Got the latest *BCSFAzine*, issue 427, and I'm on a pre-Christmas tear to respond to as many fanzines as I can.

First of all, I suppose we all know by now of the passing of Forrest J. Ackerman at the age of 92. I think many of us are surprised by how the press has covered Forry's passing. There are two articles on Forry on the CBC.ca website, both by Robin Rowland. I've left comments below that article, as has Andrew Murdoch. We will all miss Forry, always a genial, smiling man, supportive of all who enjoyed science fiction, fantasy and horror.

((I've only skimmed the press coverage, so I didn't notice anything surprising. Never having met the gentleman, I only knew about Ackerman from several reports, and from the character modeled on him in Fallen Angels.))

I wonder if it might be an idea to relay to the membership copies of the clubzines in Ottawa and Montreal. They seem to have each a stable of contributors, and the membership of each seems to be relatively content with what they get in the *Statement* and *Warp*. If BCSFA members are given an example of what other clubs do in their publications, they might have a better idea of what they might be able to do for you and BCSFAzine.

((I will have to run this past the members. I have presented hardcopy zines at a few meetings and FREDs, and have yet to email copies of the digital zines to them.))

My loc...I suspect that for every person who says they are a fan or is in fandom, every single one of them has a different definition or idea of what fandom or a fan is. I also suggest that the definitions of 'nerd' and 'geek' seem to waver back and forth between something positive and something negative. Those definitions are rarely neutral, they always used to be negative, and somehow, those words have acquired a positive spin, and I'm not sure how.

((In the first place, "fan" is a word in the common English vocabulary, so it is used for and by a lot of leisure interest groups. As a practical matter, what used to be mainstream culture has fragmented into subcultures (just like fandom), which form as often around hobby groups as around occupations or ethnicities or religious communities. In the second place, social marginals called "nerds" and "geeks" were never more than a minority, even in fandom or computer science or anywhere else. They shouldn't even be a subject we associate with fandom, but for the fact that newscritters, in their never-ending search for groundless stereotypes, seized upon "nerd" as the way to characterize science fiction people.))

I never shop at Wal-Mart, which is why I laughed at the Wal-Mart clone Buy 'n Large in *Wall-E*. They owned everything, from the crappy merchandise in their stories to the transit system in the city to the starships that took the world's population away from Earth. There was the news earlier today that the Wal-Mart in Weyburn, Saskatchewan finally got union certification after 4 years. Now to see if Wal-Mart simply shuts down the Weyburn store they way they did in Quebec after a couple of Wal-Marts there also formed union chapters.

((Ay de mi ...))

Fannish news does seem to be at a premium. I put in what I can. I often find that basic information, which can also make

news, about clubs or conventions or special events are often buried in the second or third level pages of their websites. Remember a few years ago I had wondered aloud about doing a national SF/fan newsletter? Not sure that's possible now, unless we make that newsletter also include all kinds of conventions and clubs, like gaming, filk, Trek, Who, assorted media, anime and all activities that we accept as being a part of Fandom As A Whole.

((I recently tried tabulating all the clubs and websites and Facebook groups mentioned in my materials for a BCSFA members' handbook. Came to 55 entries. I'm sure I could find more, just in Canada, by combing CanadianConrunners and Made in Canada and convention lists.

((I guess I'm challenging BCSFA members to broaden their horizons, and show how much they give a damn outside their current focus. As well as testing my knowledge base against theirs.

((My touchstone for news is, news of interest and importance to the readers. But I guess people haven't felt the need for news about other fans; the fans whose interests extend beyond their immediate specialty or local group are now the minority. And I guess that's the real definition of what Arnie Katz has designated Core Fandom: those who maintain the sense of fandom as a geographically-distributed village; which, let's face it, is an old-fashioned grey-haired minority interest, now.))

Communications with Randy Byers re Corflu Zed reveals that the committee is working on the second issue of *AmaZed and CorfluZed*, their progress report/conzine, and it should have a letter column. Is there anyone from Vancouver who is thinking of going down? For ConComCon 16, Alex von Thorn and Marah Searle-Kovacevic both live in Toronto, and Marah lives a short drive south from me in Etobicoke.

((Unless someone actually read the short mention I put in recent BCSFAzines, local fans are unaware of Corflu. This should change with this issue. Whether any local fans are interested, much less about to visit, I don't know. I am in no position to attend. (Anyway I felt out of place myself, the last time I was at a Seattle Corflu.) If anyone local is engaged in a travelling convention, it is the chair of the last and future VCon, involved with the next ConComCon in Vancouver.))

The report from Rob Hilton re the past few years' history of ConVersion is an inexpensive education for anyone who wants to stage a convention, and realizes they have to incorporate. The good times take a lot of work to create, and you must do your due diligence to ensure that all legalities are taken care of. The

details sound very familiar to me, especially years ago when Yvonne and I found out what it took to incorporate Toronto Trek Celebration, and we became a temporary division of Ad Astra to satisfy the laws of that time in the limited time we had. Believe me, if there is a fannish lawyer in your midst, bring him on board to make your life dealing with incorporation and societies laws much easier. Thank you, Rob, for writing it, and to you, Garth, for printing it. I'll get out there one of these days...

((I have to confess that I ran that piece against the wishes of Rob Hilton, who wanted to present a more polished version for BCSFAzine. He just didn't produce a different draft by production time. Whether the point you took from his piece was clear to readers, I will have to wait and find out.))

Thanks for promoting "Tales From the Convention!"...if you have the story I sent you, it would look great in issue 428. If you don't have it, let me know, and I can send it again. Also, Yvonne and I were two of Steve Green's nominators for the current TAFF race. We hope we'll make the difference. Usually, to vote for the Trans-Atlantic Fan Fund, you need to put in 2 pounds Sterling or US\$3, but seeing that the TAFF winner would be coming to Montreal, I'd think it would make sense to be able to vote with some Canadian cash. I'll be asking about it with the current administrators.

((Nope, I don't believe I received the story. Please send it again. I might have sent the TAFF ballot with the December BCSFAzine, but I didn't. Again, felt need and demonstrated interest are lacking here.))

I tried to view and print page 17 of the .pdf...just wouldn't go. Not sure what happened there, but Adobe just didn't like that page.

((Our copy centre ran into a similar problem at first.))

Myself, I thought the rest of the zine was just fine and thank you very much for it. Yvonne and I hope your Christmas and New Year's are more than just fine. We'll see you in 2009.

LET US NOW PRAISE FAMOUS FEN

Forrest J. Ackerman (Nov. 24, 1916 - Dec. 4, 2008)

Forrest J. Ackerman, editor of *Famous Monsters of Filmland* and *Spacemen* magazines and collector of the unofficial Ackerman SF museum, died at home on December 4 at the age of 92. Consternation and comment has swept fandom.

Forry, as he was nicknamed, is credited with introducing costuming to SF conventions. He invented the term "sci-fi" in 1954, and acted as agent for some of the best-known writers in the field. He received a Lifetime Achievement Award at the 2002 World Fantasy Convention.

Alan White, a fanzine fan in Las Vegas, has produced a 40-page tribute to Forry, including photos, stories, reminiscences, and memories. The tribute is available at http://efanzines.com.
