BOOK REVIEW by Daniel Say

BERNHARD THE CONQUEROR by Sam J. Lundwall. DAW June 1973 ISBN 451-UQ1058-095 95¢ 18cm.

"One reaction to Heinlein's STARSHIP TROOPERS (1959) was one novel, Harry Harrison's witty and intelligent BILL, THE GAL-ACTIC HERO (1966), a Catch-22 on a magnificent cosmic scale."*

So says Sam J. Lundwall on a book of which this is a pastiche or parody. Both heroes start out on the soil but while Bill starts out as a naive rustic, Bernhard Rordin has already been in the armed forces of the Galactic Empire and is now working off a sentence on a prison planet when a huge space-ship comes by.

Bernhard (from the Old High German Bero = bear and hart = bold, hard, so literally bold as a bear) is however not naive but is cynical and often as cunning as a European bear is in the myths. He whines and moans a lot in the right places and is self-pitying as befitting this stock cardboard character. He reacts on the Pavlovian commands of the author and is to be talked at, not talked with. He is a counter being moved by the play of the author's dice. On the board . . .

This long-haul space-ship crosses nearby the planet and its size (32,000 kilometers) upsets the guardians of the prison planet and their system breaks down. A scout ship sent down from the spaceship finds that this is no longer the paradise planet that was marked on their charts cons ago. Bernhard however finds an opportunity to get aboard the scout and so to the ship and off the prison planet.

Bernhard, however, is prevented from being free again in the story by a very crowded universe of stock SF figures.

There are innumberable encounters with the several robotic brains of the

ship which want to love him or to put him out with the garbage or to cut him up for parts. Each chapter has a new menace: a mad scientist who literally assembled his monster-making laboratory from movie sets; the army which needs a private to order around and Bernhard is elected; the TV sets who want an audience; Effjay Von Rhodin and his companions-Grog, a 3 metre tall robot, Otto, a 40 kilogram weakling who is a weapons expert etc. (No relation to P.R. at all, no sir.) The Von Rhodin companion known as the Brain gives Bernhard a "Mr. Hyde" potion which does the obvious gorilla-like body-bulldog-jaw treatment of the innocent private. Castaway later into space, Bernhard meets the Gentleman Adventurer of the Tom Swift Sr. type, a carnivorous planet, rival utopian communities, robot whores, a solar system with all the planets sharing a common orbit about the sun and so a common atmosphere, a God machine which gives a cardboard replica of SF philosophy about man's place and so on.

And of course back to the planet that he started out from but changed inside and out and with a new niche in the heirarchy of the prison planet. Read

it to find out what happens. It's all rather predictable but fun.

This is a light novel meant to expose many things at one fell swoop and so exaggerated that Lundwall makes you laugh despite yourself. While Harrison only did in a few military and social unrest cliches, Lundwall does in all of them in a scattergun approach using short chapters with enough irony to be semi-effective.

A lot happens quickly. It is a rushing-onward book as any parody must be to cover the ground in doing in a genre. Yet it is not a sharp incisive razor that Lundwall wields but rather a slap-board. He exaggerated the scenes too much and hits obvious targets. It's no fun if you agree fully with him. It's a puff book but fun for the hour.

The cover by Tim Kirk of the many-planets-in-the-same-orbit is very good and effective. But it is a shame that they wasted the one interior illustration on a static pose instead of Bernhard in a mess again.

Daniel Say also publishes his own newsletter, SF³ Newsletter, fact-filled and some very different opinions.

He has available a 16 page Convention Report on V-Con IV with summaries of all the talks and extensive comments on the con itself which should be taken with a grain of salt.

'Are you sure?' Morgan reached across the desk and pushed a button. Deman twitched the gun, but nothing seemed to have happened. He glanced behind him. Where the door had been, was another window showing more of the city.

He turned on Morgan, who inclined his head with a twisted smile and pushed another button. One of the windows showed jungle under a blazing white sky. Another button, and the lights of the city smouldered in early evening.

Morgan laughed harshly. 'Are you quite sure you know what you're taking on?'

Deman snarled and went to the nearest window. He levered at its edge with the muzzle of his gun, tore with his fingers, and the viewscreen fell away from the wall with a clatter, trailing a snake of braided cable.

'A trick.' He advanced on Morgan. 'The other walls too?'

'The others too.'

'Then we're . . . underground? -- What about the ceiling?' Morgan's face didn't change, but he seemed to stiffen. 'The ceiling's all right.'

'Get back in that corner.' Deman thrust the gun at his face. 'Go on!' Morgan backed away, clenching and unclenching his fists. 'The ceiling's all right. Leave it.' He bit his lip.

Deman stood on the desk and grasped the edge of the viewscreen. He grinned savagely. 'The ceiling too.' He pulled. There was a snapping sound as the sheet of lumoplast came away in his hand, and all the lights wont out. Deman stood blinking in darkness, and slowly grow aware of grey light coming from above. Morgan did not seem to have moved, but Deman could hear his ragged breathing. They faced each other in the dimness.
'You fool.' Morgan's voice was a croak.

Deman looked up. There was a circular window about a metre in diameter set in the ceiling. It was black, with parallel streaks of white light flickering across it: mostly dim, but every few seconds would come a brighter one. Deman swallowed. 'What is it?'

'It's the stars.'

'What do you mean? Are we falling?'

'No....Spinning. The whole ship spins. Oh, you fool! There's no solid ground for us, no earth anywhere, until we reach -- wherever -- If we still live. And then everything will end; it will all be torn away for something new.... He groaned. 'It's always night out there, and we can never stop. You fool -- you fool!

Deman had him taken away, and set about organizing his new power. The image of the starship plunging through darkness towards an unimaginable destiny troubled him, but he pushed it aside. MINUTES OF GENERAL MEETING JULY 19TH

At Michael Concy's on Vancouver Island, the July General Meeting drew four from Victoria, eight from Vancouver, one from Kamloops, and of course included Daphne and Michael (North Saanich). From Victoria were Stan Hyde, Linda Thomson, Kirk Bullough, and Bruce Zado. From Vancouver were Ed and Norma Beauregard, David George, Pat Burrows, Fran Skene, John Thomson, John Park, Al Betz. Barbara Dryer came down from Kamloops.

A relatively short business meeting was held, and items were discussed as follows:

- (1) We all reminisced and commented on the recently held Westercon 28 and its culmination in our successful bid for No. 30.
- (2) As Al had not found a place for the August 16th meeting at which movies can be shown we asked John Park if his place could be used. John said that he would check with his two house-mates. The films will be ((censored)).
- (3) The subject of Mike's use of the club mailing list came up, with regard to his personal publication. After a great deal of talk, almost all who were present came to the conclusion that it was the sense of the meeting that there was not a breach of ethics involved. Following this, John Thomson moved that "A club directory be set up, with each member's name, address, interests, etc., listed, at the member's option only." Kirk seconded the motion. After brief debate, in which the clarification was made that if a member doesn't want to be listed (all members will be polled individually soon), the name and address will be used only for mailing the club newsletter, the motion was passed.
- (4) An opinions column was suggested for the newsletter by John Thomson, who moved that "There be an opinions column in the newsletter, and articles for the opinions column not be edited except for grammar and legal responsibility." Al seconded, and after brief debate the motion was passed.
- (5) All asked that anyone present who had not renewed membership in the BCSFA do so that night.

There was a short discussion among the photobugs in which the hot-shoe vs. the hot-foot was defined, and Al moved that the meeting adjourn. Kirk seconded, the meeting adjourned, and less restrained partying ensued, with particular delight being expressed that there are in fact fen in Victoria.

MINUTES OF EXECUTIVE MEETING JULY 24TH

- All present, plus Korma.
- (1) David gave the Secretary's report on mail received. See list above.
- (2) Al, as Treasurer, reported receiving three renewal memberships at the July meeting and two recently by mail, which gives a total of \$58.09 in the chequing account, and \$277.67 in the savings.
- (3) A spontaneous notion occurred to all of the executive that it would be a good idea to list the mail received each month in the newsletter. The notion was informally moved and passed by acclamation.

- 4) The deadline for this newsletter was fixed at August 3rd with mailing on August 4th. A call was issued in the same discussion for anyone interested in the Westercon 30 Committee, or the yet-to-be-formed V-Con V Committee to get in touch with either Fran or David. Mike Bailey is putting together a book order, and invited people interested to join in. See item elsewhere.
 - 5) The general meeting will indeed be held at John Park's.
- 6) There is an apparently good restaurant on Pender called The Air Affair (Mike Bailey).
- 7) We will be sending the BCSFA newsletter in trade to Linda Bushyager for her "Karass".
- 8) The bill to Northern Comfort Communications was sent in error to them in Smithers. (This bill has since been paid, despite the fact that it was going to be taken care of by Carl Chaplin)
- 9) Ed asked when the final report of the V-Con IV Committee will be out. Mike said it would probably take two or three more weeks.
- 10) There was a long discussion by everyone of the convention post office box in the Bentall centre. No conclusions were drawn.
- 11) On the general subject of V-Con V, David applied to the executive with Fram, Ed, Norma, Al, and Rick as the core of a committee to put on the con. Fran moved "That the BCSFA executive hear presentations of all groups bidding for V-Con V at the August 26th executive meeting, and submit a recommendation
- to the membership and have presentations made to the membership and a vote taken at the September general meeting." Al seconded. Motion passed, 4-0.
- 12) Ed asked about moving the August meeting to the 23rd. David pointed out that the date of the 16th has already been published.
- 13) The August executive meeting will be held at David's, at 7:30 PM on
- Tuesday August 26th.
 14) The September general was set for Saturday the 20th at 8:00 PM at Fran's house.
- 15) The minutes of the Victoria meeting were read, and Fran gave her definition of the opinions column which will shortly be a regular feature of the newsletter.
- 16) Mike made objection to the fact that the Victoria meeting conducted business. It was agreed that the possibility had been discussed of not having a regular meeting (we are required to have only ten a year) in Victoria; however Fran pointed out that it had been announced as a regular meeting in the newsletter.

FANZINE REVIEWS

Next Month: Review of local personal zines, #2 in a regular feature

This is a slick magazine with a professional look to it; in fact Andrew winces when this is described as a fanzine. However he, like other 'zine editors, has to have a job on the side. Regular features are: editorial, column by Ted White, book reviews by Dick Lupoff, letters column (which gives the address as well of those whose letters are published—an excellent idea in my opinion), a photo and brief biographical information of/on one or more Algol contributors, and classified ads. In the last three issues are, among others, articles by Robert Bloch, Poul Anderson, Earry Malzberg, Jack Williamson, and Brian Stableford; interviews with Roger Elwood, Arthur C. Clarke, and Ursula K. Le Guin; related articles on a theme: Science fiction and Film; Arthur C. Clarke. In other words, very meaty. Editing is good, illustrations are numerous.

If you have only a limited amount of money to spend on subscriptions you should get this one. It will make you "hip" to what's going on in fandom in the shortest possible time and in addition publishes from time to time an exhaustive list of other fanzines with a short annotation on each including recommendations or otherwise. (If you would like such a list right now send your 50¢ and ask for Issue 168--hopefully they have some left.) LOCUS is usually eight photoreduced pages long (two sheets folded) and arrives by first class mail. The frequency of publication, speed in arriving, and huge amount of news (people, conventions, awards, upcoming books) make the label "newspaper" very apt. In addition there is a large number of book reviews.

Dick Geis has a very interesting personality which is particularly evident in his editorial comments and general ramblings. In addition his alter ego, Alter, is pretty entertaining as he speaks out from the depths of his dungeon. The zine has interviews, (irregular) columns, articles, book reviews, and letters and Geis' personality is evident in all, including the style of writing of his contributors. One by-product is that the book reviews are of no use to me for selection of books for the library: they are not objective enough. Another problem is the game that Geis is playing: Let's You and Him Fight (see Berne, Games people play). At any one time there are a half-dozen quarrels happening via his published letters-to-the-editor. Nothing like promoting happiness in fandom. If you dig knowing about all the controversies this 'zine is for you. Otherwise get a sample copy and make up your own mind.
