

[Each month, we print thirty-five copies. We mail out or hand-deliver between twenty and thirty copies. An average of ten copies are sales: four go to paid subscribers, and half a dozen are me paying cover price each time I give a copy away.

Five copies go to a local bookstore (see indicia) which sells them on consignment and returns the unsold copies to us.

[As for the rest of the print run, two go to our own archives, eight go to our regular contributors, an average of two per month go to editors who send us hard copies of their zines in trade, two go to Library and Archives Canada (legally required), one goes to a professional writer/friend of the club, one to a local library with a zine section, and one to a local comic shop which displays our zine for its staff and customers to read. This leaves a handful of extra copies of each issue, which I carry with me whenever I go out, in case I can sell them.

[If, in the new year, we raised the cover price by a dollar—or 33%—we'd make ten dollars more per month, if we didn't lose any subscribers. Should we do that? What does everyone think?

[As for "bleeding the club dry," this re-raises the eternal question, "What is the purpose of BCSFA?" We don't run VCON anymore, and local fans have plenty of options for meeting places (see "Calendar"). If we weren't printing BCSFAzine, what would we do with the money?]

The calendar...today, I finished off my demodisk for potential voicework with a local agency, so with some luck, you may soon be able to list me as a voice actor in the calendar as well. I am hoping for my first pro audition soon.

[If only I still did that part of the calendar! I've been wanting to take voice acting lessons for ages. Any advice—where to start; things to avoid?] *The Secret of NIMH* remains one of my favourite animated movies of all time because of the quality of animation, and in many ways put the name Don Bluth above the name Walt Disney in my books. I haven't seen much Bluth animation since, but *NIMH* was great. I don't have it on DVD...perhaps I should fix that. I know there was a terrible, musical sequel that we shall not speak of here...

Yvonne and I also pass along our condolences to Spider Robinson on Jeanne's passing. Spider, you are never alone, you have too many friends for that to ever happen. I hope that can be some comfort.

446...I did read the Calendar in each issue, but as you say, it's a lot of time spent on research. I used to do my quarterly convention lists, but I don't really do that any more. Perhaps less detail, less research, and lots of input from others will reduce your own workload.

[Thank goodness for Keith Lim!]

I have no particular love for BP, but I can't help feel that the constant negative spotlight on BP from the White House, the press and more are making the job that much more difficult. As for Gatecon, it's an expensive convention—I couldn't afford to go even when it was held here in Richmond. Imagine paying for parking and a room, too!]

Sunday is the one-day steampunk con, and I definitely want to hear about that. I think I'm going to call this one done; it's Friday, and I still need to go to work this evening. Sucks to be me...oh, well, at least I am partially employed. In attendance were Ray Seredin (host), Kathleen Moore (treasurer), Felicity Walker (editor), Doug Finnerty, Joe Devoy, and Julian Castle.

According to Ray, there is a chance *Doctor Who* (25%) and *Torchwood* (75%) will soon be filmed in Vancouver. The answer will be announced at Comic Con International. John Barrowman (star of *Torchwood*) likes Vancouver, including its skiing.

Also, Ray said that Seattle won the bid for Westercon in 2012. The venue will be the same as Norwescon, the Seatac Doubletree Hotel.

Doug told of an Alberta man with the unusual name Travis Vader, who's wanted for torching old people's motor homes.

For the upcoming Zombie Walk, Ray suggested victims dress as *Star Trek* "redshirts." Felicity said that the *First Contact* Borg were also zombie-like. Joe added that an *Enterprise* episode had zombie Vulcans. This reminded Doug of the *Star Wars* novel *Death Troopers*, which had zombie Stormtroopers on a Star Destroyer.

Ray said that he'd heard from Danielle Stephens that there will be something to honour the memory of Jeanne Robinson at the next VCon.

Felicity noticed that video stores seem to be closing all over town. Kathleen replied that the public library is a good source of videos. There are also rental machines in stores like Safeway.

According to Ray, the Victoria CBC station has chosen to stay an affiliate rather than fully join the network so that it can still play its own programming, such as *Give Us This Day*.

Comics News: Howard Chaykin, John Byrne, and Alan Moore

Howard Chaykin: The Hero Initiative issued <u>a press release</u> Thursday 5 August 2010 to announce that they have appointed Howard Chaykin and Walter Simonson to their Board of Directors to serve as members of the Disbursement Committee. The Hero Initiative is a not-for-profit fund, founded by a group of publishers, that supports inneed comics creators. Veteran writers, pencillers, inkers, colourists, and letterists

who have fallen on hard times due to medical expenses or unemployment can get helped from the industry to which they gave their talents.

From the press release: " 'Accepting Hero's offer to serve was an easy decision, as I believe it's incumbent upon all of us to do what we can to help those who came before us and laid the groundwork for the comics landscape today,' Chaykin said. 'None of us would be able to do what we do in this incredible and vibrant field without the efforts of comics' elder statesmen, and it's an honor to be able to do my part and do right by them.' "

Chaykin and Simonson are contemporaries who shared a studio, Upstart Associates, from the late 1970s to mid-1980s. According to Hero Initiative President Jim McLauchlin, they'll be taking over the duties of the late Dick Giordano, who passed away last March.

Meanwhile, of course, Chaykin has also been making comics. I've been especially delighted by Chaykin's artwork in *G.I. Joe: Hearts & Minds*, written by best-selling author Max Brooks (son of Mel Brooks). The series offers an inside look at the motivations and personalities—the hearts and minds—of various Joes and Cobras, one of each per issue, with the Cobra story illustrated by Chaykin. Seeing classic villains like Major Bludd and Firefly drawn by Chaykin has been a treat; I've never encountered the third issue's Cobra—the Interrogator—before, but I won't be able to forget him after reading his story.

Chaykin's also providing art for *The Rawhide Kid* (possibly subtitled *The Tombstone Blues, The Sensational Seven*, or nothing at all, depending on whether you go by online comic databases, the comic's cover, or the comic's indicia), a new four-issue mini-series from Ron Zimmerman, the writer of 2003's reimagining, *The Rawhide Kid: Slap Leather*. Zimmerman's Rawhide is in good hands with Chaykin, who's proven many times in his comics that he can do badass, glamourous, and historical all in one setting. Plus: Ghost Rider cameo!

John Byrne: Two sizzling items about British-Canadian-American comics creator/writer/artist John Byrne are making the rounds in comics fandom this week.

The first item is for real: publisher IDW has announced that the long-awaited continuation of *John Byrne's Next Men* is finally happening! A superhero saga that launched as a four-part serial in *Dark Horse Presents* in the summer of 1991, *Next Men* (or *JBNM*, as Byrne preferred to abbreviate it) ran as a regular series for thirty issues before ending on a tantalizing cliffhanger. Byrne said at the time that the market could no longer support creator-owned comics, promised that the story would be continued when the industry recovered, and was next seen as writer/artist for a semi-rebooted *Wonder Woman* at DC.



Throughout the years Byrne had no news about the possibility of more Next Men. Lately, Byrne has been working steadily for IDW, producing Star Trek comics such as Romulans (Alien Spotlight and Hollow Crown), Assignment: Earth (starring Gary Seven), Crew (starring Number One), and Leonard McCoy, Frontier Doctor. IDW recently published trade paperback collections of the original Next Men series, and Editor-in-Chief Chris Ryall made the Next Men announcement on Saturday 24 July 2010 at the Comic Con International in San Diego.



The second item is more facetious: on Sunday 1 August 2010, Byrne, who is not a fan of *Watchmen*, Alan Moore, or deconstruction of superheroes in general, commented in the forums on his website, <u>Byrne Robotics</u>, that he thought Rob Liefeld would be the perfect candidate to write and draw a follow-up to *Watchmen*. Specifically, Byrne said:

"I was watching a few minutes of the *Watchmen* movie on cable last night, and I found myself musing on the notion of a 'prequel' or sequel to the original comicbook series.

"In *Watchmen*, Moore inverted—I might say perverted—pretty much everything the superhero genre is all about. He was not the first to do so, but *Watchmen* was the first time we got it all in such a concentrated dose. Largely, this seems to have happened because Moore is very much a one trick pony. The one trick

works for him and his fans, so no problem there, I guess. But this got me to thinking about who would be a suitable candidate to produce another round of *Watchmen*.

"The thought began to take shape in my head that any revisiting of those characters should be a continuation of the 'tradition' of *Watchmen*. That is, as Moore trashed everything superheroes were all about, the next go-round should do the same with *Watchmen* itself. So the ideal candidate for doing the project should be

someone who is equally a one trick pony, but from the opposite end of the spectrum. Immediately, one name sprang to the forefront: Rob Liefeld.

"No, I'm not kidding. Liefeld would be to *Watchmen* what Moore was to superheroes in general. And it would be such fun to watch a whole flock of retailers' heads exploding, as they tried to serve two entirely different faces of mammon!"

It seems clear to me that, despite the previous paragraph, Byrne *is* kidding, at least in the sense that, while he may sincerely think *Watchmen* deserves Liefeld, he does not actually believe anyone would take his suggestion of a Rob Liefeld *Watchmen* seriously. However, half the comics blogosphere has reacted as if Byrne has completely lost his mind and is actually planning to get Rob Liefeld to write and draw *Watchmen 2*, which would be hilarious.





Maybe Byrne and Liefeld could collaborate on the comic adaptation of the *Watchmen* movie. Then Ty Templeton could draw *Watchmen Adventures*, which would adapt *Saturday Morning Watchmen*.

Alan Moore: On a related note, Alan Moore says that "comics are dead" and has bid "farewell to the comics industry." In an interview with *Comic Heroes*, Moore said:

"I haven't read a comic in years but I've not been tempted to. It looks like it's stuck in the late '80s and early 1990s and it's just going to be an endless cycle of that material. So I tend to suspect that it was probably only me, and a number of my collaborators, who were actually interested in pushing things forward. I think that the publishers are happier with an unending stasis; I think a lot of the artists and writers are. I tended to

feel that, yes, I received a lot of admiration but I also received a lot of suspicion and antagonism that, frankly, I could do without."

"So although I've had a great love of comics as a medium, I belatedly came to realise that the comics industry does not want progress. In fact, it isn't capable of it and it doesn't want it."

And: "It looks to me as if the comic industry is pretty much already getting out of comics. The individual pamphlets don't sell as much as the collections. The biggest circulating news I saw coming from DC Warner Brothers last year was that they'd sold the rights to use Superman for some sort of online gambling.

"This is basically the only thing the characters are worth now? They're so debased that they're only useful for franchises, that you can knock out a few more Batman films, a few more Superman films...once that dries up, then what will there be?"

After eight Jack Kirby Awards, eight Eagle Awards, seven Comic Buyers' Guide Fan Awards, seven Harvey Awards, nine Will Eisner Awards, and one Hugo Award, he's had enough antagonism. Thanks for the great comics, Alan!

'Doctor Who' News for August 2010

OK, if you've seen the *Doctor Who* episode "The Big Bang," please on keep reading. If not, please stop reading this and watch it before you do, because this article has a few spoilers.

OK, this will sound kind of odd to the handful of classic series fans who still don't like the post-2005 series that has the name *Doctor Who*, but here I go. "The Pandorica Opens" and "The Big Bang," to me, are two of the best *Doctor Who* episodes ever made.

What other series would have not one, but three main characters die, and a person from the main character's future—the one and only River Song—holding a book of spoilers that could have saved him a lot of trouble, like getting the TARDIS blown up in order to save the whole of time and the universe? Oh, and all those bizarre cracks in time that we saw throughout series five getting explained, all the series' evil-doers from the last forty-seven years joining together to trap their greatest enemy to use him to destroy time and space, and most of the major guest characters from this series in total panic at the start of this story?

So the Doctor escapes and travels though time via River's vortex manipulator, trying to save his friends and to set everything right. Then it comes down to the Doctor ramming the Pandorica into the exploding TARDIS, thus erasing all the adventures he and his friends had in the run of this series while rebooting the whole of time and space.

Then Amy wakes up from an odd dream to find herself in her family home on the date of her wedding to her long-time boyfriend Rory and even receives a blue book that used to be owned by River Song—then she really knows that someone's missing. So she remembers the Doctor and from nowhere a certain Type 40 TAR-DIS appears.

Then in the end they all get into that blue box, except for River (who went back to the future via her vortex manipulator), to find more adventures. Now this is *Doctor Who* story-telling at its best.

The other highlight of this series, to me, was "Vincent and the Doctor," one of six *Doctor Who* stories/episodes that made me cry (the others being "Survival," "Girl in the Fireplace," "Doomsday," "Journey's End," and "The Big Bang"). The story dealt with Vincent van Gogh, who painted a work that has a rather forbidding monster in the window of a church. After seeing this painting, the Doctor and Amy travel back to 1890 and befriend van Gogh, who is being blamed for a number of strange deaths around Arles (the town in France where van Gogh did over 300 of his works). Oh, one thing I better tell you now is that this monster can only be seen by van Gogh (though the Doctor can see it through a device he takes from the TARDIS). In the end, the painter saves the life of the Doctor, but is greatly saddened by the death of the beast, a Krafayis, who was abandoned on Earth when its species moved on, and was very lonely, much like van Gogh himself.

This story did something that no other sci-fi series ever did before: taking on bipolar disorder head-on, while nevertheless making it a fun story about this heartbreaking disease. Being a member of the mental health community, I know many people who are bi-polar, with even a few of them who, like van Gogh, took their own lives because of it. The BBC itself even has a link on the *Doctor Who* web-site to answer viewers' questions about the disorder.

The classic series always had a way of bringing the important issues of the times it was made in to a sci-fi setting, and now the new series is doing the same, this time bringing up a mental health issue that *Star Trek* never dealt with in all its reincarnations over the last 44 years.

So let's give a "Hear, hear" to the producers of Doctor Who.

As for the rest of the stories, they're the highs ("Time of the Angels"/"Flesh and Stone"), they're the lows ("The Vampires of Venice"), and they're the just plain fun ("The Lodger"). Over-all, another great season of *Doctor Who*.

As for the Eleventh Doctor, Matt Smith is just right for the role of the 907-yearold Time Lord. This regeneration is a little bit nutty, a bit over-cautious with the companions (who never listen to him in the first place), and has a strong liking for bow-ties. What else would we want in this kind of a Doctor? Besides, as we've seen in "The Lodger," the new Doctor is great at playing football (or soccer, as us North Americans call it).

By now you're asking, "Gee, Cosmic Ray, what's going to happen in the next series of *Doctor Who*?" Well, by the time you read this, the filming work on the 2010 Christmas special should be in the can, with production for the 2011 series getting underway in the first week of August. They are keeping a very tight lid on what's going to happen in the new series, but it looks like the Doctor will have two companions at the start, they will run into the mysterious Dr. River Song a few more times as we find out more about the future Doctor, and as you already know, Neil Gaiman is writing one of the episodes. The rest is mostly rumours for now, but if you watched the final episode of this series, you know that the TARDIS exploding reset the whole of time and space, so (pardon the pun) who knows? Maybe the Time Lords are back, maybe the two races of Daleks will be in a civil war with themselves, or maybe some other monster lost in the Time War will return to wage revenge on the Doctor. We just won't know until spring 2011.

The other big news coming from Britain is that the *Doctor Who* spin-off series *Torchwood* is going international. A deal with BBC Worldwide and the US premium cable network Starz will see ten new episodes of the series that will have one storyline that will take the Torchwood team around the world. Both John Barrowman and Eve Myles will return to their roles from the BBC series, but the new member of the team will be Americans (heck, put a Canadian in there and watch the Americans always lose to him or her in the hockey pool). The new series is to go into production in January, with its North American production locations a very closely guarded secret (Please pick Vancouver, please pick Vancouver!).

OK, before I go, what if you were riding on a ferry that was just about to enter Active Pass, when you noticed, out the window, the ferry overtaking a 10-meterlong, rather sturdy, American pleasure craft, with a blue (that looks somewhat close to London police-box blue) hull, with a wooden plate on its bridge bearing the name of a time-and-space-traveling police box belonging to a certain Doctor?



Before you make a note in your head to never watch *Doctor Who* again and purchase a copy of *Little House on the Prairie: The Complete Series* at the nearest Best Buy, I would like to tell you you are not seeing things. There's a craft named *TARDIS* based out of out Bellevue, Washington, and every so often she shows up in BC waters. With a name like that, she's almost certainly owned by some well-off series fan.

It's my hope that in 2011, when the real USS Enterprise shows up in Seattle, that some series fan who enlisted in the US Navy will get permission for *TARDIS* to come up close to the Big *E* and someone will get some pictures of it. I can see it now—photos on sci-fi sites everywhere on the web, with a caption above her reading "Think you're big? I'm even bigger on the inside."

So, back to watching classic *Doctor Who* episodes until December 26th (or whenever). 'Til then, be seeing you. Cosmic Ray
