


#3: The Bi-Rotary Velocipede

News - Meeting Irma: Did anyone happen to record the episode of Hi-Sci-Fi with the Steve Forty interview?

((Not to my knowledge. I still have to contact Irma and find out when the show is aired.))

<u>Science Corner</u>: I just read an article in *National Geographic* that said that the key to dealing with plagues is evolution. The viruses that kill immediately don't get the chance to infect. The ones that are milder and allow people to walk around infecting others are the ones that successfully propagate. So the diseases we can't kill outright, we need to encourage to evolve into less deadly forms. Apparently, this is how most forms of malaria and common cold became things that we don't worry about so much. On the other hand, the flu kills more people every year than guns or vehicle accidents, according to the article.

((Which strains? You have to be specific in these matters. Given enough time, even syphilis, smallpox and the Black Death evolved into strains – or we survivors built up enough resistance – that these deadly diseases did not kill or disfigure immediately. The question is, how much time, or how many deaths are "acceptable"? And bear in mind that we've been in an epidemic of several sexually-transmitted diseases for at least forty years now. If undiagnosed and left untreated, they still maim and send mad and finally kill people, over a protracted period.))

<u>Film Review</u> (*Matrix Revolutions*): For once I agree with Ryan – the third movie was more of an action movie than the first two, and full of action-movie clichés. Those of us who went to the movie expecting a mind-blowing resolution to the first two movies were disappointed. I disagree with Ryan about the APUs ("Thank you; come again!") – in addition to the exposed pilot problem, I found them implausibly ungainly and awkward. Also, I'd say they're more of a cross between a

Marauder (FASA's *Battletech's* version of *Robotech's* Zentraedi Officer's Battlepod), and an ED-209 from *Robocop*, than anything like a Transformer. Ryan's summary of where we left off in the second movie was well-written. Actually, I didn't realize that "Zero-One" sounded like "Zion"!

<u>Media News</u> – *The Horror! The Horror!*: Several people have pointed out to me, since I forwarded the report on the *Spy Hunter* movie, that the "Norelco razor" art, while quite possibly for use in the Rock movie, is derived from the new version of the video game.






Local Fanzines Re-emerge



(from Ray Seredin:)

Doctor Who: The Latest from the BBC, and the Sci-Fi Channel Says "Maybe"

New series producer Russell T. Davies has given some indication of how the new *Doctor Who* series will play out.

- (1) Each season will have 13 episodes running 45 minutes each and each with a cliffhanger ending.
- (2) The episodes will be a mix of self-contained and two- and three-part stories, combining into one continuous story playing out over five years.
- (3) The continuous story will be open-ended so that (if wanted) it can go on after five years.
- (4) While Russell T. Davies will write the opening story, most of the writers of the BBC's *Doctor Who* novel lines have been invited to submit their story ideas, which they will also script.
- (5) Most the series production work will be performed by BBC Wales. However, they plan to do some second-unit work overseas in the first season as well as some future seasons' production work.
- (6) Though the first season will mostly take place on contemporary Earth, the TARDIS will still make a few trips through time and space during the story's telling. These "other worlds and other times" stories will become more common as the new series unfolds.

- (7) The TARDIS interior set from the 1996 TV-movie will be rebuilt for the new series, while the exterior will remain the trusty old police box.
- (8) UNIT (United Nations Intelligences Taskforce) returns with a new and possibly female Brigadier (Note: She isn't Brigadier Bambera from the Sylvester McCoy story "Battlefield") in charge of the EDC (Earth Defense Corps, the name of the new division of UNIT that the Doctor reluctantly works for). There is also a rumor that Nicholas Courtney could return as General Alistair Gordon Lethbridge-Stewart (retired) in the opening story.
- (9) Still no word on who will play the Doctor, but Richard E Grant, Bill Nighy, Anthony Stewart Head and Alan Davies are the top contenders. There's also the chance that Paul McGann may return as the Eighth Doctor.
- (10) The name of the new companion is Rose. It's not known at this time who will play her, but the Who-fan community has suggested that an Asian actress should be cast in the part of the Dalek-slayer.
- (11) As for the evil-doers, Davies is only saying that most of the first season episodes will have all-new villains and monsters. However, two very well known series bad guys will show up.

So with just eighteen months before the cameras roll on the first new ${\it Doctor~Who}$ since the 1996 TV-movie, it look like the TARDIS is in very good hands and for me November 2005 can't arrive any sooner. (Note: If anyone knows where there's a real working TARDIS, please tell me, because I want to see the new series now!)

OK, getting back to Earth...as I said last month, BBC America/Canada, A&E and BC's own Knowledge Network are interested in purchasing the new *Doctor Who* series for airing in North America. Now the American Sci-Fi Channel said they're interested in it as well.

Recently Sci-Fi (and its parent company Universal Films) got new owners (GE Capital Corporation, owner of the NBC broadcast/cable family) and there are a few changes happening there already (yes, yes, yes, yes, yes—less reality series and infomercials!). They are now interested in buying foreign programming to drawn in a larger audience.

Can the Doctor be the ticket that Sci-Fi is aiming for?

With just over 5,400 letters from American Who-fans since late September, it sounds like a definite maybe to most people. Still, the station has to see it drawing in a good-sized audience from outside the American Who-fan community to make it a success in the highly competitive American media market.

Question: If you were Mr. John Doe of 1625 101st Ave., Any-Town USA, what would you be rather watching Thursday nights at eight? Sci-Fi Channel: *Doctor Who* (Season Premiere) The Doctor and Rose travel back to Victorian times where fellow Time Lords are conducing social experiments on humans. Neve McIntosh joins the cast as Peggyin part one of this two-part episode.

(b) CBS: Survivor: Island of Beautiful Women (Series Premiere) Two teams of the 22 most beautiful women in the world (whose IQs match their shoe size) battle each other to rescue a \$10,000 bill from the top a very greased pole.

As anyone with half a brain can work out, the ratings for that timeslot would look like the following:

Survivor: Island of Beautiful Women: 18.5 million.

Doctor Who: 86.900.

...meaning that part two of this two-part story will be replaced with the infomercial *Grow Hair on Anything* and will likely remain off cable television until CBS cancels any series with the word "survivor" in its title or Hell freezes over (whichever comes first).

As you can see *Doctor Who* will not be the E-ticket that the Sci-Fi Channel wants to ride off the cable ratings ground floor, and they'd be better off making their own series or just playing the *Grow Hair on Anything* infomercial to begin with.

Unless the Sci-Fi Channel can see *Doctor Who* as science fantasy with a British twist, I don't want it on that station.

I feel that A&E may be the best. They will air each episode twice on the same day (and if we are really good, three times), will let the series build a following, and could even air it the same week as it airs on the BBC.

The next choice would be BBC America/BBC Canada. However, the only drawback in this is many would-be Who-fans will miss out on the series, since these services are only available on digital cable.

As for Canada's Space: The Imagnation Station, they are waiting to see if the Sci-Fi Channel picks it up.

So it looks like we will get to see the Doctor in North America somehow (please, please, please let it be A&E).

Even Yet More Friggin' Media News

New Line Cinema has picked up Neil Zawacki's book *How To Be A Villain* for Mandeville Films to produce. The feature adaptation will center on a loser who, in an effort to seek retribution for a life of finishing last, sets his sights on becoming a supervillain.

Jennifer Jason Leigh, Kelly Lynch, Kris Kristofferson and Daniel Craig will star opposite Keira Knightley and Adrien Brody in Mandalay Pictures/Section Eight pic *The Jacket* for director John Maybury. Marc Rocco and Massy Tadjedin wrote the psychological thriller concerning a Gulf War veteran with amnesia who has returned to his native Vermont. When he is wrongly arrested on a murder charge and lands in an asylum, a well-meaning doctor puts him on a heavy course of experimental drugs, restrains him in a jacket-like device and locks him away in the body drawer of the basement morgue. The process sends him on a journey into the future, where he can foresee his death and must try to stop it.
