

NEWS-LIKE MATTER

NOTES FROM MARCH 2013 BCSFA MEETING

In attendance were Graeme Cameron (president), Barb Dryer (secretary), Kathleen Moore (treasurer), Ray Seredin (host), Felicity Walker (editor), Michael "Fruvous" Bertrand, Julian Castle, Joe Devoy, and William Graham.

Graeme reported that at the recent WCSFA meeting, it was approved to transfer the VCON trademark from BCSFA to WCSFA (Graeme found that there are some complicated bureaucratic run-arounds involved in submitting the forms to the government), and was agreed in principle that BCSFA can be a standing social subcommittee of WCSFA, which gives us a not-for-profit's ability to get rooms at libraries, etc. In order to avoid confusion we would be known as WCSFA to the libraries etc., but would explain at the event that

we are BCSFA. [See "Message from the President" in this issue for more.—Future Felicity]

Ray remembered that at "slave day" at his high school in 1977, the girls forced the toughest guys to wear dresses. Ray and his friend Eric were not slaves, but went to school in drag anyway just for fun. They got suspended for a week. Ray's dad threatened to disown him. Ray's dad was afraid Ray would turn gay. Fruvous imagined a conversation in which a father says "You're a nerd AND you're gay?!" and the son replies, "Well, either way, you're not getting grandchildren."

Graeme recently met a teenager who had not heard of VCON and expressed an interest. When Graeme started to tell him about authors such as Asimov, Bradbury, and Clarke, the boy didn't know whom Graeme was talking about; when Graeme explained, the youngster said, "Oh, I don't read any of that last-century junk." This was painful to hear, but to be fair, it should be noted that the whippersnapper was about 14 (born at the end of the last century), and we were all paleophobic at that age. Fruvous remembered telling his literature teacher, "I reserve the right to decide what I consider a 'classic.' " (Technically, this is perfectly true.)

Graeme noticed that the same thing happened at the turnover from the 19th to 20th centuries. People wanted to forget the 19th century and decided that the cut-off point was the turn of the century, and anything before that was of no interest. I thought, Where does that leave us in-between generations who don't want to forget the previous century? Will we become the 21st-century equivalent of grizzled old Walter Brennan-type prospectors?

Graeme added that "Garth [Spencer] wants to know if they still have 'fannish' conventions." Graeme said, "Probably not since the 1940s!" when fandom split into those who "just read the stuff" and fans of fandom.

Graeme has also noticed that many zine fans are pointedly refusing to talk about SF in their zines. Fruvous figured that these were self-hating nerds who wanted the world to know that they were "not that

kind of nerd." Graeme noted that fanzine fandom has been called the least welcoming fandom and wondered how you get SF fans into fanzine fandom when fanzine fandom appears to hate SF.

Someone asked about anime conventions. Kathleen said that Anime Evolution imploded due to financial problems, and that Anime REVOLUTION had to be started up separately. Some of us remembered there was another anime convention, but couldn't recall what it was--Julian suggested we might be thinking of IRL Events' Cos & Effect.

Julian said that after FACTSHEET FIVE folded, there was ZINE WORLD, but that has now also folded because the editor got too busy. Julian said that



it was snarky in its reviews, but had good articles and news reports. I asked if it became a website before dying; Julian said no. Graeme said that his favourite SF film magazine, CINEFANTASTIQUE, did become a website, and also became like STARLOG--mostly fluff about actors. Graeme noted that FAMOUS MONSTERS OF FILMLAND is still available in comic shops, but he stopped reading it because he can't stand its "new" flashy visual style. He did buy the Forrest Ackerman tribute issue but was disappointed when it turned out to be just a list of movies Ackerman had been in (though Graeme was surprised at the large number of movies).

For one movie Ackerman was credited as scientific advisor, but evidently felt that it was believable enough to have the characters open their helmets on Mars to get a quick breath of fresh air. This reminded someone of the ending of TOTAL RECALL (1990), and me of a short story I'd read where Earth plant-life had successfully colonized Mars, happily breathing in its carbon dioxide atmosphere and producing enough oxygen that humans could breathe the thin Martian air, like dwellers in high altitudes on Earth. Over generations, Martian-born humans became larger-chested.


Going back to the topic of preservation of disposable entertainment, Ray reported that Syfy decided five or six years ago to remake all the old ABC Friday night horror TV-movies from the 1970s. Thirty or forty of these low-budget (\$200,000!) flicks were made. Universal originally produced them, but later sold them to ABC (which was owned by Disney by then), who then sold them to Fox, who thought they were too outdated to keep.

Similarly, Graeme related a story he heard about Japanese publishers not wanting to reprint old books or even update old stories or games. Fruvous agreed that Japan is very now-oriented and noveltyaddicted, and even everyday products like gum will debut and disappear within two weeks. Graeme and Kathleen mentioned that manga are churned out in vast quantities and are not meant to be saved. I replied that it must be hard to be a nostalgian in Japan, where everything is thrown out and there isn't enough space in your apartment to save things. Someone commented that for disposable entertainment, nothing tops American pulps being used as ballast in ships, then resold in any old condition once they reached Britain. If you were a collector it was really the luck of the draw!

The latest thing Graeme watched while exercising was THE MAGNETIC MONSTER (1953), a rare black-and-white B-movie. In the story, a power plant in Nova Scotia is the only place to overload the monster and make it split. Why Canada? For one thing, that way it takes the characters an hour to get there, which pads the movie; for another, the power plant stock footage was actually recycled from a German movie called GOLD (1934), about a machine that makes gold but goes haywire, and so the Canadian setting explains why the uniforms look foreign. When necessary the American actors dressed up in uniforms to match the stock footage.

Julian saw a poster for a B-movie called SNOW SHARK (2011). None of us had heard of it but I already knew what the one thing was that I insist a movie with that title provide: shots where all you

can see is the dorsal fin, slicing its way through the snow. [There are.--Future Felicity]



The most recent B-movie we (Joe, Julian, Fruvous, and I) had watched at our apartment was HACK-O-LANTERN (1988). Despite the title, pumpkins are not central to the story; the twisted, incestuous grandfather who leads the cult supposedly sells pumpkins out of his pickup truck, but we never see this happen--he gives one to his grandson and it's

implied that he supplies a high school with some to decorate their fall dance. The movie's production values have an interesting combination of occidental Satanism and witchcraft with a bit of Indian imagery (perhaps thanks to director Jag Mundhra or producer Raj Mehrotra).

The pumpkins reminded Graeme of a Three Stooges movie in which Japanese-American internment camp escapees disguise themselves as pumpkin-headed scarecrows [THE YOKE'S ON ME (1944)--Future Felicity]. In modern context, given what we now know about the "relocation centres," the film's content is shocking.

Graeme said that recently he was watching a documentary on contemporary Russian art, and there's a guy that Putin likes who does statues of Putin, idealized, muscular, and wrestler-y, like a Stalinera statue. This artist also does his own interpretation of things, like a giant metal apple filled with drawers--you can go inside it, and see statues of naked men and women gamboling Greek-style and golden plagues with scenes from the KAMA SUTRA. Also, Russia has saved lots of Stalin-era art that it longer displays; one painting shows Stalin in a field on a farm, in an Orthodox saint-like pose, with smokestacks and power lines in the background--but if you look closely at the background, there's a black limo of the type only used by the secret police. the message is, "Look at all the wonderful things

Communism does for you (and you'd better believe it, because they're watching you!)."

Graeme said that he had a dream about fanzines. (It was interesting but my notes don't record the details.) I said that I seem to have the mutant power to read in my dreams; maybe my interest in lettering and typography makes me see the words as pictures, or my grapheme-to-colour synaesthesia helps me read them. Fruvous said that he's noticed that before UFOs were part of the public lexicon, people had dreams with UFO-like content-abduction, paralysis-but without the UFOs. He wondered what mythology these pre-UFO dreams drew their content from.

Julian reported that the Thursday WALKING DEAD first-season reruns are being shown in black-and-white. I wondered if the idea was to make them resemble NIGHT OF THE LIVING DEAD (1968) as an homage to George Romero.



1:00 AM: I do something entirely out of character and go to the ballroom while the dance music is blaring. I do this to support my friend Graham Mitchell, who is doing his very first ever DJ gig as his alias DJ Silvermink. Normally, I shun anything even remotely resembling a dance

The two items up for a vote at the upcoming meeting have already been approved at the WCSFA AGM. It is now up to us to confirm or reject.

Item (1): Transfer VCON trade mark to WCSFA. Since WCSFA is the legally registered society governing VCON, it only makes practical sense that WCSFA can inform hotels, GOHs, the press, the public, etc. that they own the trademark. It strengthens WCSFA's position. To have to explain that a different society owns VCON's trademark is awkward and weakens the "legitimacy" of WCSFA. This transfer is neccessary for the good of VCON.

Item (2): BCSFA becomes a standing committee of WCSFA. Again, this simplifies explanations to outsiders. We would publically identify ourselves as part of WCSFA, but anyone actually participating in our promotional activities would know we are BCSFA, the "heritage" originator of VCON. Operating as part of WCSFA we would open up new opportunities for public promotion and increased membership. It would also strengthen WCSFA in that they can claim sole

"ownership" of VCON from the very beginning (albeit through us). A win/win situation for both parties.

I heartily and enthusiastically recommend that both items be approved.
