




#### BOA...

The sf&f magazine <u>Heavy Metal</u> has a new publisher. Michael T. Carr's appointment takes effect Nov. 13. He replaces George Agoglia. Carr has spent the last five years in a variety of positions at <u>Playboy</u> magazine (pun intended).

Shatner on TekWar, his first novel: Author William Shatner says his new book involves drug wars. But the drug in the story is computer software that people use to alter moods. The plot revolves around a battle over the software. Shatner says he wrote TekWar to keep busy between acting jobs and during recent strikes in the entertainment industry. He also admits writing it with movie rights in mind: he says he wouldn't mind directing or starring in it. T.J. Hooker in space ....

Diana Muldaur has landed a new role, just months after leaving <u>Star Trek</u>: The Next Generation. She will play a new associate who joins the law firm in L.A. Law.

Star Trek V: The Final Frontier will be available on video just in time for Christmas. The release is scheduled for Dec. 20th.

Writers of near-future science fiction, take note! the design magazine Metropolis says the following items will be obsolete by the end of the next decade: conventional ovens and toasters, designer teapots, faxes, low-resolution TV, Pampers, record players, record albums, carbon paper, rolodexes, cassette tape players, rotary dial phones, and Styrofoam cups.

Patrick Macnee may have portrayed the ultimate British gentleman on The Avengers, but his private life is another story entirely. That story, an autobiography, is titled Blind in One Ear: The Avenger Returns. It describes his strange youth as a child of divorced aristocrats, life with his alcoholic mother and her lover, another woman he called "Aunt Evelyn" and his expulsion from exclusive Eton College for gambling and selling pornography. Other titillating tidbits: two failed marriages and intermittant heavy drinking.

Al Ciric is on the rebound! Just weeks after closing OZZ Comics, Al is back in business. His new store, Knick Knacks, is on Bishop Street, north of De Maisonneuve. In addition to his usual supply of comics, cards, and collectables, Knick Knacks will also feature a wide assortment of packaging material.

Meanwhile, Metropolis Comics, which is in Ozz's old digs, is open for bizz and have agreed to participate in MonSFFA's discount program. More details to follow.

Protected widely by patents and patent applications.

The union representing Canadian researchers and scientists says political patronage has no place in space. The Professional Institute of the Public Service of Canada is upset with legislation which allows cabinet to decide who goes into the Canadian space program. In its brief to the legislative committee studying the bill, the Institute says "We do not think it is appropriate to appoint astronauts by (cabinet) order. Canada's astronauts should be the most highly skilled people this country can offer. These positions must be awarded on merit alone. Even the slightest appearance of political interference in such a highly visible and nationally-symbolic program could be devastating."

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The dean of science fiction writers was honoured by the Queen recently. Arthur C. Clarke was awarded the Order of the British Empire, for advancing British culture in Sri Lanka, where he has lived for some time.

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Soviet scientists haven't been able to confirm a sighting of aliens in the town of Voronezh last month. Witnesses said a banana-shaped saucer landed in a park. Two or three aliens were spotted descending from the craft and taking a stroll through the park. However, a Soviet scientific commission says 16 radiometric analyses, 19 checks of the ground, 9 tests of micro-organisms and 20 spectrochemical measurements failed to uncover "any anomoly either in the earth or surrounding vegetation" that might point to a visit by extra-terrestrials.
