Trekkie town in the works

RALEIGH, N.C. (AP) --Coming soon to a world near you — Star Trek Town, the only planned community in the world for followers of a science fiction television series.

Recent ads in the News and Observer of Raleigh and Star Log magazine call on mature Star Trek fans to help form a community where they could live out the moral code set by Kirk, Spock and the Starfleet gang every week from 1966 to 1968.

But to boldly go where no man has gone before takes time and planning, and the people who posted the ads wouldn't discuss specifics. Whether the town will be comprised of cosmic condos or Trekkie townhouses remains a mystery.

"I received a letter from the woman who is organizing this thing, but I just don't know enough about it to lay Starfleet's reputation behind it," said Jeanette Maddox, a Burnsville veterinarian. "I don't know what people and perspectives.

kind of community they have in mind."

Maddox is "admiral". of Starfleet, an international organization of 4,000 Star Trek fans.

She said her biggest concernis the philosophical, rather than physical, structure of the proposed community.

The first meeting of the Canada-Japan Space Panel was held in Vancouver late last year. The Panel will make it easier for scientists to exchange space technology. Both nations are partners. with the U.S. and Europe, in the International Space Station Program.

Stephen Hawking's ground-breaking book A Brief History of Time is coming to the small screen. Steven Spielberg's Amblin Entertainment and Gordon Freedman Productions are producing a 90-minute TV special. It will be broadcast simultaneously in the U.S. and Britain. The special will deal ---with both Hawkin's theories on the creation of the universe and the physicist's personal story.

If you think you can solve the world's problems, media mogul Ted Turner has a cheque for you. He is offering a 500-thousand dollar prize for the best novel promoting solutions for all that ails the Earth. The winner also receives a guaranteed printing contract and possible movie rights. The judges include science fiction dean Ray Bradbury, and Betty and Ian Ballentine of Ballentine Books.

Speaking of International cooperation, Canada's National Research Council is developing sophisticated computer equipment for the RadioAstron, a revolutionary radio telescope being designed by scientists in the USSR. The 10-metre radio antenna will be launched into space and linked to ground-based antennas, forming the world's largest radio telescope.

Charlton Heston is returning to the realm of science fiction. He'll star in Solar Crisis, a sf adventure film being directed by Richard Serafian. The film, produced by the Japan-American Picture Company, co-stars Jack Palance, Peter Boyle and Corin Nemec. The story revolves around a group that helps save the Earth from destruction by the sun.

An ambitious fantasy film has made the list of the top box office flops of the 1980s: The Adventures of Baron Munchausen. Also on the list are Inchon, the war epic produced by Reverend Moon's Unification Church in 1982, Ishtar, Heaven's Gate, Empire of the Sun and Rambo Three.


