian Jerome in response to an online conversation on gender representation in Canadian literary reviews started by poet and critic Sina Queyras on her blog Lemon Hound and continued by poet Natalie Zina Walschots on her blog www.nataliezed.ca. The conversation expanded to women active in various literary communities across the country, calling for a discursive space to address the politics of representation, the critical reception of women's writing and the ways in which we can foster stronger critical communities of women of all ages and ethnicities, including genderqueer writers and Indigenous writers.

CWILA continues the path set by the US organization VIDA, founded in 2009 "to address the need for female writers of literature to engage in conversations regarding the critical reception of women's creative writing in our current culture." VIDA conducts an annual project "to count the rates of publication between women and men in many of our writing world's most respected literary outlets." None of the literary outlets counted by VIDA are Canadian.

In June 2012, CWILA launched findings from its first Count, documenting the rates at which men and women were published and reviewed in 14 Canadian literary publications in 2011. Within 24 hours the website went viral, with over 8,000 unique visitors in the first month. The 2011 Count received media coverage from national and international media outlets, including The Guardian, The Globe and Mail, The Montreal Gazette, The Capilano Review, Room, Jacket2, Lemon Hound and Quill & Quire.

In order to begin to address the gender gap in Canadian review culture as revealed by the Count, CWILA created the position of <u>Critic-In-Residence</u> (CIR) and funded it by donations raised through social media. Throughout 2013, inaugural CWILA Critic-in-Residence <u>Sue Sinclair</u> published reviews in the National Post, Arc Poetry Magazine, Winnipeg Review and Canadian Literature. She also led a community-based project in partnership with the Atwater Reading Series in Montreal.

In 2013, the second annual CWILA Count was conducted, expanding from 14 publications to 25 to provide greater regional inclusion. A genderqueer metric was added to account for individuals who identify outside the gender binary, and a new Canadian metric determined the number of Canadian writers represented. The <u>findings of the 2012 Count</u> were published in July 2013, and again CWILA received media coverage in Quill & Quire, National Post, THIS Magazine, Globe and Mail, Winnipeg Free Press, Arc Poetry Magazine and rabble.ca. To date, CWILA's findings have been discussed in over 40 articles internationally.

In December of 2013, <u>Shannon Webb-Campbell</u> was selected as CWILA's 2014 Critic-in-Residence. Over the course of her residency, Webb-Campbell has published reviews and interviews in The National Post, Telegraph Journal, The Coast and Plenitude Magazine. She was also the recipient of the 2014 "Out in Print" Literary Award.

In 2014, CWILA conducted its third annual Count of Books reviews and published the results in September. The 2013 Count, which received funding assistance from the Canada Council for the Arts, expanded from 25 publications for 2012 to 31 publications (to include the French literary community and a broader regional representation), resulting in 82% more reviews than the 2012 Count.

CWILA now has over 400 paid members consisting of some of Canada's most prominent writers and academics





That is the opening paragraph of my new novel, *King Of The Planet*, now available at The Kindle Store and Amazon. Finally I am working harder at getting my writing out there. *King Of The Planet* is *Gulliver's Travels* meets *Star Wars* by way of *Game Of Thrones*, with a hefty Kafka overlay.

I started this novel a little over two months ago, committed to produce a new chapter each week. The original chapters are on my Facebook homepage, along with the new chapters I write each week. I've had a lot of fun working each week on a new chapter filled with jokes, plot twists and relevant references. Hopefully it is as much fun to read as it is to write. I could write more describing *King Of The Planet*, but as you can see from the opening paragraph, the novel speaks for itself and opens its mouth pretty fast.

What you get for \$4.99 plus tax are the first nine chapters, edited & all polished up real nice. That is a cheap deal for 20,000+ words of word play, political jokes, relevant allusions and the creation of a complete fantasy world. Also, there be dragons!

We pay 8 cents per word for first **worldwide** rights and for nonexclusive reprint rights. Additionally, we reserve the right to pay you more money for additional reprinting in themed Daily Science Fiction anthologies.

First publication sounds simple, but in today's fractured fiction market it is anything but. Here's what we mean by first worldwide rights: Your story will be distributed by email to our (free) subscription list, it will then be available on the website, via RSS, eventually through kindle and iphone/ipad (the "issue" consisting of all stories published during its calendar month), and as archived on the DailyScienceFiction.com website. The nonexclusive reprint rights are anticipated to apply to the omnibus volume of DSF's stories for one year. For these anthologies, payment will be 5 cents per word.

Not So Helpful Hints

- We need short short fiction, especially flash fiction. Among our featured stories, a shorter tale will get an extra nudge on the scale when weighed against a longer one. This is both for financial reasons and because it matches the preferences of a plurality of our readership. Not fair? Perhaps. Consider yourself forewarned.
- Of course, we want your stories to ooze originality, but a well-written story is a must. We are fond of character-driven fiction, though readers point out that not every story we publish fits that rubric. Our goal is to publish the best stories we can that will be interesting, worthwhile reads. Some stories, especially in the short fiction, will succeed despite lack of plot, character, punctuation, what-have-you.

Guns a-blazing might make our day, but we don't suspect most military SF will win us over. Humor? We take it, it often works especially for short short fiction, but do keep in mind that one alien's funny bone is located near another species' sac of indifference. We're likely not your best market for longer funny tales.
- We don't accept multiple or simultaneous submissions, but we promise to be as prompt as possible with our responses. Query if you haven't heard back in four weeks. Or better yet, check your story's status on this website. There is now a "check status" option on the sidebar.
- PS We'd like to emphasize that guidelines aren't worth the paper they're printed on (which in this case is no paper at all). Splurge for a free email subscription, or if you can't afford free, browse the archives here on the website. Read, and get a feel for what Daily Science Fiction publishes. We always want new and different work, of course, but you can get a real tactile sense of this or any other publication only by reading it.

Story Formatting Guidelines

- First and foremost, you must have an author account, and be logged in, before you submit a story to us. Go <u>here</u> to create your account if you don't yet have one. Note: Just because you are subscribed to the magazine and receive email stories from us, does not mean you have an author account. The two databases are completely separate.
- Stories must be submitted as plain text* via our web form. Please don't put your address, word count, title, name or other information in the form. Please don't retype your entire story--copy and paste it into the form (once you've saved your document as plain text). THOUGHTS ON WRITING

By Robert J. Sawyer

(Excerpted with permission from an "Ask Me Anything" Q&A session on Reddit in support of the Pixel Project to end violence against women.)

My writing mentor early on, Terence M. Green, used to speak of creating "thoughtful entertainment" -something that left you pondering for days or weeks after you finished it. I've always strived to do work that does the same thing (and, of course, was hugely influenced by the original STAR TREK and the original PLANET OF THE APES, which likewise did that).

I definitely start with a theme -- something I want to say -- and then work out the plot and characters that will let me say it. Science fiction is often termed "the literature of ideas," and I think the core of really good SF is a fresh thematic statement, a new idea about something fundamental. For my current novel, THE PHILOSOPHER'S ZOMBIE, I have a non-printing comment at the very top of the manuscript file spelling out precisely what the theme is, so that I can remind myself to test each scene to see if it's in service of that theme.

I try to do 2,000 words a day when I'm writing my first draft -- which is the only part I consider work; I enjoy research and I enjoy revisions. I don't tend to vary much from the 2,000 -- if I do less, I don't feel happy with myself, and if I do more, I find that the next day the well tends to be a bit dry.

[On the advantages of being a Canadian writer] I get all the traditional benefits of being a genre-fiction writer in the US plus the sorts of things that rarely happen to my American SF-writing colleagues in the states. I get invited to mainstream literary festivals; my books get taught at just about every Canadian university; I've been interviewed over 300 times on Canadian radio and over 300 times on Canadian TV. Canada treats its writers like movie stars (because so few movie stars live here!); I can't think of a single downside to being Canadian in terms of my writing careers, and oodles of upsides – the biggest of which, of course, was being able to go full-time as a self-employed writer when I was just 23, because I had government-supplied health insurance.

In fact my principle intention is to keep AL simple so that it's easy for me to plug stuff in and not waste time trying to impress readers with my non-existent layout skills. Promote. Inform. Celebrate. That's my mandate. Nobody said anything about laying text over photos or throwing in dancing banners or such-like crap. If there's any crap to be found, it's in the nature of the contents (probably mine) and nothing to do with the presentation. I want everything to be clear, readable, and accessible. I guess, as an editor, I'm old-fashioned.)

Now, my own two-bits worth on the whole "Whose Head Should It Be?" debate for the World Fantasy Award... myself, I was always under the impression that the award was called the Gandalf, and featured a statuette of Tolkien's wizard leaning on his staff (if someone can offer an explanation for how I got this idea, I would much appreciate it).

(**The Graeme** – Now that you mention it, something in the back of my head about this. Couldn't retrieve it from memory, so I checked the web. Assuming the info I found is true, apparently Lin Carter founded the Gandalf award to be presented alongside the Hugos at World conventions. For whatever reason, possibly time constraints, it was eventually voted out of existence. According to several sources the awards were as follows:

- 1974 Grand Master of Fantasy J.R.R. Tolkein
- 1975 Grand Master of Fantasy Fritz Leiber
- 1976 Grand Master of Fantasy L. Sprague de Camp
- 1977 Grand Master of Fantasy Andre Norton
- 1978 Grand Master of Fantasy Poul Anderson Book-length Fantasy – The Silmarillion – J.R.R. Tolkein
- 1979 Grand Master of Fantasy Ursula K. LeGuin Book-length Fantasy – The White Dragon – Ann McCaffrey
- 1980 Grand Master of Fantasy Ray Bradbury

1981 – Grand Master of Fantasy – C.L. Moore

All deserving of the award, in my opinion. I did see a picture of a Gandalf figure holding a staff, but am unsure if that was the actual trophy.)

As for Lovecraft's head, yep, I can dig the concerns re his racist views, but cannot agree with Ms. Butler as the replacement proposal given that my own impression of Ms. Butler is she is an SF writer... which just may indicate that my past reading history of SF, fantasy and horror is not as broad as I had thought.

(**The Graeme** – As a racist, Lovecraft was dead average for his era. Except that he changed. He became a supporter of Franklin Roosevelt and his liberal views. Lovecraft evolved away from being a racist. Besides, the interpretation of his assorted degenerate New England fishmen and the like as representing his alleged intense dislike for 'mixed races' or 'inferior races' is probably much exaggerated. I tend to think it was more the case of his adopting literary clichés to suit the purpose of his genre. About which, by the way, I'm pretty certain he regarded himself as the bearer of a literary style that dated back to 18th Gothic Horror Fiction. I recommend his **Supernatural Horror in Literature** monograph for an understanding of <u>his</u> understanding of what he was up to, what his roots were, and so forth.)

I LIKE the idea Silvia suggests of a statuette in the form of a chimera, or maybe a dragon or unicorn (yeah, I know, cliché), or some other type of fantastical creature rather than someone's head. And I would support that as the obvious neutral alternative.

(**The Graeme** – Yes, any individual represents but one aspect of the Fantasy genre, so best to come up with a generic fantasy icon methinks. What I'd like to see happen is have the Lovecraft Head retained as an annual Award for 'The Best Lovecraft Pastiche.' A worthy, if narrow, literary niche that. I like my idea!)

And that is my two cents worth, even with inflation.

Cathy Palmer-Lister (Aug 29, 2014) – I think this is a wonderful undertaking.

Steve Fahnestalk (Sep 4, 2014) – I hope [#11] is as funny as the last one; I laughed out loud several times. Well written!

Lynne Fahnestalk (Sep 4, 2014) – Good luck to you on the Aurora nom., plus Steve (little biased there...), plus Robert.

(The Graeme -- As fate would have it Steve & I BOTH lost. Congratulations to Robert Runté!)

I'd love to get this newsletter. Is there a fee? Also, what type of filler art are you looking for? I'm sure I have pieces you could use.

(The Graeme – Nope, no fee. Free of charge. AL is a promotional device after all. Want as many fen and pros to read it as possible. Distributed by email to them as wants it, hosted at Bill Burns' <u>http://efansines.com</u> and my <u>http://cdnsfzinearchive.org</u> sites, as well as, hopefully by the time this goes to print, at the CSFFA site itself <u>http://prixaurorawards.ca</u>, and a link posted on the Canadian Science Fiction Writer facebook page maintained by Donna Farley. Aha! Just occurred to me, I should post it on the Friends Of Merril page too... no, wait a mo, I think Lorna Toolis said she would do that. Hmm, anybody else my age having trouble with their memory? But wait, I've always been like this. Perhaps my mental status is stable after all. Pity. The opposite would make for much more interesting reading...

And as I explained via email to you, I am in search of both cover and filler art, previously utilized art would be fine, give it a second airing so to speak, and I hope this issue showcases one or more of your pieces (which you haven't sent yet as I write this, but it's only Sep 5 at the moment...). It's long been my view that genre publicity tends to underplay the work of genre artists (as compared to authors or publishers). I aim to correct this. I hope genre artists will avail themselves of the opportunity. I mean, exploit the heck out of me and this zine! You know you want to!)

Loved this issue #10.

Jean-Pierre Normand (Sep 6, 2014) – Lot of works you do for the 'cause'. Thank you!

I will now print this issue, staple it, fold it in an envelope and put it in my mail box for two or three days.

(**The Graeme** (Sep 6, 2014) – *Be sure to leave your mailbox slightly open so the newsletter gets rained on. That way it will seem like an even more authentic piece of actual mail.*

May I put your unused VCON 36 program book cover (the wonderful one with the 1950s style art and the Robotter in a spacesuit staring at the viewer) on the cover of the next Auroran Lights.

And a jolly event it was too. Costumes were welcome, so I came dressed in black shoes, grey trousers, black belt, and grey shirt. Obviously **Perry Como** dressed for a formal occasion. (Forgot to bring grey sweater.) What does Perry Como have to do with SF&F? Very much the alien infiltrator he was as we all know.

I was lucky enough to sit with **Steve & Lyne Fahnestalk** (Steve and I traded jokes as to why the other couldn't possibly win the "Best Fan Related Work" Aurora for our **Amazing Stories** online columns), **David Mattingly** and wife **Cathleen** (David the Artist GoH), **Rose** and **Dave Wilson** (Rose in charge of the VCON art show and nominated for her work at VCON 38), and **Stan G. Hyde**, one of the founders of Monster Attack Team Canada and a world-renowned Godzilla expert. A nice mix making for lively conversation.

Noting but one tray of finger sandwiches, a single tray of tarts and just one platter of scones, I began to work out the logistics of making sure everyone present got at least one of each item. Silly me. As soon as a tray neared empty it was promptly replaced with a fully laden one in a feat of quasi-military supply logistics David Weber would approve (and no doubt did). Is it possible to gain weight on watercress, cucumber and salmon finger sandwiches? I fear I may have.



For entertainment Journalist and Movie Critic **Michael Walsh** presented two Elron Awards (the Elrons the oldest ongoing spoof awards in fandom, originating at VCON 1 in 1971) very much in the same style as his presentations back when he was the Secret Master of the Elrons in the mid-1980s. (I took over in 1989, and my presentation this year is described below)

Michael has a droll manner of speaking which is entertaining in itself. There were two categories being offered: "Dead Trees" and "Live on Tape Sci-Fi," both very retro in their listing.

"Dead Trees" runner-ups included Gordon R. Dickson, Richard Rohmer, William Shatner and A.E. Van Vogt (the latter for how his novel Slan allegedly influenced Stan Lee), but the winner was Margaret Atwood for her dystopian novel THE HANDMAID's TALE which had nothing to do with "Talking Squids in Space." "Live on Tape Sci-Fi" runner-ups included the 1988 **David Cronenberg** film **Dead Ringers**, the 2013 **Orphan Black** TV series, the guys who put out TV movies like **Polar Storm**, **Arctic Blast**, and **Beyond Loch Ness** "for a body of work in which the science <u>is</u> the fiction," **James Cameron** for the 1984 film **Terminator** which "ultimately led to seven years of the California Governator," and yet the winner turned out to be Margaret Atwood for **The Handmaid's Tale**, albeit this time for the 1990 movie version.

It should be noted that **The Handmaid's Tale** won the Governor's Award and in 1986 the first **Arthur C. Clarke** Award, going on to garner wide recognition as one of the best and most influential genre novels ever written by a Canadian. It is in the nature of the Elron mandate to "honour" the best (as well as the least) in a satirical manner designed to elicit a few chuckles. Michael's presentation made for an exercise in wry humour as those assembled gobbled up the last of the tarts and pastries.

Then the doors to the Ballroom were thrown open and the hordes of fen waiting outside swarmed in to attend the following:

I cleverly brought a complete list of nominees with me to mark the winners one by one, but completely forgot to note down the identities of the presenters. Those familiar with me will note this is typical of my attention to detail. Thus my coverage of these events is somewhat lacking.

I have a twentieth century mind, Robert has a twenty-second century mind, so in theory it all evens out. Nevertheless, if horrifying consequences ensue, he's to blame! Standing by the door tapping my pen in time to the Beatle's sing-along thrown by **Spider Robinson**, **Tam Gordy** and **Steve Fahnestalk**. Running up to **William Gibson** (who remembered me as the guy who gave him a video of TEENAGERS FROM OUTER SPACE – long story) and babbling about my new mandate as editor of the AURORAN LIGHTS to promote SF professionals, etc., wonderful opportunity for him, and so on... only to realize as I turned away that, what with his being one of the most iconic literary figures on the planet, that he was hardly in need of more promotion. As I cringed away I knew he was studying me with his trademark quizzical, bemused and relaxed yet penetrating observational persona, a combination of Mr. Spock and Perry Como now that I think about it. **Garth Spencer** (first Canadian fan to win an Aurora Award, or Casper as it was called back in 1986) telling me that twice, having mistaken him for me, attendees approached him congratulating him for his work on the program book. We stare at each other in horror, each thinking "I don't look THAT old and degenerate!"

Who can join CSFFA?


