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

Thank you for your work on the Aurora eligibility lists. I think perhaps this is a job bigger than one person, and I think it's great that fans across Canada are willing to help Dennis Mullin get the job done. We have

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to get the word out much better than we do, and we need to inform more of Canadian fandom sooner. Ottawa fandom wanted me to start a website with this information on it, but perhaps this is a project better suited to SF Canada and those people with which it is connected. The Sunburst is a juried award with no input from outside, so I think the Auroras are necessary for us to have a franchise in a vote. If we choose to give up that

franchise, our say into who gets those pointy trophies, and let the Auroras rot, then a select few will hand out other trophies, and we will be forced to merely report on the result.

((To explain the foregoing: I did a token amount of work for the Auroras at the last minute, and only distributed the nomination ballots online, not at local bookstores. What I did was list some writers' works, and all the fan activities eligible for Aurora Award categories this year – at least, all that I knew about. If I had better people skills or salesmanship presence, I could do promote the awards, but I'm tired of struggling with things I can't do.

((Neither SF Canada nor Made in Canada are in the business of covering fan activities. So who is? Anybody??))

I would love to see another radio show like the Ether Patrol, in Toronto. [But] First of all, in Canada's largest broadcasting market, time is money, so there is no community radio station such a show could be broadcast upon. And no one else seems to be interested.

((NO community radio in Toronto?? What the hell???))

I am glad to see there is some club activity...we've moaned on about the various SF clubs dying. This discussion has now made it onto [the newsgroup] rasff, and people are wondering if *clubs* are necessary any more. [My emphasis –GS] I say they are, because while the net can get you all the SF you can eat, it cannot give you one thing...a social life of community, and I don't care what Livejournal might say about it. You know people in a club, and you know them by their real names. Just ask Hrothgar Weems.

((Part of the point of the Hrothgar Weems stories is that you can get into a position where you can't get what you want from mundane life and fandom turns out to offer no community. It is like waiting for a BC ferry, forever.))

Dave Vereschagin, to the best of my knowledge, lives in the east end of Toronto, totally separated from fandom ... Ah, yes, there he is in the new phone book. Yes, Middle-Earth is thrown into periodic crises, but the heroes seem to arise as foretold, the villains are vanquished, and we get to go home to our comfortable little hobbitholes. We do prefer illusions to reality, and in some ways, post-9/11, who could blame us? I hope the Bush nightmare will be over soon.

Ad Astra was a great time. We had higher attendance, only one or two constructive criticisms, rave reviews and happy, smiling people in pictures

taken, new parts of the convention (like my info desk), happy guests, at least some press coverage, and a happy committee, which is always a good thing. Yvonne and I made the decision a couple of months ago that the time was right, and we announced to the Ad Astra committee that after 25 years of being on the committee, and other committees in Toronto, Ottawa, Montreal, Buffalo and Rochester, plus a number of Worldcon World Mystery and World Fantasy committees, we had decided to retire from SF convention running. We don't have a steady income, in spite the impression you may take from my words, and one reason we're retreating from conrunning is that we need more time to make more income.

Sheryl: when you say a history of fandom, do you mean like those Harry Warner wrote when fandom was small enough to encapsulate within a hardcover book, or the kind of book Richard Lynch is working on right now? I don't think there will be anything to do with Toronto Trek's history at the convention, and I think that if they approach Yvonne to be a guest, it will be at the last minute, and I also think she'll turn them down.

((There are a number of fanhistories <u>online</u>, mostly defined on a national basis – e.g. Rob Hansen's Then is a series of British fanhistories, originally published in fanzine format – and my own contributions on fanac.org are an attempt to chronicle Canadian fandom, stalled out after the 1970s chapter. Not that history matters to contemporary fans, the prevailing belief seems to be that the past is entirely in the past, over and done with, utterly divorced from the present.

((I would be mildly surprised if the TT20 committee is really aware of you or Yvonne, or aware of your fan activities. I wouldn't be really surprised, if the Toronto Trek committee is completely clued out about fandom outside of media.))

I assume from the calendar that Norwescon 29 is taking place in Seattle. How many BCSFAns are there, and who will write up a report? Not surprised about the fall of Rimcon, based on what you've told me. The only other near-convention activity I've been able to find in Victoria is a regular filking get-together sponsored by a music store.



# RAY HARRYHAUSEN GO BELLINGHAM

On Thursday, April 6/2006, I went to Bellingham to see Ray Harryhausen at Bellingham's Mount Baker Theater. Apparently Bellingham was Mr. Harryhausen's first stop of a new U.S. tour.

It was my first visit to the Theater, which is an old-style heritage theatre with balcony, with about 1500 seats. I got there early to ensure a \$10US ticket, although there were many seats available – turns out I was first in line! (Previously, unbeknownst to me, there was a special \$50US event with a small group of people, to meet Mr. Harryhausen. Also, the Theater is working towards perhaps getting Roger Corman in the future.)

Once the doors open, I immediately went directly to him with my newly acquired book "Ray Harryhausen – An Animated Life" for his signature. (I highly recommend this book for insights into his work! Mr. Harryhausen has worked on SO MANY wonderful movies, worked with

other movie making greats, and has received recognition of his mentorship!) It was a true thrill to actually meet him, a person whose work had kept me enthralled and sparked my imagination from childhood to adulthood. All I could say were words to the effect on how I was honoured to meet him. He was also signing posters and his new book *The Art of Harryhausen*, which could be purchased there. (By the way, "Village Books" of Bellingham MIGHT still have signed copies available for you collectors out there!)

He then stood in front of the thrilled audience for a few minutes with a few brief words. Unfortunately his age is showing with his slow movements and usage of a cane. But his enthusiasm was still apparent. He commented in a proud and funny way on how he had in his lifetime destroyed Washington D.C., the Golden Gate bridge, Greek architecture, and other landmarks. It would have been even better to hear him speak more and with a Q&A period, but I guess time did not permit this. (In retrospect, perhaps this time with him speaking more and interacting would be more valuable as long-term memories, than the time giving signatures!?)

Then there was a screening of his movie *Earth vs. The Flying Saucers*. The audience's reaction during the movie was almost as interesting as the movie. Due to the age of the movie (1956), the audience laughed at what are now to us corny spoken lines and funny visuals. Remember when the lead actor wore the alien's black plain helmet? (Mr. Harryhausen stated in his book he wasn't happy in retrospect with the look of the aliens.) Particularly interesting was when the National Monument and Capitol Building in Washington D.C. were destroyed by saucers in the movie. You would think such buildings were totally sacred to those U.S. citizens, but half of the audience (maybe the Democrats?:) cheered and clapped loudly!

My visit to see Ray Harryhausen was a real treat for me and I will always treasure my memento of my meeting him!

# NORWESCON 29 REPORT

I had multiple motives for going down to Norwescon. One was curiosity: VCon was the only con I'd ever been to, and I wondered how other cons did things. One was wanting to help promote VCon. Apparently, there have been years in the past when VCon wasn't represented at Norwescon, and somehow rumours got started among Washington fans that VCon had folded, with predictably negative impact on VCon's attendance from south of the border. But the clincher was the

news that Lois McMaster Bujold, my favourite living author, was to be GoH. I simply couldn't let her get this close and not make at least some effort to meet her.

Clint, the chair for VCon 31, was also planning to hit Norwescon, so we agreed to drive down together. Since the con hotel was already booked solid, and there didn't seem to be much point in hosting a VCon room party in the overflow hotel, we booked a room in a much cheaper place a block away. (SeaTac Crest Inn and Suites. Kind of grotty compared to the Doubletree, but roughly half the price, at least when booked through Hotels.ca.) Since we arrived before check-in time at the hotel, we went to the DoubleTree first to register for the con.

As we walked through the hotel to the registration area, I noticed the "Voodoo Message Board": a large bulletin board was set up with a list of all the pre-registered members, each with a tick-box by their name. The idea is that, when you arrive, you tick the box beside your name to let your friends know you've arrived, and if they want to reach you, they write a note and stick it into a box with alphabetised dividers, and stick a pin into the checkbox by your name. All in all, a user-friendly way to communicate without a mass of notes to sort through.

My name was in the list, even though my attempt to register online got stalled between the information gathering and payment steps due to some kind of Java-related incompatibility between the web site and my browser. Sure enough, when I got to registration, my info was already in the system, which no doubt saved some time in data entry. I did have time to drool over the setup, though: registration consisted of at least eight networked PCs, half of which were set up to accept credit cards, and the remainder cash-only. Once the data entry and payment were taken care of, the badges were printed up on plastic cards -- not easy to counterfeit, very professional-looking, and probably way expensive. Still, I could wish...

My one gripe is that, for some reason, whoever programmed the system chose to render the badge names in tiny little print, even smaller than the badge number, which made for a weekend of peering at other people's chests, with predictably embarrassing results in certain cases. Some people had a second line of print, in a still smaller script font, listing their status as "Pro Guest" or "Dealer" or whatever. Apparently, this problem was easier to spot than to fix, as people also had ribbon strips hanging from their badges, giving the same information. The thought occurred to me that, if the font size issue could have been fixed, the badges could have been somewhat more informative. Instead of simply "Pro Guest", the badges could have read something like "Author Guest", "Actor Guest", "Science Guest", and so on, and dealers could have had the names of their businesses on the badge. For that matter, given the number of fan tables at Norwescon, a "Fan Table: VCon" entry on my badge should have been possible.

The program book was another cause of envy. There were 18 tracks of programming, which might seem like an impossibly large workload for the programming team, until you consult the concom list, and learn that the programming team is larger than VCon's entire concom. Also in the registration packet were both a pocket program and another booklet of the same size entitled "A Guide to Norwescon", which contains general information about the con, it's history, the hotel, various policies, rules for the costume contest, and so on, which presumably changes little from year to year. I'm not entirely sure that it's a good idea to have this as a separate booklet (waiting to be lost), rather than included in the program book, but the content is great stuff, and were I running publications, I'd pretty much steal it wholesale, with the exception of converting the spelling to Canadian. :-) The registration packet also included a spiffy VCon flyer, thanks to the efforts of Michael and Susan Walsh, who went down the previous weekend to take part in the stuffing party.

While Clint and I were wondering how to find VCon's table, Jerry, the guy in charge of scheduling fan tables, came by, recognised Clint, thought "VCon", and remembered that he had offered VCon a table just before a system crash destroyed his database. He offered to squeeze us between the Northwest Tolkien Society and Foolscap in absolutely prime space right in the busiest hallway right near the registration area. Fortunately, neither of the other groups got upset about having to give up part of their assigned space, so we had the opportunity to display posters based on a spiffy graphic which Lynne Taylor Fahnestalk worked up specifically for VCon within sight of virtually everybody at the con. (I suppose it's possible that somebody could have avoided walking past the table if they were absolutely determined to do so, but it would have taken planning.) The number of people who made comments like "What? VCon's still around?" proved that it was worth going to the effort, even though we didn't sign up as many people to attend the con as I had hoped.

I hadn't realised until we arrived that the guest list also included C.J. Cherryh, another long-time rave of mine. Cherryh has also been a GoH at VCon, but that was before I started attending VCon, and I've been kicking myself for waiting so long ever since I learned that she'd been here. I've heard horror stories of popular authors being trailed around cons by hordes of adoring fans, so I wondered whether I would ever get the chance to speak to either author in person. As it happens, both Bujold and Cherryh were able to wander the halls of the hotel relatively unmolested, which makes me think that I'm not the only fan in the Northwest whose default behaviour in the presence of the people we admire is to think "Don't \*pester\* them!" In any case, Bujold held several impromptu book signings after her various scheduled appearances, so I managed to introduce myself and get her to sign my 18-year-old copy of \*Falling Free\*, which I picked up for the wrong reason (the cover), but which introduced

me to her work. I also stopped Cherryh in the hall and had the chance to tell her how much I admire her work, and to praise her for being the first author I'd ever read to take realistic account of the effect of light speed on battles conducted on an interplanetary scale. Other guests, whom I recognised from VCon, and had a chance to greet, were Todd Lockwood, Robert Sawyer, and Callie Hills.

I had been told that Norwescon had much more costuming than VCon, and it's true. I saw my first Klingons, Stormtroopers, and Dendarii mercenaries at Norwescon. The stormtroopers were definitely the most popular with other fans, although the most common single costume element I saw was horns (sometimes in the absence of any other costume element.) For some reason, there were a whole bunch of pirates, and a number wearing what I can only describe as fetishwear. I'm not aware of any tie-in between those outfits and SF, fantasy, or horror, so presumably it was just a matter of people taking advantage of the opportunity to dress up in ways that they otherwise wouldn't have the opportunity to do. There were also a number of costuming-related panels. I wanted to hit one called "Can't Sew? No problem!", but since I spent most of the weekend wandering around panels and stuff, it only seemed fair to cover the table that hour so Clint could get to the one Harry Potter panel listed in the pocket program. Certainly, Saturday seemed to be the peak of costuming activity, as that was the night of the Masquerade, and the halls were filled with costumed fans. I can't help but think that it would be fun to have that kind of costumed turnout at VCon. (Now, if I could only figure out a way to get a costume together without bankrupting myself. It sure would help if I could sew...)

There were a number of panels listed in the pocket program with subject lines which made me think, at first, that they were related to writing, but when I consulted the longer descriptions in the program book, I learned that they were, in fact, aimed at Game Masters. (One example: "Building a Better Villain: So you want to make a nemesis for your players — what works better? Do you want a Darth Vader, Professor Moriarity or Freddy Kruger? What makes a good villain? Get answers to your questions and share your favorite villains as well.") Apparently, a significant portion of the programming time at Norwescon is devoted to helping local Game Master do a better job, which seems like a pretty cool idea to me.


There were also a number of filking events, including panels, concerts, "bardic circles", and so on. Norwescon seems to invite a large number of filk guests (which is probably why so many filk CDs were available in the dealers' room.) One nice touch was a filk concert of songs inspired by the works of Lois McMaster Bujold, which makes me wonder how many songs have been inspired by the works of Barbara Hambly. (And, if the answer to that question is, "not enough", how many local filkers could

work up in time for the con.) I was particularly touched by a series of verses which have been written to go with the closing theme song from Firefly by a Seattle filker named Michelle Dockrey. I figured that the Vancouver Browncoats should have the opportunity to hear the resulting song, and asked her if she was planning to come to VCon. She told me that she had received her invitation (which shows that our programming people are way ahead of me), but was still thinking about it, since there's a major filk con in Ohio in October (although not the same weekend), and she wasn't sure if she could manage two cons in one month.

The art show was, predictably, huge. I noticed that Norwescon do their panels differently. Instead of mounting the pegboard horizontally on an A-frame like we do, they mount it vertically on a frame made of black PVC piping, and cut it down to about six feet high. The result is that the vertical panels can have art mounted on both sides (as long as you use different holes in the pegboard), and they have panels jutting out every four feet, making a series of little alcoves to show the art. The advantage is that a lot of art can be shown in a given space, although I suppose this system limits the maximum size of the pieces to no more than four feet wide.

The dealers' room was similarly huge, and seemed to consist largely of costumers and jewellers, although there were two T-shirt dealers, two dealers selling filk CDs, and a few booksellers squeezed in there. I didn't see anybody selling things like trading cards, NASA mission patches, or spaceship model kits, which makes me wonder if it's worth it trying to line up dealers like that for VCon. (The question is, were those dealers not at Norwescon because there was no room left after all the costumers signed up, or is the market for that kind of stuff so small that it's not worth it for dealers who sell it to come out to any con?) I talked to a couple of dealers about the difficulties of clearing stuff through Customs, and those conversations left me thinking that I need to talk to the Canadian Border Services Agency directly and get the real story on the required procedure, because the Web pages are kind of confusing.

"It was a dark and stormy galaxy. Some called it the Milky Way but for others the way was as clear as sterling crystali-crystals. Prophets called these with truest vision "heroes," and that they most certainly were, but not heroes in the traditional sense, that of being a normal, healthy, God-fearing and authority-respecting galactic American; but in the real sense, that of being an actual hero, one that does heroic things, even with reckless disregard for his own safety, if not especially so.

"The world welcomed me as it always had, this world I call my own, this earthy New Terra. Not quite like it had ever done before or as was soonly about to, but the sun glinting off the atmosphere's ionized cesium at high noon made for a glorious sight and one I'd never hesitate to fully embrace with every last interquark of my personabeing.

"I deactivated my solivisor as I stepped through the autoslide doors of the Planetary Government and Social Protection Programs cumulonimboscraper's majestic lobby. It was a humble, modestly spectacular place, with the newly installed transparent fluxiglass lenses giving me a clear view of the foyer's central feature--a hologram of the New Geneva cityscape that couldn't help but call attention. It was the sort of sight that could bring tears to your eyes, and even more now that the municipal cookie-scent program was replaced with the rich stench of eye-watering onion.

"I wryly thought to myself, to the fact that the PGSPP building was by far the tallest in the city, it could only be the result of the demolition order that was the first law passed when the new New Terran government, the Planetary Parliament, was formed. "New Terra was working fine when it was run by the three separate governments: The European Regency Council (which controlled all of New Europe, which consisted of 22nd Century Europe plus the former New Democratic Soviet Union), the Mediterranean countries, and India; the East-West Oversight Alliance, created when the governments of Americana (which in the 23rd century was known as North America, Central America, and South America) and the Asian Protectorate (the 20th century Asia and the good parts of Africa) were united by the charismatic Vizier Thurmond Chang; and the Southern Colony, which ruled Australia, Southern Africa, and Antarctica until they were destroyed by the Planetary Parliament shortly after their merger in 2412."

"The preceding paragraph may feel as unreadable as it is nonsensically confusing, and indeed that's a common perception held by worm-hole time readers from centuries bygone, but in modern New Terran English, it makes nothing but absolutely perfect sense."

#### **BIFF: IN SEARCH OF CHADS**

"Apparently, the "Ed Wood Memorial Film Festival" has scared off all but the hardiest souls ... Therefore, even though I've been itching for a chance to show *The Angry Red Planet*, or *It Came From Outer Space*, or *Starship Invasions* (which Michael Walsh assures me is even worse than *H.G. Wells' The Shape of Things to Come*), it looks like the "Ed Wood" thing scares people away, so we'll just have to park that programming track. ... In fact, I'd like to move the programming away from videos and more to conversation, so please think about whom you might invite as a guest at BIFF, or what you might bring along for "show and tell."

"Also, a while ago, I attended a meeting of the Royal Astronomical Society of Canada at the H.R. MacMillan Space Centre. It was very interesting, as the speaker was Dr. Paul Hickson, from UBC, who discussed an idea for a variation on his leading-edge work building large spinning liquid mirror telescopes: building a 20-metre liquid mirror telescope on the Moon. I highly recommend it to space buffs like me. However, I found myself in the unusual position of being on the outside of an obviously close-knit group, and afraid to make the first step in establishing contact, much as people have talked about coming to the 80s on BIFF nights, and being afraid to approach the group. I can't help but wonder if there are ways to make BIFF more obviously welcoming to newcomers.

"Fortunately, you guys are way ahead of me: Dale [McGladdery] has suggested an "introduction game." Each person says their name and some point that's thematic for the night. Therefore, starting this week, I'd like to institute "the question of the week": we'll do a quick round of the group, asking each person to say their name, and answer one question related to

that night's theme, and hopefully, this will help to serve as an icebreaker, and encourage newcomers to join in.

"Also, Serena has suggested that we make a practice of leaving one seat open at each table until 8:00, so newcomers don't have to set at tables by themselves. I think that's a good idea, and I'd also like to suggest that people consider sitting at a different table (or at least a different chair) each week, because it's very easy to get into a habit of sitting in the same place and talking to the same people, which makes it that much harder for newcomers to feel welcome.

"And finally, a reminder that Val is in charge of the BIFF table in the Dealers' Room at VCon. Those of you who have used books, videos, or pretty much anything fannish to sell, talk to Val about it. Also, we will need volunteers to staff the table, so everybody gets a chance to enjoy the con, and no one person is stuck at the table all weekend. ...

"On Friday, May 5th, "Post-Paying the Rent Laughs" continues with *Red Dwarf* "Balance of Power" and *Back to the Future*, the time-travel comedy which won the 1985 Hugo Award for "Best Dramatic Presentation." The question of the week is: "If you could travel back in time and change one thing, what would it be?"

"On Friday, May 12<sup>th</sup>, BIFF's first gaming night was such a success that we just can't resist the temptation to try it again. This time, due to time constraints, we'll focus on card and board games, rather than role-playing games, so bring out your copies of the Lord of the Rings edition of Trivial Pursuit, Risk: 2210 A.D., or whatever other fannish pastimes are hiding in your closet. The question of the week is: "Whose turn is it?"

"On Friday, June 9th, in order to help you prepare for the costume contest at VCon, BIFF inaugurates a series of seminars on costuming. This week, I have asked Laurie Sluchinski of Carol's Costume Corner to come out and give a talk on remedial costuming for people like me, who can't sew a stitch. Those of you who can sew, and have already created your own costumes, are encouraged to come out in costume, in order to give Carol lots of examples to refer to for her talk. The question of the week is: "What's your dream costume?"

"On Friday, October 6th, BIFF will not be meeting at the usual location, but instead, we'll be heading to the wilds of Richmond for VCon

31, Vancouver's annual science fiction, fantasy, and gaming convention, at the Executive Airport Plaza, 7311 Westminster Highway. Depending on how the schedule for VCon shapes up, we may want to have dinner together in the hotel restaurant on the Friday night, but in any case, Val is heading up plans to have a BIFF table in the Dealers' Room, and is looking for both stock and volunteers to make the table a success. The question of the week is: "Where's the Commander's Log panel?"

#### THE FRANCHISE THAT WOULD NOT DIE

LOS ANGELES, California (Reuters) – "More than three years after the last *Star Trek* movie crashed at the box office, the venerable sci-fi franchise is being revived by the director of the upcoming Mission: Impossible sequel, Daily Variety reported in its Friday edition.

"The as-yet-untitled *Star Trek* feature, the 11th since 1979, is aiming for a fall 2008 release through Paramount Pictures, the Viacom Inc. unit looking to restore its box-office luster under new management, the trade paper said.

"The project will be directed by J.J. Abrams, whose Tom Cruise vehicle *Mission: Impossible III* will be released by Paramount on May 5. Abrams, famed for producing the TV shows Alias and Lost, will also help write and produce.

"Daily Variety said the action would center on the early days of Star Trek characters James T. Kirk and Mr. Spock, including their first meeting at Starfleet Academy and first outer-space mission. ..."

*Mission: Impossible III* director J.J. Abrams is hitting back at unauthorized reports he is directing the next *Star Trek* movie. The *Alias* creator is furious the news was released prematurely and is also upset that key details regarding the storyline were incorrectly reported. He explains to *Empire* online, "The whole thing was reported entirely without our

cooperation. People learned that I was producing a *Star Trek* film, that I had an option to direct it, they hear rumors of what the thing was going to be and ran with a story that is not entirely accurate." Last week, [the] Hollywood trade paper *Variety* reported Abrams was on board and that the film would center on the early days of Captain James T. Kirk and Spock and that Philip Seymour Hoffman was in talks to play the ship's doctor. Abrams won't reveal the true storyline, but hints that it won't feature characters Captain James T. Kirk or Mr. Spock at all, but doesn't rule out bringing some of the original characters back for the new film, adding, "Those characters are so spectacular. I just think that...you know, they could live again."







Welcome to the Twilight Zone of the 2005/2006 TV season. We know a few of the science-fantasy programs will be around this coming fall. However, since most of the networks' schedules don't come out until after the deadline of the June *BCSFAzine*, we got to wait for the July issue to find out who's in or out.

One story that I told you about in March's Media File is *Futurama*. The latest on this is, FOX studios and the Sinclair Broadcast Group is starting the MY Network, a new network that will fill the void caused by the creation of the CW Network. John Walsh's *American Tragedies* (a series on

drinking and driving victims) will likely find a home on the MY Network, thus paving the way for *Futurama* to return to the 7:00 p.m. Sunday nighttime slot on the FOX network. However, before you break out the bubbly, the MY Network needs 150 affiliates by May 15th (so far they have 93) to make it a go. If the MY Network's a no-go it's very likely that *American Tragedies* will air in the 7:00 p.m. Sunday night time slot on FOX (or John Walsh jumps ship to CNN) meaning that we'll have to wait 'til Christmas for the 13 new *Futurama* episodes on DVD. (Oh, the loud noise you'll be hearing on May 15th, is me screaming my head off before heading to a pub to get pissed. Luckily there is one within staggering range from my apartment.)

On the plus side Fox has signed up with Matt Groening for another two seasons of *The Simpsons*. That will make a grand total of nineteen. Fox also has the long-talked-about *Simpsons* feature film hitting the theatres in July of 2007.

Paramount is now planning a conference at the Science Fiction Museum & Hall of Fame in Seattle, to celebrate the 40th Anniversary of the original Star Trek series. Called PlanetXpo, the event will run from September 8th (the debut of classic *Trek* was on September 8th, 1966) to 10th, 2006 and will feature the likes of: Dr. Buzz Aldrin (star of *The Buzz Aldrin Show*), classic *Enterprise* bridge officers Nichelle "Uhura" Nichols, George "Sulu" Takei, Walter "Chekov" Koenig, Grace Lee "Yeoman Rand" Whitney, plus *Next Gen*'s Jonathan Frakes and Marina Sirtis. However, before you book your hotel room on what could likely be the last significant *Star Trek* anniversary celebration, there are only 400 tickets for this intimate and exclusive event.

If you haven't heard about this little cult series called *Hex*, I'm about to tell you about it. It's a British fantasy series about a shy school girl/witch named Cassie, who find she has the power to fight the powerful evil demon Azazeal. Aided by her best friend (a lesbian ghost), another spook (that her best friend can only see) and her institutionalized Mom, she tries to keep Azazeal from taking over her the World. To bad it only has 20 episodes. However, even Azazeal would say, "*Hex* didn't stand a ghost of a chance against American Action Films (ITV) and new series *Dr. Who* reruns (BBC3)."

Bad news for all us *Doctor Who* fans out there. The CBC is not planning to air season two of the new series until the second week in October (rumours say the 10th, which is a day after VCon 31). The CBC also picked up the Canadian rights to its new sister series *Torchwood*, featuring the adventures of the Doctor's former companion Captain Jack and his sidekick Eve (played by Eve Myles from the season 27 episode "The Unquiet Dead"), which should start airing around the same date as *Doctor Who* season two.

There are rumours that WTVS out of Detroit (channel 43 here in Vancouver) could be picking up the rights the classic *Doctor Who* series (episodes made between 1963-1989) within the next few months. The ratings of season one of the new series airing on the Sci-Fi Channel in the US remains strong and they should be announcing they are picking up season two and *Torchwood* by the time you read this.


