Editorial

See the last paragraph of this editorial for the new policy on paper copies of *BC-SFAzine*.

BCSFA held its monthly meeting at the home of *BCSFAzine* editor Garth Spencer on Saturday 14 February 2009. Garth passed the position of editor to me. BCSFA president R. Graeme Cameron and treasurer Kathleen Moore also attended, because the club had other decisions to make about *BCSFAzine*. Here's what I remember; if I have it wrong, Garth, Graeme, Kathleen, or another member should write in.

As Graeme reminded us in his editorial last month, a long time ago BCSFA decided to eliminate membership dues and switch *BCSFAzine* to an electronic-only format. As I remember it, even back then, we knew that there would still be people who would want a paper copy—digest-sized, double-sided, and stapled along the spine; not just telling the reader to print the PDF—so to keep that option available, the compromise was that the electronic copy was free and the paper copy was not.

Apparently we skipped the specifics: how and when to collect the money, and whether anyone still qualified for a free paper copy. According to our original policy, contributors, advertisers, trade zines, and pros all qualified, and since this policy was never changed, we've been firing off free copies for the last several months—and, according to Graeme, tearing through the club's savings.

Some of us are still not willing to give up on paper copies. On the other hand, if readers have to mail us money each and every time a new issue comes out, and only when we receive the money do we mail them a paper copy, there's going to be a lag. To get regular paper copies on time, the readers would have to mail us the money for several issue in advance—in other words, subscriptions.

At the February meeting, we agreed to go back to subscriptions, and to keep a closer eye on the list of subscribers. Because we got rid of membership dues a while ago, no-one has a paid subscription now, as far as we know. Therefore, we're starting over.

Here's what I understand the new system to be. For a monthly subscription to the paper zine, send us \$36 now. The \$36 includes the printing and mailing costs for a year (twelve issues). For individual issues, send us \$3. Individual copies will experience the lag; when we receive the money, that's when we'll mail the paper copy. The free copies for contributors, trades, and pros depend on the budget. Fortunately, Kathleen, Garth, and Graeme spontaneously donated \$66.30 at the meeting. To our trades: if possible, we'd prefer to trade our electronic copy for your electronic copy from now on (Garth has already taken the trouble of asking most of you for me). Electronic copies are, of course, still free.

Finally, the paper version will also be abridged to fit on five sheets to save postage, whereas the PDF will be unabridged.

In response to Graeme's editorial, I would like to note that forcing people to pay for *BCSFAzine* one at a time is just plain silly.

For people who are remote, having to lick a stamp and send cash (or cheque) once a month will raise the cost of the 'zine from \$3 to \$3 + postage + bank fees. Not to mention the inconvenience of having to remember to send the thing every month.

It also induces a huge level of uncertainty into the budget process for *BC-SFAzine* because you'll never have any idea as to who's gonna get a copy.

Then there's the question of asynchronicity; *i.e.*, do we send copies to remote recipients and hope that they get it, or do they send the money and wait 3–6 weeks for delivery?

Not to mention the fact that trades are a way to make sure that people elsewhere are aware of us.

Or to put an executive summary on it: If I were to design a policy that would quietly kill *BCSFAzine*, this would be a pretty good one.

I strongly suggest that this policy be revisited.

((Garth: Yes, the links can be clickable.))

The article about writer-in-residence at the synchrotron was fun, and I also enjoyed Lloyd Penney's story. Nice to see you used my piece after all.

In "What Goes into Fanzines?" reporting on Steven Silver's *Argentus*, misplaced quote marks break several article titles into fragments. By the way, notes

clarifying the article titles, as in the next section about *Picofarad*, add a lot to the 'zine reports. *Argentus* article titles seemed even more cryptic without such notes.

((Garth: I don't quite understand what you're saying about quotation marks. I thought the zine titles were transparent, or even more fannish if they were obscure and intriguing. Argentus comes from the Latin word for "silver," and Silver is the editor's last name. Picofarad is a technical term in electrical engineering, hence vaguely appropriate for an SF fanzine.))

Wow, \$3 seems a lot. That's the cost just to print and staple 16 sheets? Or does it help defray a few extra copies or other zine-related costs?

((Garth: Envelopes, postage, and the copies I send to trades.))

Thanks for another issue of *BCSFAzine* (#429). I've been reading it fairly regularly, though I don't LOC much. Here's another stab at fixing that habit.

Re.: Sheryl Birkhead's LOC—There's only a mild frowning on packing "fans stacked like cordwood" into a room, mostly on the hotel relations front. Hotels, after all, don't care much for this egregious violation of fire code. Personally, I find that in lean months, I want a room packed, but when things are good, I'd rather have just one roommate. As for living off the fat of the consuite, that depends on where the con is. In the South, it's usual practice to serve crockpot meals all day, so plenty of fen can get by on that. I don't encourage it (and besides, I like to eat out a few times over the course of the weekend), but I do recognize it as an option for the determined fan with liquidity issues.

As for Worldcon, the problem seems to be that the cities with enough fen to host a Worldcon are also the cities with outrageous convention centre costs. If the Worldcon could be brought back into a location with a hotel including such space, rather than needing the separate facility, the cost could come down again some. This means, unfortunately, that A-list cities like Boston, New York, Chicago, and LA will have to be beaten by smaller places, which just happen to be ideal locations no one's familiar with. I've only been in a few hotels that could actually handle a Worldcon, and one of them is in Atlanta, which is a little untenable these days. Another issue is the practice of giving voters such a huge break on membership costs—the WSFS constitution still limits the conversion fee to twice the cost of the voting fee, meaning that, with a \$45 voting fee (and thus a \$45 Supporting Membership, minimum), the voters can get their memberships for \$135, maximum, and it's almost always a bit lower, to give them a slight break. Since the average needs to be up around \$180 (what with space rental, decorator fees, A/V rentals, membership reimbursements for program participants and staff, etc.), this means that non-voters will tend to get saddled with \$200+ membership fees. It'll take a long, hard fight through several business meetings to get this changed. There's some support for it already, but it'll take a lot more.

((Garth: More people enjoy <u>huge</u> events than <u>manageable</u> ones. The original purpose of the Worldcon was precisely the Hugo Awards, and if subsidizing the award voters has become a problem for the budget, then maybe the <u>size</u> of the Worldcons has to be questioned, not just the bells and whistles.))

I certainly didn't get the impression that Core Fandom is about fans who have the money to throw around—after all, Arnie does almost all of his publishing online, and doesn't really attend many conventions.

((Garth: <u>I</u> do not identify Core Fandom and jet-set fandom. <u>Arnie Katz</u> seems to.))

I'm learning a lot this year about how hard it is to attend a lot of cons on the cheap, but I'm finding that it can be done. Worldcon, and to a similar degree, any other big event (ComicCon, Dragon*Con, GenCon, Otakon) will be limited to folks who can afford several hundred dollars (my trip to Denvention 3, thanks to bumming my flight, cost me somewhere in the neighbourhood of \$600, though this was accomplished through a lot of luck and penny pinching, and the true minimum that can be expected is probably around \$1000; Dragon*Con cost me around \$400).

What's wrong with not knowing about "fannish fandom"? Does it make someone less of a fan to not be concerned with fanhistory and obscure traditions?

((Garth: Yes. And they shouldn't be obscure.))

I don't believe so. The 19-year-old fresh-faced kid in the Browncoat costume talking about Harry Turtledove in the consuite is every bit as much a fan as the APAn cranking a mimeograph and pondering the right and wrong of the Breendoggle.

((Garth: In my experience, the kids and the Browncoats don't read, or hear of names like Turtledove. You must have a different experience.

((The Breendoggle is an unresolved external reference around here. Mostly local fans are aware of much more local and recent kafuffles.))

I'm also not convinced that fandom is broken up. The only time I see divisions arise is when one fan is convinced that his particular brand of fanac is what other fans should be doing, and lets them know it. I've long known that gamers, readers, SCAdians, anime fans, and *Star Wars* costumers can all get together at a con, meet each other, listen to each other's stories, have a good time, knock back a few bheers, and consider themselves to all be a part of fandom. We won't always know every little detail the others are referencing, but we can all get along as part of one community. I don't believe that this diversity means a marginalization of fannish fandom—hell, I never would have discovered it otherwise.

((Garth: Your experience is different than mine, obviously. Which is all I was saying about Arnie Katz, and his Core Fandom. My usual experience here is that I can't communicate about my fannish references, I can't even interest local fans in my interests. It's like being a ham radio operator or something.))

((Garth: I still think it's strange they don't have a local mailing address. Or maybe they figured that using the same Seattle PO Box they've always had will save confusion.))

A shame about Majel Roddenberry passing. I met her twice at local mediacons. A very nice lady, and she knew all about marketing the gigantic *Trek* cash cow. When Yvonne ran a short-lived business called Ferenghi Fashions, Majel approved. (*Ferenghi* is a Farsi word for foreigner or stranger. It's how the Persians pronounced "Frenchie." *Trek: TNG* took the "h" out, and made lots of acting opportunities for short men. Before anyone gets offended, I am 5'4".)

We had the idea of a steampunk high tea, but that doesn't look like it will happen this year. Nevertheless, we are looking forward to a very good time.

Corflu Calls for Trip Reports

Jerry Kaufman of Seattle writes:

"I'm part of the committee putting on the 2009 Corflu here in Seattle. Dates are March 13–15.

"If you have fan fund trip reports or other publications to sell to raise money for the various fan funds, and are not going to be here for the convention, I will be happy to handle sales for you. Here's what you need to know:

- "(1) Mail them to me at PO Box 25075, Seattle, WA 98165. Allow enough time for them to arrive by Wednesday, March 11, or they may get left at the Post Office until after the con is over.
- "(2) Don't send too many of any one item. We expect to have maybe 100 to 120 people in attendance. Expect that a number of them will probably already have copies.
- "(3) Let me know if you want me to send money back to you or directly to the fund administrator. Be sure you're clear about which fund gets the benefit and how much each item costs.
- "(4) If I need to send unsold items back to you, I'll deduct the postage cost from your sales. If you're the current fund administrator, or if you want me to mail unsold copies to the current administrator, I'll donate the cost to the fund in question.
 - "I'll handle displaying and selling the items at Corflu.
- "If you're planning to attend (like Chris Garcia), bring the items with you. (But if carrying them will be a burden, you can still mail them to me.

"By the way, we're planning to do an auction at the con but its primary purpose will be to cover our costs. Andy Hooper has been soliciting material for pre-convention auctions on eBay, and will be running the on-site auction (unless some brave person leaps up to take it off his hands). Contact him if you have materials you'd like to donate, or if you have fan fund materials you'd like to work into the auction. I can't say how much time there will be to fit stuff in—only Andy can speak to that. Contact him at _fanmailaph@aol.com."

Unfortunate News About the Seattle in 2011 Worldcon Bid

"It is with grave regret and a deep disappointment that I must announce that the Seattle bid has to pull out of the race to host the Worldcon in 2011. This is due to an unforeseen event and our inability to reach a formal first option agreement with our preferred facilities. We had initial options on facilities, but when it came time to reduce them to formal writing, we found that our preferred facilities had groups willing to make the financial commitment ahead of us. Seattle is such a popular destination for conventions that all of the reasonable dates (early August through early September) already have groups that have firmer commitments than we do.

"After examining the options and alternatives, consulting with our respected advisors and exploring any number of other possibilities we have determined that there are just no viable alternatives, which make sense for the fannish community available to us. We do not want to host the Worldcon in a venue and situation that would prove to be less than World class. In this economy, it is refreshing to know that Seattle remains a popular destination for conventions and tourists even if it is one of the saddest things I can think of at the moment.

"I want to personally thank all of the fannish community, our supporters, my advisors, friends and family for giving so completely of yourselves over the last several years. I can personally not think of anyone I would not have wanted to produce this event with other than you—you all gave so much and went so far to make this happen. Thank you for everything!

"We will be reviewing future opportunities with our potential facilities with an eye toward bidding for a subsequent year."

"The other day I posted an excerpt from Charles de Lint's introduction to *Cast a Cold Eye*. Today, I figure it probably makes sense to tell you about the book, in case you're unfamiliar with the title.

"First off, it's a novella, so not a full length novel. However, it is being published as a stand-alone book. It's due to come out in July from PS Publishing, a British specialty press. Their books are generally only offered in signed limited editions, hardcover and trade paperback, so they tend to be a tad more than plain old books. But this is a publisher that has brought out books from Stephen King and Ray Bradbury, among others, so it's a nice feather in the cap.

"I'm very lucky to have a co-author on this book, my friend William Shunn. When we started this story a few years ago Bill was living in New York and I was in Prince George. We're much closer together now, though, since I'm Saskatoon and he's in Chicago. *Cast a Cold Eye* is my second collaboration, after the Aurora-nominated short story 'Mayfly,' written with Peter Watts. Bill helped bring a terrific and unique voice to this story, and he also tempered some of my more loopy ideas. Which in this case was a very good thing.

"The story itself takes place in Nebraska just after the Spanish flu pandemic, and involves a teenage boy who lost both his parents to that illness. There's also a spirit photographer, ghosts, spooky graveyards, and a a friendly, knowing dog. Göbekli Tepe: World's First Temple

Which came first: city, or civilisation? Excavations in Turkey cast a surprising light on this chicken-or-egg question. Did our elaborately structured interdependent cultures gradually develop from the needs of populations gathering at river crossings, harbours, and other centres of travel and trade, and ultimately becoming grand enough to afford temples and public works? Perhaps not. Building of temples and "wonders of the world" may have come first, driving invention of agriculture, commerce, and the arts of civilisation to handle the results of concentration of people at these sites.

An archaeological survey of Turkey in 1964 reported limestone slabs on a steep, rounded hill in southeast Turkey (known as Göbekli Tepe, navel or belly

hill, for its rotund shape) atop a ridge commanding the plains around. Mediæval cemetery, or Neolithic henge? With thousands of other sites to study, this one was all but ignored. Thirty years later, German archaeologist Klaus Schmidt, after sifting through Turkish files for possible stone age sites, climbed this windy hill. "Within a minute of first seeing it," he says, "I knew I had two choices: go away and tell nobody, or spend the rest of my life working here."

Before irrigation was invented, or pottery, before selective breeding, when Horse and Cow and Sheep and Pig and Goose and even the grasses and beans were all as wild as wild could be...the gatherers and hunters on the plains and foothills of the Taurus Mountains lifted up their eyes unto the hills. Rainfall was plentiful there over eleven thousand years ago, vegetation lush, wild herds plentiful, and streams and wetlands teeming with game.

On the highest place for miles around they gathered, and there they built the world's earliest known temple. No signs of defenses are found there, and little in the way of dwellings (not enough for hundreds of workers needed to move great stones). The windswept hilltop did not provide much water or food. So they brought wild grains and vegetables, wild game, gathered and prepared with fine stone age tools. Then they carved pairs of monolithic pillars and surrounded them with stone rings (and roofs?) six or seven thousand years before people of Salisbury Plain hoisted the mightier megaliths of Stonehenge into place. They carved scorpions and snakes, birds and swine, lions, foxes, and human shapes. Generation after generation, for thousands of years, they celebrated and ornamented the sacred place.

But some time after 8000 BC, Göbekli Tepe was deliberately sealed under earth for the last time. No stonework so magnificent would be seen for thousands of years after. Beneath three to five hundred cubic metres of dirt, ancient secrets lay protected within the pregnant hill. Meanwhile, within five centuries of the earliest works at Göbekli Tepe, people of the country around built their first corrals and bred the first domestic wheat. Mankind's great adventure had begun.

(No need to list references here: a web search for Göbekli Tepe will show you many fascinating reports from a decade of excavations there. Readers of the past have hardly scratched the surface; lifetimes of work await them on a hill where humans first built together something much greater than themselves.)

Michelle Ryan and Lindsay Duncan board while Freema Agyeman returns to the TARDIS.

Twenty-four-year-old actress Michelle Ryan is joining the long list of companions on *Doctor Who*. Ryan recently played the role of Nimueh, an evil sorceress who wants to destroy Camelot, on BBC1's *Merlin* (note to long time

series viewers: Merlin is not played by Sylvester McCoy), though most North American fans will know her as the Bionic Woman in the short-lived 2007 retelling of that classic 1970s series.

Ryan will play Lady Christina de Souza, a woman with a mysterious past that will have a huge impact on her relationship with the Doctor. She will debut in "The Planet of the Dead," which will air on BBC1 on the Easter weekend and a week later on the American Sci-Fi Channel. (Sorry; no word on when it will air on the CBC, but I heard that the wait could be quite long.)

The special is about passengers (including the Doctor) stranded on a London bus that is somehow transported to another planet, where two alien monsters (both new to the series) await. It was first filmed in and around the series production center in Wales before moving to a location shoot in the United Arab Emirates on February 12.

"Planet of the Dead" marks two milestones in the series' long history. It's the first *Doctor Who* story to be filmed in the Middle East and the first shot in high definition.

An interesting side story: a double-decker bus that was going to be used in the special was badly damaged while being unloaded in Dubai, when a 17-tonne container was dropped on it. The BBC did some temporary repairs to make it road-worthy and worked the damage into the story-line.

Fifty-eight-year-old actress Lindsay Duncan will then sign on to the TAR-DIS. Duncan is the sixth-largest municipality on Vancouver Island, with a population of 21,345 residents, and is best known in the fandom community as the one-time home of Spawn creator Todd McFarlane. Sorry; that's Duncan, BC. I mean Lindsay Duncan is best known for her work on *GBH* and *Rome* and can be seen as Margaret Thatcher in the BBC Two drama *Margaret*, which airs on PBS this coming summer.

Duncan will play Adelaide, who series executive producer Russell T. Davies says will be "the Doctor's most strong-minded companion yet." She will also be the oldest person to become a companion. Her journey through the spacetime continuum will start in the second special and she could be with the Doctor when he regenerates from David Tennant into Matt Smith in early 2010.

Freema Agyeman's character Dr. Martha Jones will return in one of the three remaining specials.

Sorry; getting any more information on these specials is about has hard as finding a fish that can whistle "Oh Canada." So that's all for now; be seeing you.
