# Hey Kids, Let's Put Up an All-Clubs Message Board!

Somebody told me I come across too negative and critical, so I thought I would make a *positive* suggestion: Could we benefit by having a sort of all-fandom online personals board, so fans can find other fans in Vancouver with similar interests?

I think I've given a fair amount of exposure to the Lower Mainland's anime groups, comics conventions, SF bookstores and gaming stores, and some writers' groups. We keep hearing occasionally of a model-builder's club. But this leaves out a lot. Vancouver does not have, at present, any organized comics club that I have heard of. Cindy Turner may have a filk-singing group going as well as costuming, but I'm out of the loop (could you fill me in?). The last time I checked out Andrew Murdoch's website I found that he had discovered a number of Pern clubs, which were news to me. Conceivably we could even have amateur astronomers and aspiring inventors, even loopy Tesla-coil enthusiasts or UFO spotters.

How many of us are mainly into science news, like the April  $29^{\rm th}$  announcement of robots that replicate themselves; or the more recent announcement that a Washington company plans to produce the carbon nanotube fibres that constructing a "beanstalk" – an elevator to geosynchronous orbit, basically – will require?

Personally, I am interested in finding out what the newest, most original ideas are in the sciences, and in science fiction; what turns my crank is playing mix'n'match with words and ideas, rather the way a child plays with Lego or Meccano; starting with a novel proposition, reasoning out its consequences (not free-associating), and coming to unexpected, amazing conclusions. This is not a very common interest, though, and I apologize if I kept finding BCSFA wanting for not catering to this interest. I keep expecting things from fandom that contemporary fandom is simply not about.

Doug Finnerty suggested, after reading an editorial by Orson Scott Card putting down *Star Trek*, that we nominate him for an Elron Award.

One of the fun things we do at VCon is to present awards for really bad contributions in the field of science fiction and fantasy. Allegedly Mr. Card's editorial descended to the lowest level of which right-wing Republicans in the States are capable. (The Vancouver *Sun* of May 16th apparently just reprinted the opinion/editorial piece from the Los Angeles *Times*, but the practices of newspapers are not our deal.) Paul Carpentier commented that at least it generated reaction from Bellingham fans, all negative.

Should I also be nominated for an Elron – for relentlessly playing Jewish Mother to fan groups?

in digging through the archives to find and scan old program book covers, posters, and photos for use in the "VCons Past" section of the website – which, by my calculations, looks 237.4% better now than it did before he provided all those images.)

Girls Just Wanna Have Lunch: Even though I am a fairly recent immigrant to North Vancouver, I have to take exception to Jo's depiction of public transit in North Vancouver. As it happens the stretch of Lonsdale around 13th, where Nando's is located, is an extremely well-connected part of town, with no less than three bus routes (#229 and #230 from Lonsdale Quay, and #232 from Phibbs Exchange) running right by the restaurant, and three more (#240 and #241 from Stadium Station via the Lions Gate Bridge, and #255 from West Vancouver) only two (level) blocks away at 15th. I do agree with her assessment of the food, though: it's very good, ranging from entirely spiceless to ... shall we say ... not for the faint of heart. As it happens, I bumped into a Nando's in Cambridge last year. Not exactly the kind of place I expected to see there, but certainly a welcome sight.

<u>VCon 30 Flyer</u>: I should probably have let you know, when I sent you the flyer, that Prototype (the font used in the flyers and the website) is available as a free download from the developer's site, at:

http://www.mickeyavenue.com/fonts/index.shtml . I looked long and hard for a font which was both futuristic-looking and readable, and this seemed like a good compromise. (There are funkier-looking, but difficult-to-read fonts, and clear but boring fonts, so I was pretty happy when I found this one.) If you choose to print the flyer again, perhaps you could put it in Prototype, so people can see how the flyer is really supposed to look. (I grant that including a font as a bitmap does make the PDF file larger.)

In almost, but not entirely unrelated news, I finally got my hands on a copy of Lisa Smedman's *Apparition Trail*, which is lots of fun. I knew it was going to be fun when the protagonist talked about the strange effect he has on watches and clocks (and ... well ... I won't spoil that little surprise), because among *my* superpowers are the ability to stop mechanical watches, unless I use one of those wide leather straps which were briefly trendy in the 70s; spontaneously reset digital watches during thunderstorms; and charge up watch batteries, simply by wearing that watch. I can also knock mercury vapour lamps out of commission at a range of up to 50 metres! (Shocking, isn't it? I have been thinking of dressing up for VCon as "What Zappening Dude." I'm probably the only guy you know who could be tracked from orbit with the naked eye – at least at night.) Almost all of the characters are based on real people from Western Canadian history, so it might well prompt people to read up more on what *really* happened.

((You should talk with Sydney Trim, who has the same effects on computers. All I can do is teach cats to bark. Sniffle))



First of all I would like to thank everyone who expressed concern about my heart problems. And I would like to thank everyone who came to visit me at either Surrey Memorial or St. Paul's. I'd like to specially note the repeated visits by Allan Kelley, Brian Dubberly and Howard Cherniak. They were very welcome.

In the middle of March I had a "small" heart attack, and did the right thing by calling 911 and going to SMH by ambulance. I was there for three weeks and then was transferred to St. Paul's in Vancouver for open-heart surgery. After about a week I had my aortic valve replaced, along with at least four bypasses. I am now part cow and have a serial number. Almost immediately after surgery I realized that I was feeling much better, except for the artefacts of the surgery itself.

The cardiac surgeon had told me that without the surgery I had perhaps two months left, with more deterioration. The risk of dying on the table he estimated at 25%. I had nothing of value to lose, so of course I agreed to the surgery. That took place 3 1/2 weeks ago, and, so far, is one of the best decisions I've ever made. He said that the new valve would probably last 10 to 15 years. So you are stuck with me for some time yet!

Okay, Ray Seredin, what do you think of the new *Doctor Who?* The members of DWIN in Toronto seem to love it. I work nights, and my VCR crapped out, so I haven't seen any of the episodes yet. I may be able to catch up this coming weekend.

I found out from Christina Carr that her husband Martin Hunger is working on props for both *Stargate* series. She is also looking around at the idea of creating a Renaissance Faire somewhere in the Lower Mainland. I wish her luck; we both know how expensive this endeavour could be. The Ontario Renaissance Faire recently closed its doors, just shy of its 10th season, but there is an organization called the RenFest Group that is trying to revive it in its old location in Milton, Ontario, just west of its border with Mississauga. 

"How many of us participated in No TV Week?" I object to the idea of No TV Week. "Or read the science news last month?" I vaguely remember reading a Scientific American. "Did anybody notice the Aurora nominations deadline whizzing by?" I saw it whiz by, but couldn't summon the energy to catch it. "Why don't we do regular outreach programs, like to the students at SFU and UBC clubs?" Those clubs are only open on weekdays, when most of us are working and

therefore unable to physically visit. For those of us with free time during the weekdays (for example, me on Fridays), both universities are still multiple buses away. If I recall correctly, *BCSFAzine* has been sent to other clubs, and there has been no response. In the case of the UBC (AMS) SFS, we can't e-mail them to invite them to FRED or other events because they don't manage their YAHOO! Group or answer their e-mail.

"We Await Silent Tristero's Empire" – Randy Barnhart: "Nice shot, Felicity." Thanks

"Hey, wait a minute: am I wrong or was FRED actually held at a...\*gasp\* Denny's?" FRED has been held at Denny's for several months now. We made the move when our previous location, the Jolly Alderman Sports Bar & Grill, became too crowded, expensive, and loud. The move was controversial. Some FREDgoers didn't want to leave the Alderman. Others couldn't stand it any longer. There was a sense that respect should be paid to Steve Forty by consulting him first, but he deferred to the will of the majority. I decided the way to take action, without presuming too much control, was to start going to Denny's with my closest friends, without trying to move FRED. Other people tried going to Denny's with us, and enough people preferred it that it became the de facto new FRED location.

((Typical. Nobody wants to be fixed or firm or definite about anything.))

For a while everything was fine – better food in larger portions at the same price; bottomless soft drinks; no TV; no sports fans screaming and roaring about the games on TV; no ear-splitting jukebox; no crowding; more centrally located on public transportation; free parking. In the last few months one of those things has changed: the jukebox at Denny's has been way too loud. The problem is that it's set to an audible, medium level when it's playing its own random choices, but when someone puts money in the volume increases sharply. Every week we politely ask the staff to turn it down to a level that doesn't physically hurt our heads and that doesn't make it impossible to converse with someone sitting right next to you, and every week they grudgingly turn it down very slightly, while reminding us that the later it gets, the more the jukebox has to be loud to satisfy people on their way to or from nightclubs. I took the initiative last night of sitting down at the table where the manager was eating dinner and very gently telling him that the jukebox volume was making us so miserable that we were considering going somewhere else. The manager offered to try to change the jukebox's settings so that the volume didn't increase every time someone put money in.

I hope that that solves the problem, because there's nowhere else to go that would be any different. All bars will be as sports-oriented as the Alderman and all restaurants will have loud music like Denny's (or inferior prices, space, location, parking, or selection). We'll have to have FRED at

someone's house or cancel it altogether (or at least not cancel it but accept that people who don't like the noise will stop going to Denny's). There are no other places that don't charge money for space, are quiet, and serve food and drink, so FRED is dying.

((I believe somebody once suggested we meet at a <u>café</u>, instead of a bar. I would support that. In fact the first time I tried holding a Kaffeeklatsch group, I was trying to hold it at a coffeeshop. I for one can live without social drinking, and I can think of only one older BCSFA member who seemed to insist we meet at a liquor-licensed establishment.))

"...Sin City was flat out 'Yeah, we're from a comic book – make something out of it!" Oh, the mundane critics did try. Entertainment Weekly critic Lisa Schwarzbaum was the most shamelessly antifannish (and misandrist), saying [bold emphases mine]:

Faithfulness, a virtue in personal relationships, is overrated when it comes to movie adaptations of comic books. (Let the foaming from fanboys begin.) The devotee who is betrothed to the pages of a particular, ardently loved graphic novel – sequential print-art event, multipage transportable visual diversion, whatever – is the devotee advised to reread that book, through sickness and health, for guaranteed fidelity of experience. To look for the same in a movie is to arrive at the obsessive literal-mindedness and diminished emotional returns of *Sin City* or, as the promotional materials emphasize, *Frank Miller's Sin City* – as if, in certain controversial scholarly circles, Francis Bacon has been credited with the authorship.

This uncontestedly jazzy-looking screen translation of various stories from the pages of the Sin City comic books begun by Miller in 1991 is first and foremost the cinematic work of impish pop-culture vulture Robert Rodriguez, who has swung in his colorful career from El Mariachi to Spy Kids. But with insistence that the work is produced and directed by Rodriguez and Frank Miller, from text by Frank Miller, with an appearance by Frank Miller as a low-down priest, I've got to wonder how much truer to the pulp-fiction spirit of the books (and thus how much more persuasive an introduction for the uninitiated) the movie might have been had its production team not been stuck in such fawning thrall to the source material. Miller is famed, in inky circles, for his two issues of Marvel's Spectacular Spider-Man, and for his work on the comics Daredevil and The Dark Knight Returns. Call me an insensitive non-fangirl, but if the sacred works of Jane Austen can stand up to freewheeling reinterpretation. then so, too, can heavy-breathing pages about trussed-

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up little girls and a vile-smelling cartoon pervert known as Yellow Bastard.

Miller's neighborhood of vice, lust, perversity, and loneliness (the burg's full name is Basin City, as in the pits of humanity) is one of brutish, rock-jawed men, dangerous and impossibly curvaceous women, crooked cops, and arch-villain types familiar and even comforting to any hormonally trip-wired teenager who has ever held a racy comic book with one hand. Rodriguez/Miller's screen version, fleshed out by eager-to-play-along stars including Bruce Willis (as a crusty cop), Jessica Alba (as an untainted exotic dancer), Clive Owen (as a tough ex-photojournalist), Rosario Dawson (as your average hottie prostitute), and Elijah Wood (as the kind of flesh-eating serial killer who lurks inside every adolescent boy) warps those characters into alienating - or worse, laughable – avatars of violence and sexual humiliation. Miller's carefully styled, hard-boiled dialogue and narrative connections ("The night is hot as hell. Everything sticks. It's a lousy room in a lousy part of a lousy town") lose punch – or worse, sound like Guy Noir parodies from Garrison Keillor - when spoken out loud with broad sneers rather than read, nestled on the page amid the crackle and pop of the illustrations.

Consider the story of the vulnerable bruiser Marv, Miller's coolest antihero, played like he was born for the gig by Mickey Rourke in the movie's best star turn. Marv's mangled profile is a cross between Dudley Do-Right and Ron Perlman on Beauty and the Beast, and he's got the ugly-puss resignation to go with it. And when he gets into a brawl, which is constantly, he covers his scrapes with adhesive bandages that glow white, like stars, on the blackness of the page or screen. Rodriguez gets Marv's look down just right - the visual elegance of Sin City may be its own reward for certain tech-minded connoisseurs - and in Rourke's melancholy interpretation, a soul leaks out that the movie doesn't know what to do with. And so a grand love-and-death story that might have carried the whole picture – about the homely loner's all-city search for the killer of a beautiful woman who showed Marv love in one night of sticky bliss - gets shuffled between other, less "human" stories that apparently must be told.

Such undifferentiated enthusiasm culminates in a long, stupidly extreme story of torture and revenge involving Benicio Del Toro as a stinkin' cop who gets into a spot of trouble: He's tortured, and double-killed, and triple-hacked until his head – severed from his body – becomes a negotiation point and/or soccer ball all its own, with competing Sinners out to collect it. The moderate amusement of seeing Del Toro in segments (and FYI, he's not the only star who goes to pieces in Rodriguez and Miller's town) soon wears off, though, replaced by a kind of restless overstimulation. Glued tightly from page to screen, *Sin City* is so seduced by the visual possibilities of sin that style becomes its own vice.

...because God forbid a movie shouldn't revolve around a formulaic love story. Anything else is cold and impersonal and only for pathetic losers who're married to their comic books. From this review we learn that: people who like faithful adaptations are apt to foam at the mouth with very little invitation, and are obsessive and literal-minded and emotionally deficient (is she trying to imply an autistic connection?); that comics can't be literature, no matter how beautiful or intelligent or moving they are; that comics are porn; that boys are perverted serial killers (*every single one*); and that movies should never be made to express a unique vision, but only to reach the widest possible audience.

I nominate Lisa Schwarzbaum for the Rebecca Eckler Stupid Bitch Elron.

((Typical. It's hard to emphasize enough, some people's opinions are simply not important, when they venture outside their field of knowledge.))

"Sin City was also the first decent acting job I've seen from Bruce Willis in some little time..." Remember when Bruce Willis could make faces other than the one where he's sucking a lemon?

"Also, Jessica Alba appears in the movie, and I will leave it at that." I haven't forgiven Jessica Alba for the misandry of Dark Angel. ((Sometime, you really must expand on the subject of misandry in broadcast media fictions.))

"...Someone called Ice Cube (some sort of musician, I believe)..." \*(laugh)\*

*"Felicity: Good luck on the Auroras!"* I never did get around to entering, sadly. Maybe next year, if my life is less chaotic.

((Actually you don't put up your own name for an Aurora, other people nominate you, and/or vote for you whether or not your name is on the voting ballot.))

Point taken, about that woman not wanting to stand up to her boyfriend and get slapped around for it.

<u>Felicity Walker/BCSFAZINEzine</u> – I notice that between composition and publication my apostrophes and quote marks become non-directed and my em-dashes become hyphens – what can I do to fix this?

((Not much; it is my job, and I don't always register that there's something to be done.))

"Mainstream wrestling broke kayfabe (?? – GS)..." In the carnival days of wrestling, kayfabe was the then-insider knowledge that

wrestling was, for lack of a clearer term, "fake." (Etymologists speculate that the word *kayfabe* is the word *fake* in a kind of pig Latin.) Now that everyone knows that wrestling is "fake," wrestling fans use *kayfabe* for when the actors break the imaginary "fourth wall" and do something so obviously not part of the show that it's impossible to suspend disbelief. (I suppose, if one were tasteless, one could say that Owen Hart's 1999 death – falling 90 feet from the rafters into the ring – broke kayfabe. It's hard to think of a better example, because it's often part of the show when wrestlers come into the ring and appear to be acting unpredictably and not following the script.)

Another wrestling term that has undergone a similar change in meaning is *mark*. In wrestling terms (as opposed to general con artistry terms), a *mark* was anyone who believed wrestling was "real." Today, *mark* means an enthusiastic fan that voluntarily suspends disbelief for fun.

((Originally, a mark was a rube that a grifter skinned by showing him the glim.))

I put "real" and "fake" in quote marks out of sensitivity to the fact that, though the show may be scripted, all wrestlers do perform real, skilled physical actions. (Ones that result in all-too-real injuries. The show must go on even if they're in pain, and the damage is often permanent.) It's difficult to explain to that meaning of *real* to people who prefer to believe that wrestling is fake (and stupid). You can't reason with those people.

<u>Barb Dryer</u>: I'd like to go to Fruvous's *Star Wars: Episode III – Revenge of the Sith* birthday event.

"Even Yet More Kaffeeklatsch": "I concluded that either we need a better person for taking notes, or someone has to moderate these discussions better, so they actually lead somewhere and accomplish something." <u>Sin City</u>: Nothing convinced me more of the huge and growing gap between fans and mundanes that the reaction of film critics to *Sin City*. Almost all of the criticism has nothing to do with the film itself (was it good, bad or indifferent? Why?). Rather, most of the filmies seem genuinely upset that a brilliant film used a *comic book* as the source material!! "It can't be true," they say, "comics are for socially-challenged dweebs with no class! They do not belong in our classy, thoughtful and tasteful little world of film studies." They seem more obsessed with ensuring their readers understand the deep contempt with which they hold fandom than dealing with the film or its progenitors.

Need proof? I'm sure most of you have heard about Lisa Schwarzbaum's review of *Sin City* in the entirely too-estimable *Entertainment Weekly*. According to her, faithfulness to a "racy comic book" as source material is nothing more than "fawning thrall" and "obsessive literal-mindedness." Indeed, she goes so far as to suggest that it would have been a better film if the director, Robert Rodriguez, had just forgotten all that comic book stuff and did a straight love story. Of course, had that happened, the film would not have been *Sin City*.

Schwarzbaum's grating disdain goes further than just the comic medium. She genuinely abhors fans with a passion that knows no limits. Apparently the only reason *Sin City* is so popular is that we are "hormonally trip-wired teenagers" who are sexually, emotionally and socially immature; else why would we be reading comic books? I haven't read anything this despicable and disgusting since the bad old days of Dr. Wertham.

And that gap seems to be growing. Society as a whole seems to be racing towards an almost fixated conformity, rather like the Fifties. Is it an effect of the War on Terrorism, with those outside the mundane replacing the

Commies as targets of hatred and suspicion? I don't know, but antigay violence is on the rise, anti-Semitism is up, and just general unpleasantness towards anyone outside a tightly monitored circle of conformity is really getting up a head of steam. Maybe it's time to reconsider Leslie Fish's old idea of a "homeland for fans." Of course, YMMV.

<u>Felicity</u>: I certainly understand your feelings of dislike for Spider Jerusalem. As Warren Ellis said about his *Transmetropolitan* (the comic Spider appeared in): "*Transmetropolitan* follows Spider as he harasses people with the ugly, painful truth until they are practically driven insane, fill their pants up with defecation wrought of abject terror, or simply kick his ass. Then he writes articles about them." Spider was created to be thoroughly unlikeable in his search for the truth. He is, I think, an object lesson to those of us who want our heroes to be clean cut, flawless types. Heroes need not be admirable or even nice, simply heroic.

On the other hand, it could just be a case like your thinking Bill Paxton is the cat's pyjamas while I...do not.

My favourite TV program these days (i.e., while *Battlestar Galactica* is on summer holiday), is *House, MD* (Global). For those who haven't seen this tiny perfect gem: Gregory House is the head of the Diagnostics Department at a huge teaching hospital and one of the leading diagnosticians in the world. ### ASK DR. KNOW

(A communal identity composed of any participating BCSFA members and BCSFAzine readers)

Q: What is the interface between fandom and the 'danes, and how can we *gracefully* represent fandom to 'danes, without sacrificing that which is Fandom?

(John Bartley, Feb. 13, 2005)

A: Depending on your experience, you may perceive the interface was *obscured* between fandom and "Mundania" – the realm of very mundane people – by the successful marketing of *Star Trek*, *Star Wars*, and other media "franchises". (Other people have directly contrary experiences, as witness Randy Barnhardt's letter in this issue. I have no idea how to resolve this contradiction.)

We already *lost* the essential thing to represent about Fandom, about the mid-1970s. The essential thing in Fandom, or so I was led to believe by several sources, was a community of friends with active minds, which was small enough that most were in contact with most of the others, and who knew many of the same stories and ideas; and who were enough education to apply skepticism, disciplined reason, and yet imagination to SF and to the present world alike.

The essential thing in Mundania, or at least in the most mundane people, is a refusal to recognize the repeated innovations and changes in their world, since some arbitrary point in the past. Maybe some contemporary mainstream novels include some new things, such as HIV and Kreutzfeld-Jacob disease, electronic communication and privacy issues, advances in prosthetic and diagnostic technology, nuclear and genetic technologies, or environmental degradation; but not terribly long ago, any remotely similar stories would automatically be classified as science fiction.

However, "science fiction" has been transmogrified, largely by entertainment media, into "sci fi". I think the difference is the difference between stories about *new* ideas – as were many stories by Asimov, Anderson, Blish, de Camp, Gibson, Heinlein, Pohl, Simak, Sturgeon, Verne, Wells, Williams, when they were first published – and *formulaic* movie and television stories. The trappings, and the outward, visible signs of these series, are now *familiar* to many; they are popular knowledge, even clichés. And they're *not original*.

"Fandom" itself has been transmogrified into several groups, each with a different focus to their interests; the groups mostly *don't* know each other, nor the same stories and ideas; in fact the "interface" or chasm between any two fan groups may be *greater* important than the interface between fans and mundanes.

<sup>&</sup>quot;The earliest Latin document anywhere that is <u>known</u> to be in a female hand ... is a Roman letter from about 100 A.D. ... inviting the recipient to a birthday party."

There are still very mundane people who won't concede that life *changes*, in important essentials; more to the point, people who just *won't* try out novel, original ideas, even in conversation. There are a lot more people who are familiar with the trappings of science fiction but who don't seek it out, and who *won't* follow a bit of reasoned speculation.

There is no graceful way to cross this barrier.

In this respect, I should say that most fan groups *are now mundane*; that is why I maintain that the interface between fans and mundanes is obscured.

Of course you could always respond that you were only asking about the difference between people who go to SF conventions, and people who ask what they're about.

### A CLINIC CALLED BORIS:

Robert Sheckley on Artificial Respiration in Ukrainian Hospital

"Famous U.S. science-fiction writer Robert Sheckley is still in a Kiev hospital suffering respiratory failure after a week of treatment, the Ekho Moskvy Web site reported Thursday.

"The 76-year-old writer was taken to hospital with a cold during his visit to the Ukrainian Sci-Fi Computer Week, an international event for science fiction writers, *Itar Tass* reports. His condition has deteriorated since.

"Sheckley is now in one of Kiev's private medical institutions, a clinic called Boris. He has also been examined by specialists from the Ukrainian State Pulmonology Institute and the National Medical University.

"The writer is currently on artificial respiration and doctors describe his condition as grave, *Ekho Moskvy* adds.

"Robert Sheckley is a star of the Golden Age of science fiction and one of the major creators of the genre itself.

"Born in Brooklyn and raised in New Jersey Sheckley began writing stories in the 1940s, soon becoming popular. He moved to the Spanish island of Ibiza in the 1970s and returned to the United States ten years later as fiction editor of *OMNI* magazine.

"Sheckley has written over sixty books to date, including twenty novels and nine collections of short stories. His major works include Immortality Inc and Status Civilization as well as several books written in collaboration with Roger Zelazny.

"He won the Jupiter Award for the best science fiction story of 1974. In 1991, he received the Daniel F. Gallun award for contributions to the genre of science fiction.

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Patty Wells writes:

"I have to share with you that when I asked to do another Smofcon program, I was envisioning something kind of quiet and maybe even a shade academic. I completed a second master's degree in adult ed in the last couple of years and figured I could use some of those ideas.

"Then all Hell broke loose in Portland. The hotel we'd held Orycon in for 17 years was sold. This wasn't a problem, it's been sold before, multiple times. This time they announced its closure fairly abruptly in the papers over the weekend, leaving no weekend staff able to answer any questions posed by people like me. At that point the Columbia River was half the site for a Westercon bid, and housed Orycon and our 600 person gaming con, GameStorm.

"But that wasn't the half of the insanity that broke around the same time. Suddenly our relatively young chair (a woman of great strength and character) had no hotel, no art show panels, and a startling lack of several other things.

"As we began picking up pieces, I made notes for a Smofcon program. I think it's important to take one's intensely painful learning experiences and do something useful with them. The theme will be Expecting the Unexpected and will feature discussions of these sorts of topics - hotel re-siting, controlling mailing lists when rumors abound, breaking bad news, what documents you should have multiple copies of, developing a team when you have tough decisions to make, and the importance of fannish networking. This is not to say we've done any of these things well, you understand. We just have some fresh insights on the issues involved, and decided to see if we've learned anything useful to share in a Smofcon.

"I ended up taking point on finding the new Orycon hotel. Following this search, a couple of my favorite maniacs and I are developing an exercise to take you through the decision making process we faced, when nothing seems good after so many years in the same place. For those of you who know me, you might guess that the names and attributes of the hotels might change just a little to add some fun to it. But I barely have to stretch the truth to do this; one of those hotels really does look a lot like Alcatraz. (But we decided on the hotel modelled on Lovecraft's "Dreams of the Witch House".)

"We intend to have the usual Smofcon panels. However, I'd like to see the idea of how a group can be prepared to turn on a dime when situations change suddenly be something we consciously look at this year. (my emphasis – GS)

"Please feel free to throw in ideas and let me know what especially merits discussion this year. Finances have kept me from the past couple of Smofcons, so I would love to see some discussion on things that haven't been emphasized enough recently.

"I will happily collect articles to make a Smofcon book. They can follow the theme or be more general. If I were to say anything about articles, it would be that if you haven't ventured to write about what you do, you should

give it a try. Too few of us write down what we know, considering what a knowledgeable group of people this is. So, this is your first request for articles as well."



Akahele I Ke Ka`aahi!

Not too much news coming up from Hollywood this month. There should be more news after the major American TV networks announce their fall 2005 schedule, but since that's after the *BCSFAzine* deadline, you'll have to wait 'til next month.

Still, there's three items I think you may find interesting. First, UPN is not going replace *Star Trek: Enterprise* with *Making of a Male Model* (and there was much rejoicing). The network is not saying why it's dropping this series concept, but I feel that most of the would-be models did not fit into what the network's brass wanted on the show. However, the network will rebroadcast yet another reality show from its Viacom sister media outlet MTV1, so it's out of the frying pan and right into the fire for all you Trekkers out there.

As for my feelings on the loss of *Star Trek: Enterprise*, it would have been nice to see a season five; however, I feel that the Trek fad has run its course. The whole face of SF media changed for the foreseeable future on 11 September 2001 and it's just too hard for the "stuck in the 1960s" Trek universe to change for a 21st century television audience. Perhaps in 2007, when Paramount re-launches the franchise with the *Star Trek XI* feature film, Trek will have changed into something that will draw a whole new audience, while keeping true to the ideals of the original series.

The second item is that the producers of HBO's fantasy series *Carnivàle* pulled the plug on the series after two seasons. The channel wanted to take the series in a new direction in the third season that did not fit into the producers' original concept. HBO entertainment president Carolyn Strauss, on the other hand, said the network "decided not to renew *Carnivàle*" because the series had come to a natural end.

It's not all bad news, as the third item out of the States shows: once again entertainment magazines are reporting that a fair number of science fiction and fantasy series pilots have been made for the 2005-2006 TV season. Most are copies of ABC's successful *Lost* that would like to be the next *Lost*, but will probably be the next *Father of the Pride* and get replaced with a reality series as fast as you can say "reality series." However there are some original ideas too.<sup>2</sup>

Over to the UK now.



As I said in May's "Media File", Scottish actor David Tennant will play the Tenth Doctor at the end of this season of *Doctor Who*. I said I hoped that Tennant would play a more eccentric Doctor than current star Christopher Eccleston; well, Tennant will be much more eccentric – at least in dress. Being a Scotsman, Tennant wants to become the first Doctor to wear a kilt. It's unknown if he will wear the tartan of the Tennant clan or a whole new Gallifreyan design from the mind of series executive producer Russell T. Davies. Either way, it will be a welcome change from Christopher Eccleston's leather jacket for many of us classic series fans.

Though the BBC is keeping tight-lipped about *Doctor Who* being shot outside Britain, its series partner, the CBC, wants to see one or two second-season episodes produced in Canada. The CBC has short-listed St. John's, Montreal, and Edmonton as possible locations for the production. Series producers want to see both Toronto and Vancouver added to this list. However, both Vancouver and Toronto are long shots since they are major media production centres and finding a film crew that's available for a nine-day or seventeen-day production window and can stick to a \$1.5 million (Canadian) budget is less likely than in the smaller centres. The best bet is Edmonton since they do have a large production studio built by CanWest/Global in the mid-1990s that has been sitting there unused for the last few years and has been recently purchased by the CBC.<sup>3</sup>

Word on the 'net is that members of the series production team will travel to Canada sometime between now and mid-June. They should announce if they do film in the Great White North between late June and early July.<sup>4</sup>

That's it for this month. Felicity will fill you in on what else is happening in SF media, with a bit of publication news too. 'Til next time, be seeing you.



\* David Arquette and Courteney Cox are producing a live-action/animated pilot for MTV tentatively titled *Dirt Squirrel*. The Coquette Productions project features a mix of animated and live-action animal and human characters against an animated background.

Arquette, as superhero Dirt Squirrel, performs in a costume with prosthetics. Dirt Squirrel gets help from the League of Super Nuts, which includes skateboarder Merlin Ipswich (Jeff Braine) and "rebel grrrl" Jeanie Ipswich (Brittany Finamore). The pilot also features Cox, Paul Reubens and Lukas Haas as a trio of villains. [Sci-Fi Wire; *The Hollywood Reporter*]

- \* The upcoming SF family film *Planet Terry* is about a science fiction enthusiast who finds out that he is actually an alien who has been placed on Earth as part of an intergalactic witness protection program. The screenplay is based on an unpublished comic book by Rob Liefeld. [Sci-Fi Wire; *The Hollywood Reporter*]
- \* Broadcast networks are expected to announce their choices among the season's current pilot projects at next week's fall schedule unveilings in New York and are already hiring writers and staff for some prospective series.

Among the SF&F series currently seeking staffers: ABC's *Invasion*, a spooky drama executive-produced by Shaun Cassidy and Thomas Schlamme; NBC's *Fathom*, about mysterious creatures of the deep sea, and *The Book of Daniel*, about an unconventional priest; and The WB's *Supernatural*, about two brothers who travel the country hunting for supernatural beings. [Sci-Fi Wire; *The Hollywood Reporter*]

\* Spike TV has ordered a two-hour movie pilot for a series based on the *Blade* movies, with a premiere targeted for early next year. David S. Goyer, who wrote all three *Blade* films and directed the final instalment, *Blade: Trinity*, will serve as an executive producer of the pilot. He's not expected to write it,

however, as he's also at work on two other comic-book-based film projects: *Ghost Rider* and *The Flash*.

Wesley Snipes, who starred as the title character in the films, but who is suing New Line, Goyer and others for breach of contract in connection with the last movie, is unlikely to reprise the role in the TV film/pilot. [Sci-Fi Wire; Zap2It]

\* CBS' SF pilot *Threshold* is being produced by former *Star Trek: Enterprise* executive producer Brannon Braga, *Blade* writer David S. Goyer, *Harry Potter* producer David Heyman, Mark Rosen and Bragi Schut.

Braga says, "It's a psychological thriller science fiction show. It's contemporary sci-fi about aliens amongst us. But more emphasis on the psychological suspense and less emphasis on the effects-heavy type of genre piece."

Threshold begins with the discovery of an extraterrestrial spacecraft in the middle of the ocean. Molly Anne Caffrey (Carla Gugino), a physician and former NASA employee, is recruited to await the planet's first contact, along with a carefully assembled team made up of a brilliant physicist, a language and communications expert and a covert operative. Together they implement Operation: Threshold, charged with finding out the purpose of the landing and the fate of the ship's crew and preparing for the worst-case scenario of an alien invasion.

The cast includes Charles S. Dutton and *Star Trek: The Next Generation*'s Brent Spiner, as well as Robert Benedict, *House of Wax*'s Brian Van Holt and *Lost*'s William Mapother. [Sci-Fi Wire]

\* Berman: Trek Needs A Rest (Seredin: "You killed it!")

Rick Berman, executive-producer of *Star Trek: Enterprise*, believes the decline in ratings that led to the series' cancellation was the result of an oversaturation of the franchise. "There are a lot of people who criticized us for saying what I'm about to say, but I do believe that there was some degree of fatigue with the franchise," Berman said. "I think that we found ourselves in competition with ourselves. *Enterprise* in many markets was running against repeats – whether it be cable or syndication – of the original series, *Next Generation, Voyager* [or] *Deep Space Nine.* And I think that after 18 years and 624 hours of *Star Trek* the audience began to have a little bit of overkill with *Star Trek*, and I think that had a lot to do with it. And I think if you take a look at the last feature film we did, *Nemesis*, which I still believe was a fine movie, it did two-thirds the business that the previous films had done. So I think it's, again, another example of the franchise getting a little bit tired."

Berman said that he and the other custodians of the franchise plan to give it a rest for a few years, but are keeping a possible future *Trek* movie on the back burner. He also rebutted recent statements made by *Enterprise* star Scott Bakula that plans for a film based on the show were scuttled after its cancellation. "I think that perhaps when Scott first took the job as the lead on *Enterprise* four and a half years ago there was probably a sense that the show was going to run seven years, as the others had, and that it very well might become the next movie franchise, and it right now seems to not be the case. But I don't think there was ever any formal discussions dealing with an *Enterprise* feature." [Sci-Fi Wire]

\* Producer Joel Silver told the Australian Associated Press that Australia tops his list among shooting locations for his upcoming *Wonder Woman* movie. "When I make *Wonder Woman* I'll probably do it in Australia," Silver (*House of Wax*) told the AAP. "I love working in Australia. It makes great sense to me."

Silver shot all three *Matrix* films in Oz, as well as *Ghost Ship* and *Wax*. Silver added that he has no start date or star yet for *Wonder Woman*, for which director Joss Whedon is completing the script. Whedon (*Buffy the Vampire Slayer*) is also putting finishing touches on his upcoming SF film *Serenity*. [Sci-Fi Wire; *The Age*]

\* Warner Brothers has picked up the spec script *The Dionaea House*. The story follows a married man who has grown apart from his old friends. When one of them commits a double-murder suicide, the men feel compelled to investigate, eventually stumbling upon an evil force that perpetuates itself through tract housing, the trade paper reported.

Heisserer created a Web site last fall to build the mythology of the project. The site, which ended up getting millions of hits, was filled with fictional correspondence between the man and a friend who has since disappeared, the trade paper reported. [Sci-Fi Wire; *The Hollywood Reporter*]

\* None other than Paramount television chief David Stapf was the supposed high-level executive who spoke with a fan group about reviving *Star Trek: Enterprise* – but only because he happened to answer his own phone late one night. Stapf listened politely to a pitch to move the show to Canada, as claimed by the fan group Trek United, but that no negotiations ever took place and that there never was a prospect of bringing back the show with fan money.

"[Stapf] was in his office after hours and made the mistake of picking up his own phone line," an anonymous source revealed. "If David Stapf hadn't picked up the phone, there never would've been any talks at all to speak of."

The inadvertent telephone conversation is reportedly the basis of claims made by the fund-raising group that it was in secret negotiations to bring *Enterprise* back for a fifth season. But Paramount has steadfastly denied

there were ever any such talks. Trek United has said a shadowy figure named "Al Vinci" made the pitch on its behalf; Vinci has made various claims about being a Canadian-based producer and former child actor, none of which has been independently corroborated.

"The pitch that he is making has zero chance of success," the source told SyFy Portal. "The sets are torn down. They are being kept, but they are not being kept because of Trek United...Nobody anticipates in any way, shape or form that they will ever be used for *Enterprise*. If the main sets are ever used for filming again, it would be for like a video game or something like that. Everyone's moved on." [Sci-Fi Wire; SyFy Portal]



\* DC Comics unveiled a new company logo that will appear on comic books, graphic novels and, for the first time ever, on films and television series based on DC properties. The new DC logo will make its first appearance on a DC Comics cover May 25, when the company publishes DC Special: The Return of Donna Troy number one and will then appear on the entire DC line the following week, the company said.

An animated version of the new DC logo premieres June 15 with the release of *Batman Begins*, the highly anticipated Warner Brothers film based on the venerable DC franchise.

DC Comics has published for more than 70 years, and 2005 marks a new era for the Time Warner company, particularly in films. In addition to *Batman Begins*, upcoming theatrical releases include *V for Vendetta*, based on the graphic novel by Alan Moore and David Lloyd, and *Superman Returns*, directed by Bryan Singer and starring Brandon Routh. \* Czech science fiction author Josef Nesvadba died at the age of 78. Nesvadba's family made the announcement on April 26 without disclosing further details.

English translations of his work included *Captain Nemo's Last Adventure*, which was published in *View from Another Shore* and the collections *Einstein's Brain* and *Tarzan's Death*.

Nesvadba's writing career began with translations of English-language works into Czech. He then wrote plays and, in the late 1950s, began writing short stories. He expanded into novels and radio plays later in his career. Several of his stories were made into films.

Nesvadba was born in Prague on June 19, 1926, and he received a medical degree in psychiatry in 1950. He was a practicing psychiatrist. [Sci-Fi Wire; Radio Prague; Science Fiction and Fantasy Writers of America]

\* Marvel Enterprises on April 28 said that it settled its suit with *Spider-Man* co-creator Stan Lee, allowing Lee a cut of the company's profits from the Spider-Man movies and other projects using Lee's characters, the news service reported.

Specific terms of the settlement were not disclosed. Lee filed the lawsuit in November 2002. [Sci-Fi Wire; Reuters]

\* Robert Rodriguez (Sin City) has been brought in to develop a new Conan the Barbarian film, and original Conan helmer John Milius has been let go by Warner Brothers. Milius had been developing his own sequel, called King Conan.

Rodriguez's project will also be called *King Conan*, but he won't use Milius' script. It's unknown if original *Conan* star and current California governor Arnold Schwarzenegger will be involved. [Sci-Fi Wire; TheArnoldFans.com]

\* For the upcoming third *X-Men* movie, the three new mutants will be the blue-haired Beast, the Cajun Gambit and the winged mutant Angel.

Angel will be female, unlike the character in the Marvel Comics series.

Beast will "serve the same role in these films that Morpheus did in *The Matrix*," Ain't It Cool News reported. [Sci-Fi Wire; Ain't It Cool News]

\* David Lynch hasn't retired after all. He's making *THE INLAND EMPIRE* (all caps) starring Laura Dern, Justin Theroux, Harry Dean Stanton, Jeremy Irons and others. The Inland Empire is an area of California, a suburb of Los Angeles in the middle of a desert. So, naturally, Lynch has been filming in Poland. "Making a film is a beautiful mystery," Lynch says. "You go deep into the wood, and you don't want to come out of that wood, but the time is coming very soon when I will have to."

THE INLAND EMPIRE is being shot on digital video, and Lynch likes the format. "I started working in DV for my Web site, and I fell in love with the medium. It's unbelievable, the freedom and the incredible different possibilities it affords, in shooting and in post-production.

"For me, there's no way back to film. I'm done with it," Lynch says. "I love abstraction. Film is a beautiful medium, but it's very

slow and you don't get a chance to try a lot of different things. With DV, you get those chances. And in post-production, if you can think it, you can do it." [Devin Faraci at CHUD; *Variety*]

\* DC Comics unveiled a new DC Comics company logo that will appear on comic books, graphic novels and, for the first time ever, on films and television series based on DC properties. The new DC logo will make its first appearance on a DC Comics cover 25 May 2005, when the company publishes *DC Special: The Return of Donna Troy* #1 and will then appear on the entire DC line the following week. An animated version of the new DC logo premieres 15 June with the release of *Batman Begins*, which is directed by Christopher Nolan and stars Christian Bale, Michael Caine, Liam Neeson, Katie Holmes and Morgan Freeman.

- \* Cartoon Network is airing the new series *Krypto the Superdog*. [Animation World Network]
- \* Sherman Oaks, California-based Swordplay Entertainment Inc. has begun principal production on the animated feature film *Conan: Red Nails*, based on the classic story by the best-selling fantasy author Robert E. Howard. *Conan* has previously been adapted into feature films and television, but this is the first full-length animated feature film based on Conan the Cimmerian, a character Howard created in 1932.

Conan: Red Nails, one of Howard's most famous stories, is both a sprawling epic and an equally engaging love story. When Conan and the pirate queen, Valeria, are betrayed in battle, they flee across harsh desert and trackless jungle only to confront the mystery and horror of a fabulous lost city. Conan becomes embroiled in a feud between the city's factions, and must triumph over dragons, demons and a host of human and magical foes to end the war and win Valeria's love.

Legendary illustrator Michael Kaluta is the key concept designer for the film.

Howard's Conan is about to celebrate his 75th birthday.

Conan Properties Int'l. is developing a live-action *Conan* feature film with Warner Bros., most likely as a major summer tentpole for 2007. [Animation World Network]

\* Biker Mice from Mars revs up new series for fall 2006! The first 26 new half-hour episodes will launch in fall 2006 on GMTV in the U.K and throughout the Nordic region. Broadcast licenses have already been agreed in most European territories, and discussions are underway with North American partners.

The series will be co-produced with the Manila-based, Philippines Animation Studio (PASI), which animated the original 1990s series. PASI will also represent broadcasting, home video and all consumer products rights throughout Asia with the exception of Japan. PASI, the largest independent animation studio in the Philippines, is a full service animation studio providing character design, original development, storyboards, direction, layout, animation, backgrounds, in-betweening, special effects, clean-up, color styling, digital ink & paint and Flash animation for commercials, interactive platforms, television series & feature films. The comedic/action series pushes the boundaries by having some fun with iconic business and political figures from around the world. The planet is threatened by all new villains, including the controlseeking "Cat-atonians," who join forces with a USA-based, overweight real estate developer with a bad haircut. [Animation World Networkl

\* Spike TV will adapt the successful theatrical franchise (though not successful enough to hear Wesley Snipes tell it), *Blade*, based on the cult favorite Marvel superhero, as a two-hour, action/adventure television movie in early 2006.

Half man and half vampire, Blade is immortal warrior who battles a thriving underworld of vampires seeking to decimate the human race. Blade uses his fierce powers and skills to fearlessly battle the demonic creatures of the night and carry on a blood-drenched crusade to prevent the vampires from taking over mankind. The blockbuster film starred actor Wesley Snipes and spawned two sequels that, combined, have earned more than \$400 million worldwide (combined being the operative word, apparently). [Animation World Network]

\* Majesco Ent. Co. and Tiger Hill Ent., an entertainment production company co-founded by director John Woo that produces both video games and feature films, announced *Demonik* – a next-generation, third-person action game franchise with acclaimed writer/director Clive Barker.

Demonik is set to launch in 2006 on next-generation consoles and is being developed simultaneously as a feature film by Barker, who is set to oversee the story, character designs, cinematics and voice talent for the game. Barker also has the option to write and direct the film.

Barker adds (read in a dry, Clive Barker-esque voice), "*Demonik* will be an intense gaming experience. I'm having a lot of fun enriching the game's mythology and polishing the characters till they

shine. And, of course, adding a little bit of Barker darkness. *Demonik* promises to be a game that you will play with clammy palms."

Tiger Hill Ent. is developing the Nintendo franchise, *Metroid*, as a feature film. [Animation World Network]

\* Jim Smith, co-creator of *Ren and Stimpy, The Ripping Friends* and many other Spümcø cartoons has inked a deal with Asylum Press to publish a series of sketchbooks. The first – *Deadly are the Naked* – ships July 2005.

This 64-page extravaganza features rare sketches, sexy figure studies, muscle-bound barbarians and loony cartoon characters. Also featured are *Ripping Friends* storyboards, background design and celebrity caricature. A full-color section features never-before-seen concept art and a glimpse into Jim's new comic book character *Chestaclese*. This book will have a 16-page color section featuring rare concept drawings and all new comic book art. A signed sketch edition of 500 will feature an original pencil sketch done by Smith.

\* GEORGE LUCAS TO BE SALUTED BY CANNES (Felicity: "Boba Fête") The 58th Cannes Film Festival honored George Lucas for his film career with the celebrated "Trophy of the Festival" onboard Cunard Line's *Queen Mary 2*, on 15 May 2005, to an audience of hundreds of Cannes attendees.

On that same day in Cannes, Lucas debuted the worldwide preview of *Star Wars: Episode III: Revenge of the Sith.* The film opened in theaters worldwide on 19 May. [Animation World Network]

\* Cartoonist Emil Samuel Zekley (AKA Zeke Zekley), 90, died 28 April 2005 at his Beverly Hills home, with his family at his side, after a long illness.

He drew *Bringing Up Father/Maggie and Jiggs, Peachy Keen, Dud Dudley, McDonaldland Magazines, The Squirrel's Club Magazine* for Glendale Federal Savings and *At Ease* magazine for the U.S. Army.

Zekley, born 11 February 1915, in Chicago, was raised in Detroit, where he started as a cartoonist under the name Zeke Zekley, before moving to Los Angeles. He went to work for Walt Disney, only to be laid off two weeks later when the studio shut down for the summer. Cartoonist George McManus's brother, Charlie, saw him drawing cartoons in McManus's style on the tablecloth of a restaurant on Sunset Boulevard. He introduced him to his brother, and George McManus hired Zekley as an assistant in 1935 to do the inking and lettering on the *Bringing Up Father* strip. In time, Zekley became more of a collaborator than assistant, doing nearly an equal share of the artwork and came up with many of the gags himself. After McManus died and Zekley was not chosen to continue on the comic, Zekley went on to create his own strip for the McNaught Syndicate, *Dud Dudley*, a takeoff on the *Blondie* comic. He also tried a few others, *Peachy Keen* and *Popsie*, which did not take.

He then devoted most of his energy to his own company, Sponsored Comics, which produced comic books for commercial and advertising purposes, according to animation writer Mark Evanier. He also handled *PS Magazine*, the Army's semi-educational book that Will Eisner had done for years. [Animation World Network]

\* Jerry Seinfeld has co-written, is producing, and will star in a computer-animated movie by DreamWorks Animation, a comedy called *Bee Movie*. It should be released in 2007. *Bee Movie* is the comedic tale of Barry B. Benson, a graduate bee fresh out of college, who is disillusioned with the prospect of having only one career choice – honey. On a chance opportunity to go outside the hive, Barry's life is saved by a woman, Vanessa, a florist in New York City. As their relationship blossoms, Barry's eyes are opened to the world of humans and he soon discovers that people partake in the mass consumption of honey. Armed with this information, Barry realizes his true calling in life and decides to sue the human race for stealing the bees' honey. As a result, the bee and human communities get involved in ways they never had before, each one of them pointing a finger at the other. Barry gets caught up in the middle and finds himself with some very unusual problems to solve.

Also starring are Alan Arkin, Kathy Bates, Robert Duvall, Eric Idle, Larry King, William H. Macy, Uma Thurman, Justin Timberlake, Patrick Warburton and Oprah Winfrey. [Animation World Network]

\* Marvel Enterprises Inc. and Paramount Pictures announced that they will make a distribute *Captain America* and *Nick Fury* movies. Marvel also announced a new, non-recourse financing facility (what does that mean?) to be provided by Merrill Lynch Commercial Finance Corp. that will allow the company to produce its own slate of feature films based on its renowned comic book characters. [Animation World Network]



\* Samuel L. Jackson will voice and produce the animated action/adventure *Afro Samurai* for Spike TV, with Japanese anime studio Gonzo and Japan's largest TV network, Fuji Television. The five-episode series will premiere on Spike TV in 2006.

Afro Samurai is the tale of a black samurai in futuristic, yet feudal Japan who is on a mission to avenge the wrongful death of his father. Samuel L. Jackson stars as "Afro," a warrior who travels a solitary path encountering a myriad of enemies, friends and challenges beyond imagination. The series, produced in Japanese animation, blends samurai style with hip-hop. [Animation World Network]

\* THQ Inc. (the company that made the mecha-themed side-to-side-scrolling platform video game *Thexder* back in the 1980s) has released the game *Hello Kitty Bubblegum Girlfriends* for PC and Mac. It's the latest release in THQ's Hello Kitty series of PC and Mac games, after *Hello Kitty Cutie World* and *Hello Kitty Dream Carnival*. (Hello Kitty is the flagship character of Sanrio, a Japanese company that makes stationery and fashion accessories.)

Players join Hello Kitty and her friends for a playdate in eight arcade-style games, including Bubble Gum Taxi, Pie Poppin' Dance, Crazy Cookie Race, Tea Cup Croquet, Cup Cake Trampoline, Rainbow Garden, Beach Bubble Frenzy and Sky Bubble Popper. [Animation World Network]

\* A computer manufacturer called Alienware is selling the Alienware Aurora: *Star Wars* Edition, the first-ever officially licensed *Star Wars* PC, with exclusive *Star Wars* content such as desktop skins, fan club membership and movie soundtrack samples. The systems are available in two versions, Dark Side and Light Side, with *Star Wars* artwork on the cases. [Animation World Network]

Another Kaffeeklatsch idea-tossing group at Garth's place, April 30, 2005. Present: Ray Seredin, Kathleen Moore-Freeman, Joe Devoy, Julian Castle, Michael "Fruvous" Bertrand, Doug Finnerty.

General conviviality and meanderings occurred until a little past 9 p.m., including signing some birthday cards for Joe.

1. Does language work?

Kathleen opined that language plays.

2. Do commercials in television teach children to wander off and take a pee / get a snack / pick a fight when the stuff they're paying attention to turns boring? (Exasperated teachers want to know!)

Garth said "Yes". Michael discussed how TV teaches people they can go away and come back to it, which is not a good habit for most tasks requiring concentration. Discussion followed on children, and adult parents, having unreasonable responses to things like monster shows. Garth tried to pose a question about the verisimilitude of TV versus the credulity of audiences, but it seemed to be a bit recondite for the gathering. Kathleen said something about the cultural "set" of a story, as in e.g. a Chinese context; Kathleen and Felicity then went on to discuss how some Chinese viewers just didn't "get" *The Lion, The Witch and the Wardrobe*.

This reminded Garth of the time that Spider and Jeanne Robinson had to change plans to attend a Maplecon, and someone (presumably unfamiliar with English) misunderstood the phrase "change of heart" to mean a heart transplant, and thus started a heart-transplant-operation scare, which did not impress the Robinsons.

Garth also discoursed about another cultural "set", which seems to underlie classical Greek tragedies, and distinguish them sharply from anything in modern, Western fiction – that some people will be arbitrarily, inescapably destined for destruction, no matter what their actions or intentions. Kathleen contrasted the Western good-and-evil characters with the kind in Chinese stories – the hero working for lawful individual and family prosperity, and the villain taking unlawful means.

We segued from this to the poor standard of speech transcription on live TV, to the poor education of voters for public research towards voting.

Kathleen made a point about a version of bridge where different teams play the same hands of cards, and their performances are compared. She thought education presented a direct parallel. Robert Runte once pointed out that setting educational standards is like writing the Income Tax Act – you have to imagine what the effects of the plan will be.

Discussion followed about schools, universities, business, learning (or failing) to think, IQ tests versus knowledge tests, or tests of cognitive deficiencies. Again, this transmogrified into a discussion of drawing styles, and left/right handwriting.

3. If you were in charge of forming the first world government, who would you appoint as the Ayatollah of Rock'n'Rollah? And would you consider anything other than a white goalie's mask as a badge of office?

Julian nominated Yoko Ono. Kathleen nominated Prince. Fruvous pointed out the disjunction between the ideas of "Ayatollah" and Rock'n'Roll. Kathleen made a joke about translating the Koran into rap. Michael

discoursed about tokenism in World Beat (Paul Simon's 'stolen' pop music).

4. The villains in the classic video game Pac Man are called "ghost monsters"; are they monsters who died? Or ghosts who became monsters?

Felicity maintained they are neither, they are spirits in the first place; once killed they are still spirits, just ineffectual. Julian maintained it's a misnomer to call them ghost monsters. Fruvous thought the whole game was badly translated from Japanese. Now we transmogrified to a discussion of the different spiritual menageries in different cultures. There followed some jokes about Michael Jackson meeting up with a Roman vampire.

The weeds of our sins nourished in a costly house; what then shall we eat?
